The English Mail for August, arrived at the Post Office yesterday—the London dates are to the 18th of that month inclusive, they furnish nothing of importance.

St. John, October 4.

Tuesday, brig *Royalist*, Albridge, Greenock, 37 days.

— brig *Lion*, Lisk, Port Glasgow, 45 days. Spoke, 17th ult. the brig *George*, from hence for Greenock—all well.

— James Stewart, —, New-York. Wednesday, Ship *Dadem*, Wells, Jamaica. In the Gulf of Florida, August 30, Captain W. was boarded by the Brigantine Mexican Congress, Captain Boquier, and Juniper schooner, the former bearing the Independent, and the latter the Venezuelan flag, by which he was treated politely. September 15, in lat. 33, N. long 74, 55, W. spoke ship *Roger Stewart*, Cooper, from Greenock, bound to Charleston, out 46 days—all well.

Thursday, brigs *Alice*, Hammond, Bardados; *Nancy*, Kirk, New-York; *Despatch*, Faulke, Trinidad; schooner's *Lucy*, Smith, Boston; and, *Messenger*, Beattrey, New-York.

The ship *Superior*, of this port, from Liverpool bound hence, sprung a leak at sea, and has been obliged to put into one of the Western Islands to refit.

BOSTON, Sept. 18.—The English brig recently lost at the Vineyard, was the *Alicia*; Fair weather, from —, for St. John, N. B.; with a few hhds. rum and molasses. She has been sold for the benefit of all concerned, after being stripped; she had not bilged. The Captain had refused two Pilots, and cast his vessel away in a fine moonlight night, with a fair wind to enter the Sound.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 20.—Arrived, sch'rs *Mary Ann*, *Beyea*, and *Mary-Jane*, Boyle, Saint John, N. B.

NEW-YORK, Sept. 25.—Arrived sch'r *Robert*, Anderson, Halifax; sloop *Duke of Wellington*, Cory, St. John, N. B. via Boston.

London August 4.—A mutiny has occurred on board one of the convict ships bound to Botany Bay; in the suppression of which twenty of them were killed.

Seven vessels, with troops (destination unknown) sailed from Oporto, July 9, conveyed by the *Don Pedro* frigate.

A large Fleet of Transports, conveyed by two frigates, were to sail from Lisbon, July 28, with 4000 Troops.

Aberdeen, Aug. 16.—The *Ganges*, Main, from New-Brunswick, passed the bay on Saturday.

H. M. S. *Primrose* has arrived at Baltimore from Jamaica, with 300,000 Dollars for the U. S. Bank.

The sch'r. *William*, Rundle, from hence, arrived at Boston the 16th inst. and the *Seaflower*, Knowles, on the 18th.

The *Margaret* from St. John, N. B. arrived at Liverpool Aug. 9, in 29 days passage; *Bolton*, do. in the *Clyde*; *Wellington*, do. at Plymouth; *Aeolus*, do. at Gravesend.

The *Mentor*, *Fidelity*, *Henry*, *Liddell*, *Prince George*, *Elizabeth*, *Polly*, *Harriet*, *Alexander* and *Esther*, from Mirimichi; and the *Catharine* from St. Andrews, have arrived at different Ports in England and Ireland.

KINGSTON, JAM. AUG. 13.

The transport brig *Christiana*, Paxley from New-Providence, last from Curracoa in 19 days, arrived yesterday.

By the *Christiana* we learn that 6000 Spanish troops, which had served under Lord Wellington in the Peninsula, have arrived at Lagaira from Old Spain, to go against the Insurgents.

LONDON, AUG. 1.

OUR AFFLICTED MONARCH.

On this subject the public have not for some time past been put in possession of any particulars beyond the formal announcement in the monthly bulletins. The following circumstances, tending so far as our means extend, to supply the omission, will, it is hoped, prove acceptable. His Majesty's habits have not, in consequence of infirmity, or old age, undergone material change. His Majesty, as usual, rises early—breakfasts at eight o'clock, or soon after—dines at one—continues partial to mutton and beef; and when in a tranquil state, he orders what his dinner table shall be furnished with. The principal page is in constant attendance, as also the subaltern assistants of the medical men. A sunk walk has been made adjoining the King's suit of rooms; but latterly

his Majesty, it is said, has declined walking there, alleging that it would be no gratification to him, as he is deprived of sight. The rooms that his Majesty and attendants occupy consist of thirteen, and they are extremely well ventilated. When the Queen is at Windsor, her Majesty, attended by Dr. John Willis, generally visits her consort about ten o'clock.

The Duke of Wellington set out on the 3d of August from Brussels, to visit Antwerp, Ghent, and Ath. His Grace will be on the 15th at the Prussian head-quarters at Sedan.

AUGUST 12.

A serious disturbance took place on the 18th ult. at St. Genies, in France, at the execution of a Captal. Oudin, who was shot for a former insurrection. The detachment of soldiers drawn out to shoot the unfortunate offenders wheeled about, and refused to fire. The Officer who commanded them has been dismissed the service, as well as his men, with the additional punishment of being ordered before a Court Martial.

LIVERPOOL, JULY 26.

The Paris papers lately mentioned the execution of a young man at Lyons, charged as a principal in the recent seditious practices in that city. The following particulars respecting him are given in the *Bath Herald*:--

"A gentleman, who was eye-witness of the affair, has related to us the following particulars of the apprehension of the young man who was last week executed at Lyons for seditious practices, and died with such audacious boldness. It appears that he had acted as Secretary to the *Ultra Reforming Society* in that city, and when their plot was discovered, a considerable reward was offered for his apprehension; he, however, succeeded in effectually secreting himself for several days from the argur-eyed police, when the young ex-secretary took his passage, under a feigned name, in a vessel going down the river to Chalons (in which our informant was passenger.) He had got safely on board, and the sloop got under weigh; but in less than a quarter of an hour was hailed to arrest her course, by a boat rowed with great velocity, and filled with *gens d'armes*; they got alongside the vessel, and demanded if Mr. —, was on board; and on being answered in the negative, they ascended the sloop and proceeded to examine the passengers, comparing their persons with a minute printed description of the young revolutionist. He was soon identified; but instantly leaped overboard, and was instantly followed by one of the officers—they both swam well, but the young refugee finding himself likely to become a captive, gave himself up to desperation—turned round on his pursuer, smiled contemptuously on him, folded his arms and sunk as all the spectators thought, to rise no more—The officer, however was not thus to be deprived of his anticipated reward; he dived after him, but without effect; a second time he dived without more success; but on a third effort, he was seen to rise, grasping his devoted victim. He swam with him to the vessel, where means for restoring animation were successfully applied—The young fellow was then properly secured, he was taken on shore, tried, found guilty and executed."

LATE FROM AMELIA.

We are indebted to an attentive correspondent at Savannah for the two annexed proclamations, one in Spanish, the other in English.—Mac Gregor's force was 850 strong, and in high spirits.

CITIZEN GREGOR MAC GREGOR, General of Brigade of the Armies of the New Grenada and Venezuela, and General in Chief of the Armies of the Floridas, with commission from the governments of Mexico and South America.

Soldiers!—I lose not a moment in expressing to you the satisfaction and pleasure I have derived from your soldier-like conduct of late, and the progress you have made in military discipline and subordination. This is the foundation of all military enterprises, and renders superior numbers of enemies of no avail in action. Continue to follow up the exemplary line of conduct you have so nobly begun; it not only inspires your chief with sentiments of the greatest confidence, but will also fill with terror the ranks of the slaves of Ferdinand the 7th.

The most active measures have been taken for the speedy movement of the army, and I trust soon, at the head of such troops, to plant the green cross of the Floridas on the proud walls of St. Augustine.

Royalists, beware!—The republican army of the Floridas fight in a just, great and holy cause, and their motto is *Victory or Death.*

DECLARATION OF BLOCKADE.

GREGOR MAC GREGOR, Brigadier-General of the Armies of the United Provinces of New-Grenada and Venezuela, and General in Chief of that destined to emancipate the Provinces of both Floridas, under the commission of the Supreme Government of Mexico and South America, &c. &c. &c.

It being requisite, by the order of the hostile operations by me undertaken against the possessions of the king of Spain, in both East and West Floridas; and holding the maritime force indispensable for carrying into effect a formal blockade—Be it known to all whom these presents shall come, that from and after the fifteenth day of September next ensuing, all ports, rivers, bays and inlets within the coast of both Floridas, beginning from the south part of this island, to the river Perdido, are to be considered in a state of strict and rigorous blockade. Wherefore, I do hereby notify to all the neutral-nations, as well as the friendly governments of South America, Mexico, and the free Floridas, that the aforesaid ports will be blockaded, agreeably to the usages and practices of other nations; and that such blockade being necessary to the success of the undertaking entrusted to my care by the abovementioned republican governments, for the emancipation of East and West Floridas, I hope that the merchants of such powers as may be interested in the trade to the Spanish possession in the Floridas, will not risk their property sending it to them, as from the fifteenth of September, all vessels bound to said blockaded ports, shall be warned off; but in case they should prove refractory, by endeavoring to hold communication with the enemy, all those found violating the blockade the second time, shall be considered and held as good and lawful prize.
