4TH NOVEMBER, 1817.

The English Mail for September, arrived at the Post-Office last evening.—The London dates are to the 17th.

Halifax, October 28.

His Excellency the EARL of DALHOUSIE and Suite, SIR DAVID MILNE, Countess of DALHOUSIE and Miss COCHRANE, arrived in town on Saturday.

DIED on Tuesday the 21st ultimo, at the House of Frederick P. Robinson, Esq. in the Parish of St. Mary's, Doctor ADINO PADDOCK, a very respectable inhabitant of St. John—His remains were interred on Saturday following from Christ Church, in Fredericton, numerous attended.

LONDON, SEPT. 15.

It is said that the military establishment of the kingdom of the Netherlands is to be raised before the middle of next month, to 88,000 effective troops. The militia are, however, to be included in this grand total.

The journey or tour of his dominions which the Emperor Alexander is about to take is of an immense extent. He will be absent from Petersburg at least fifteen months. He was to proceed the 1st instant from that capital to Witepsk to inspect the troops forming part of the corps d'armee of General Barclay de Tolly, and arrive at Moscow in November. Here he is to remain till June, when he will proceed to visit the southern provinces of his empire. He will go to Astracan, to the Crimea, and inspect the troops of General Benningen, then pass into Germany, to assist at the Assembly fixed in 1818 by the Allied Sovereigns, and which will be held at Frankfort on the Maine or at Aix-la-Chapelle. After this, he will visit Warsaw, and from thence return to Petersburg.

SEPTEMBER 17.

The official statement of the Funded Debt of Great Britain and as it stood 1st February, 1817, with the progress of the Sinking Fund to the 1st of August.—

An article in one of the French Papers states, that on the 10th ult. 1500 houses were destroyed by fire, in the Armenian quarter, Smyrna.

Letters from Bengal to the 21st of May communicate the intelligence, that since the fall of Fort Hattrass, the British troops had taken eleven other forts; which, according to advices received at Bengal from the army, had left the enemy's country at the entire mercy of the British.

The last letters from Halifax, Nova-Scotia, mention a circumstance of considerable importance to our unfortunate countrymen who were deluded to emigrate to America. A Committee was formed for the registry of every person arriving, his age, qualifications, &c.; and it was requested that every person in the colony would transmit what servants, agriculturists, &c. he wanted, that the emigrants, might be provided for on their landing. A list was also kept of grounds which might be occupied for a length of time for the clearing and for commencing the cultivation; very beneficial results were expected from these arrangements. It was expected to be followed immediately in Canada and the adjacent provinces.

SEPTEMBER 14.

We are happy to hear that the revenue for the present quarter is likely to realize the expectations formed from the increase in that of last quarter.

By letters received yesterday from Frank-

fort to the 7th we learn that a great quantity of English Goods were disposed of at the fair, but at low prices.

The letters from Paris by yesterday's mail, state, that bills on England were in great demand.

The letters by the last Dutch Mail give a cheering account of the state of the crops of grain in all parts of Holland.

So great is the demand for British bar iron, that an advance of from 40 to 50 per cent. has taken place within these few weeks on that article.

Viscount Exmouth succeeds the late Admiral Sir John Duckworth as Commander in Chief at Plymouth Dock.

Mr. Ellis, of Barming, the largest hop-grower in England, commenced picking on Monday, and has engaged 2700 persons in his large plantations.

Fort William and Fort George are to be immediately dismantled, and the materials sold.

Accounts from the frontiers of France notice the admirable state of discipline observed by the Army of Occupation. The most perfect harmony exists between them and the inhabitants, who, by the permission of the Duke of Wellington, are assisted by the troops of the right wing in getting in the harvest, which is very abundant.

SEPTEMBER 7.

The state of the public funds is promising; as they still continue, as the phrase is, to look upwards. The 3 per cent. Consols left off yesterday, for money, at 79 1/2, and for the account at 80 1/2. The dividends due here from the French funds are confidently expected to be paid on the 24th of the present month, through the channel of two great houses in London, which will occasion a considerable influx of Money. The Market will be farther improved by the payment of the dividends from our own funds on the 5th, or from the 5th to the 10th of October, while the purchases by the Commissioners for the redemption of the public debt will be regular, and additionally beneficial in their operation. Communications from various parts of the country notice the considerable revival which our trade and manufactures continue to experience. The tenor of our provincial information affords the best grounded hopes that one of the greatest blessings of the nation, a bountiful harvest, will not be withheld, but that it will be dispensed generally and richly. We may hope, therefore, that under all these favourable prospects, the relief of much of the necessity and the restoration of public peace and tranquility, where they have been unfortunately disturbed, will, ere long, be accomplished in the most satisfying way.

PARIS, SEPT. 13.

Yesterday, after Mass, the King successively gave audiences to the Duke of Richelieu, President of the Council, and Mr. Laine, Minister of the Interior.

An Ordinance of the King dated the 12th inst runs as follows—

"Having accepted the resignation which has been tendered to us by our cousin the Marshal Duke of Feltre, we have nominated and do hereby nominate, our cousin the Marshal Gouvion St. Cyr, Minister Secretary of state for the War department."
