New-York, April 12. Extract of a letter from Lexington, (Kentucky, March 28, 1817.

" It is with the most painful sensations we have to communicate the sad destruction of most of the produce on the Kentucky River. After a season of dry weather, which prevented all the first boats descend. ing, an incessant torrent of rain was experienced for four days and nights, which swelled the river beyond any flood ever known here before. COURT-MARTIAL.

LONDON, -HORSE-GUARDS, NOV. 18. GAMING. - At a general court martial, held at Cambray, in France, on the 23d Sept. 18:6, and continued by adjournment, to the 28th of the same month, Lieut, the Hon.

Augustus Stanhope, of the 12th regiment of

light dragoons was arraigned upon the undermentioned charges -viz:

" For behaving in a scandalous manner, such as is unbecoming the character of an officer and a gentleman, in conspiring with certain other persons, to draw in, and seduce Lord Beauchamp, to game and play with them, for the purpose of gain and advantage; and that in pursuance of such tonspiracy, the Lieutenant Stanhope, (having engaged Lord Beauchamp to come to his quarters in Paris, on Sunday, the 17th day of March, 1816, upon an invitation to dine with him,) did, in Company and in concert with such other persons, draw in, seduce, and prevail upon bord Beauchamp, to play with them at a certain game of chance, with cards, for very high stakes, whereby, on an account kept by them, Lieut. Stanhope and the said other persons, or one of them of the losses and gains in the course of the play, the Lieut. Stanhope claimed to have won of Lord Beauchamp, the sum of £8000 and upwards, and the said other person claimed to have won of Lord Beauchamp the further sum of £7000 and upwards.

" That in further pursuance of the said concert and conspiracy, he, Lord Beauchamp, at the same time and place, was required by Lieut. Stanhope to write and sign two several promissory notes, or engagements, to pay at the expiration of three years, the said several sums of money, so claimed to have been won of him, Lord Beauchamp, by Lieut, Stanhope, and the said persons re-

spectively. " That the said Lord Beauchamp was at that time about sixteen years of age, ignorant of and unused to ply, and aff cted by the

wine he had been prevailed upon to take, by the parties."

Upon which charge, the court came to the

following decision;

" The court having maturely and deliberately considered the charge exhibited against Lieut. the Honorable Augustus Stanhope, Light Dragoons, together with the evidence produced on either side, do find him guilty of the said charge—and do sentence him Lieutenant Stanhope, to be discharged his Majesty's service according-

His R yal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve and confirm the finding and sentence of the court, and the commander in chief directs, that the foregoing charge preferred against Lieutenant the Honorable Augustus Stanhope of the 12th light dragoons, together with the finding and sentence of the court, shall be entered in the general order book, and read at the head of every regiment in his Majesty's
