

finest that can be imagined; it stands a hundred feet above the level of the sea, and commands in front a noble prospect over the harbour to the mountains on the opposite side, and is backed by lofty hills rising one behind the other up to the turretted village of Castro.

"Immense ruins of solid walls stand close by, and a few remains of inscriptions have been found in the neighbourhood, two fragments of which I enclose; the former is cut on a white marble pedestal which has been much injured, and the latter is said to have formed part of a large inscription which a bigotted Papa obliged the inhabitants to break in pieces, to prevent the Europeans from disturbing his holy retreat—a cottage which he had built on an adjoining hill, where many remains of a white marble temple are still to be traced. This priest is luckily dead, or otherwise the theatre would have stood great danger of suffering the same disastrous fate. From the site of this theatre I should conceive that it was intended for naval exhibitions in the port below, as it is constructed immediately on the brow of the hill, having in its front scarcely room for the proscenium. Of this, however, it is not possible to judge very correctly till the whole shall have been laid open—an operation neither very expensive, nor difficult to accomplish, as the inhabitants are almost like a colony of English, and would be glad to give their assistance in any work that would tend to the renown of their Island."

**EMIGRATION.**—There is not a week, scarcely a day, but a ship leaves some of the many harbours of Ireland with a cargo of men, women, and children. Tuesday se'night, the Report laid before the Privy Council held in Dublin Castle, of the number ready to sail for the Atlantic, amounted to *Sixteen Hundred!* Of these 500 sail from Dublin—upwards of 200 in one vessel from Newry—5 or 600 from Derry and Belfast, the exporting ports in this trade.

**THE SLEEPING SOLDIER.**—Since suspicion has been entertained of this man's somnolency being feigned, the interest which the detail of his apparent sufferings first excited has been superseded by curiosity to learn in what way the phenomena of his case can be explained. An instance of the power of volition, far exceeding the present, is related by Dr. Cheyne, in his *English Malady*, in these words:—

"He could die or expire when he pleased, and yet, by an effort, or somehow, he could come to life again. He insisted so much upon our seeing the trial made, that we were at last forced to comply. We all three felt his pulse first; it was distinct, though small and thready, and his heart had its usual beating. He composed himself on his back, and lay in a still posture for some time: while I held his right hand, Dr. Baynard laid his hand on his heart, and Mr. Skrine held a clear looking-glass to his mouth. I found his pulse sink gradually, till at last I could not feel any by the most nice and exact touch: Dr. Baynard could not feel the least motion in his heart, nor Mr. Skrine perceive the least sort of breath on the bright mirror he held to his mouth. Then each of us by turns examined his arm, heart, and breath; but could not, by the nicest scrutiny, discover the least symptom of life in him. We reasoned a long time about this odd appearance, as well as we could; and finding he still continued in that condition, we began to conclude he had carried the experiment too far, and at last we were satisfied he was actually dead, and were just ready to leave him: this continued about half an hour. By nine o'clock in the morning, in autumn, as we were going away, we observed some motion about the body, and, upon examination, found his pulse and the motion of his heart gradually returning. He began to breathe gently, and speak softly: we were all astonished to the last degree at this unexpected change, and, after some further conversation with him and with ourselves, went away fully satisfied as to all the particulars of this fact."

### LONDON, JULY 22.

### JULY 27.

On Wednesday afternoon, Lord Exmouth sailed from Portsmouth with the following ships under his command:—Queen Charlotte, Minden, Hecla, Fury, Infernal, Cordelia, Severn, Britomars, Dover, Thames and Jasseur.

The private letters from St. Helena state, that Bonaparte has been subjected to some additional restrictions. This seems to correspond with the report, that, since the sending of the last dispatch, he had been detected in a correspondence with some persons with a view of regaining his liberty, and escaping to America.

### DOWNING-STREET, JULY 29.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to appoint Lieutenant-General George Earl of Dalhousie, G. C. B. to be Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Nova Scotia, in America.

### AUGUST 3.

Recent letters from Madrid state, that an order had been issued by the Government, for a levy, by ballot, of 60,000 men, to be embodied as a militia. In the opinion of some persons, this measure is adopted with the view of leaving the regular troops at the disposal of government, for the purpose of sending them to South America and to Mexico, where their services are much wanted. Others talk of an expedition being intended for West Florida, in the contemplation of a war with the United States.

Messrs. Wilson, Bruce, and Hutchinson, were liberated at Paris the 22d ult.

### AUGUST 9.

It is with great pleasure we announce the termination of the Nepal war. On the 4th of March the treaty between the two Governments obtained its full ratification.

### AUGUST 10.

General Mouton Duvernet, was executed at Lyons, July 27.

A letter from Genoa, July 20, says, "Intelligence has been received here, that the Dey of Algiers has 6000 slaves at work at the fortifications of that place, which are intended to mount 1500 pieces of cannon."

Besides the above ships, Sir Charles Penrose will join Lord Exmouth with as many of the ships now under his command in the Mediterranean as can be spared from other services; they are, Euphrates, 36, Capt. Preston; Istea, 36, Capt. Forrest; Tagus, 36, Capt. D. Dundas; Erne, 24, Capt. R. Spencer; Myrmidon, 24, Capt. Gambier; Satellite, Capt. James Murray; and Wasp, Capt. Wolrige.

It is also expected that the Dutch squadron, under Vice-Admiral Capellen, and a Neapolitan squadron, will co-operate with our fleet. But, independently of these aids, the British force will consist of five sail of the line, eight heavy frigates, eight sloops, and four bombs.—Total 25 sail.—The ships will all rendezvous at Gibraltar.

A company of royal Sappers and Miners, under M. Gossett, and Capt. Reid, embarked on Friday on board the Queen Charlotte and Minden.
