A Proclamation.

HEREAS by Act of Parliament passed in the Forty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, Power is given to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of this Province, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same --- I have therefore thought fit with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council to publish this Proclamation, hereby authorising and empowering British Subjects for the space of Six months from the date hereof, to import and bring into this Province from the United States of America, in British built ships or vessels owned and navigated according to Law; Scantling, Plank, Staves, Heading-Boards, Shingles. Hoops, or Squared Timber of any fort; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry. or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley or Grain of any sort; and British Subjects during the same period, are hereby authorized and empowered to export in British ships owned and navigated as aforesaid, all or any of the said herein before enumerated articles, to any other of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations.

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the first day of September, in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, and in the fifty-seventh year of His Majesty's Reign.

Regulations respecting the granting of Licences to cut Pine Timber.

TO Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Land reserved for the use of the Crown.

cence to specify the quantity to be cut, and made according to the form of the Act of Asto be limited as to time; and no Timber fit sembly in such case made and provided,

No Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Lands for which application has been made for Grants, and every applicant for Licence, to describe particularly the Land on which he wishes to cut, and the quantity of Timber, and accompany his application with a Certificate, that the Land has not been applied for to be granted.

ALL applications for Licences to be handed in the first place to the Deputy Surveyor of the Woods, who, if he thinks fit to recommend the application, will lodge it in the Secretary's Office, to be laid, in the usual manner, before a Committee of His Majesty's Council for consideration; and any three Members of the Council to be a Committee for the purpose of considering the applications in question,

And Applicants for Licences are further. notified that the FEES to be demanded by the Surveyor of the Woods, are now fixed at twenty smillings for each Licence, and that no other Fee or Emolument is to be demanded or taken excepting the usual Fees in the other Departments through which the application for a Licence must pass.

AT a Special Session of the Peace holden at the County Court House in Fredericton in and for the County of York, on Wednesday the 6th of August, 1817, for the Purpose of regulating the As-SIZE of BREAD in the Town of Frederiction,

Ordered that from and after Saturday the 9th inst. the ASSIZE of BREAD be as follows :-- tiz.

HE Shilling Wheaten Loaf to weigh Two Pounds Twilve Ounces, and the Shilling Rye Loaf to weigh Four Pounds and other Loaves in proportion.

ORDERED that for every offence in Baking and Vending any Loaf of Bread under the weight abovementioned, the Person so offending shall pay a fine of ten shillings to be recovered upon conviction, before any one of His Majesty's Jus-TICES of the PEACE on the oath of one or more credible witness or witnesses, or view of the Justice and levied by Warrant of Distress and Sale of the Offenders Goods; and when recovered, (after deducting the costs and charges) to be paid into the hands of the overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Fredericton.

ORDERED that the respective Bakers be furnished with a Copy of the above res gulations, and that they be published in the Royal Gazette.

COMMERCE OF THE UPPER LAKES.

It is with lively satisfaction we notice, that an active and greatly extended commerce has succeeded the din of war on the Lakes of Upper Ganada, from Prescott and Ogdenburgh to the fall of St. Mary. The ports of Kingston, York and Niagara have their Marine Lists, which from the number of arrivals and departures announced weekly, ndicate much wealth and great activity; and on lake Erie, a corresponding industry. is observed. On the American shores the progress has been still more rapid. Ogdensburgh, Sackett's harbor, Oswego, Sodus and Niagara, present the bustle and activity of considerable maritime ports. In the marine lists of some of those ports, we have seen as many as twenty arrivals in one week, of boats carrying from 150 to 250 barrels, and sloops and schooners from 55 to 150 tons burthen, all fully loaded. This is the more extraordinary, for only twenty years ago the adjoining country was almost without population, and is a noble illustration of what the hand of man is capable of accomplishing by steady perseverance. - Including the countries on both sides of the lakes, we may with safety assert, that in 1785, a population of 15,000 could not be numbered, at present we may with equal safety affirm, that they contain at least 500,000. We include the countries whose rivers run into the lakes, from Prescott and Ogdensburgh to lake Huron. This is a fertile subject for consideration, particularly by the Legislature of Lower Canada and the British government.

What we have all bitterly to complain of, is the want of improvement of our internal communications, by means of navigation, Should the House of Assembly have public spirit enough to support such laudable projects by granting the rights to corporate bodies to effectuate the ends proposed, the Governor is obliged to declarethat he has no authority to give the royal asent; this puts an and to all public spirit in this land of promise which the Americans justly call our " chief colony"; they well may say so, for by promoting its prosperity, it may be rendered one of the brightest jewels in the British diadem. If the Government would give our Governor authority to sanction the benign views of the other two branches of the provincial legislature, we should be able to manage our affairs with our own internal resources and would require nothing more than military protection; this we are entitled to by our allegiance; allegiance and protection are reciprocal .- With the freedom of action in our inland improvements we should gain all the advantages resulting from the upper countries just alluded to, which would soon render Montreal one of the greatest commercial depots in North America.
