#### HAMBURG, MARCH 30.

The Pope and Emperor of Austria have restored the Jews to the *statu quo* of 1795, upon which they have paid their homage to his Holiness, who received it with benignity—and they also sent a deputation to Vienna.

Lucien Bonaparte, according to letters from Italy had projected a voyage to America, which was prohibited by the Papal government upon the intervention of the allied powers. The 2d of March he placed two of his daughters in the Convent of St. Catharine, at Rome. Cardinal Fesch had lost one of a number of boxes filled with objects of art and other valuable effects which he had put on board a vessel for Rome and which she was obliged to throw over in a storm not far from Civita Vecchia.
