

foreign intelligence, it has been prolific in domestic events:—The resignation of the Speaker of the House of Commons, and his advancement to the House of Lords, the election of his successor to the Chair, and the almost certain prospect of Mr. Peel's succeeding to the representation of Oxford, (to the exclusion of Mr. Canning, who it appears had fondly indulged the hope of one day representing that University,) are circumstances in some degree connected with each other. An express reached town on Saturday, bearing the wishes of the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, and of the Common Room, that Mr. Peel would allow himself to be put in nomination, to which that gentleman of course assented, and immediately set off for Oxford; and there is little doubt that he will be elected without opposition. How far the opinions lately expressed by Mr. Canning, on the subject of Catholic Emancipation, may have determined this body of Ecclesiastics in passing by a gentleman of his experience in Parliament, and acknowledged classical attainments, we are incompetent to decide; but their choosing a person directly opposed to him on that great question, gives a colour of probability to the assertions in the London papers.

LONDON, JUNE 2.

The trial of the Conspirators at Bordeaux, is finished. Randon, Manry, Thereon, Badrine, Lhot and Cassaigne, are condemned to death, and nine others to different terms of imprisonment.

It is said that Gen. Savary, Bonaparte's remorseless Minister of Police, had been arrested at Marseilles, seeking a passage for America, and conducted to a fortress in Hungary.

HOUSE OF LORDS, JUNE 3.

Lord Sidmouth delivered in a message from the Prince Regent, which was as follows:—

G. P. R.

"His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, acting in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, has given orders to lay before the House of Lords, papers containing information of the continuance of those practices, meetings and combinations, to which His Royal Highness thought it proper to call the attention of the House of Lords at the commencement of the present Session of Parliament, and shewing that these practices are still carried on in different parts of the country, in a manner and to an extent calculated to disturb the public tranquility, and to endanger the security of the constitutional establishments of the empire. His Royal Highness recommends to the House of Lords, to take this measure into its immediate and serious consideration."

JUNE 5.

A Letter from Marseilles, in the Paris papers, informs us, that the Dey of Algiers has declared War against the Bey of Tunis. The same letter adds, that an American squadron was again assembling at Port Mahon, previous to another attack upon Algiers.

We have received papers of Sunday last, they do not contain any domestic news of importance, Spain, in her difficulties, has had recourse to a new plan of finance, which is well calculated to produce a revolution. It consists of her seizure of ecclesiastical Property, and a reduction of benefices to such a point that an income of 20,000 reals (about £223) will be their maximum. The next is a Property Tax; and the third, which is meant to gratify the populace, and array them against the other classes, is the abolition of Custom-Houses in the interior, or what we should call Excise Officers.

The Right Hon. Mr. Manners Sutton was, on the 2d inst. elected Speaker of the House of Commons—Mr. Abbot, the late Speaker, has been elevated to the Peerage, by the title of Lord Colchester.

BOSTON, JULY 5.

PLASTER OF PARIS.

The Act of Congress forbidding the importation in foreign vessels into the United States of Plaster of Paris, will take effect on the 5th July inst. and is to continue in force until the last day of January, 1822, unless the exportation of it from the British provinces in American vessels shall be permit-

ted before that time. All plaster, the produce of New-Brunswick or Nova-Scotia, imported after that date in foreign vessels, will be forfeited, together with the vessel, her tackle and apparel. Orders have been sent to the several Collectors from the Treasury Department, requiring vigilance in enforcing the law, and defeating all attempts to evade it.

PLASTER OF PARIS.

Notwithstanding the Legislature of St. John, New-Brunswick, have prohibited, altogether, after the 1st of July, the exportation of Plaster of Paris from that Province, we are inclined to think from what we see published in the New-Brunswick papers that there is no great probability of there being a scarcity of that article in our market. At present Plaster is not allowed to be brought away in any vessels except British bottoms. In consequence of which, it is stated in the above-mentioned papers, that the town of St. Andrews has become the centre of an American conspiracy to evade the laws of that country, and bring the public authority into contempt: that instead of the inhabitants aiding the revenue officer of that port in detecting and preventing the smuggling of Plaster, all assistance is wholly denied to him; that he dare not go in the night to prevent its being taken away; and even in the day time the smugglers set him and his authority at defiance. His boat has been taken from him and made use of to carry the Plaster off to wharves which the Americans are said to have erected on that Island. From these facts it may be fairly inferred, that in despite of His Majesty's Collector, a tolerable supply of that article is likely to find its way to our parts.

May I beg leave through the medium of your most useful paper, that you would permit me to call upon the attention of the Magistrates, or upon such other Persons who have the conducting of the Market in this place? That such an establishment was much required, and therefore much to be wished for, will readily be admitted by every inhabitant in Frederickton, and is a system that reflects much credit upon its promoters, provided it is acted upon according to the Regulations that have been established: But unless these Regulations are put in force, the advantages to be derived from a public Market becomes null and void, and one of the greatest evils possible, particularly to such Individuals who feel a repugnance to infringe the Laws that have been established for conducting the said Market.

That this inconvenience is every day felt, requires but small trouble to point out; for not a day passes (Sundays excepted) that you can't see Venders and Purchasers, of all sorts of Provisions at the different Landing places about Town: Whereas the conscientious supporters of the established Laws, who will not infringe them, may go to Market morning after morning, without finding any of the most common articles of Food, the article of Fish in particular, which are constantly and openly sold at other places in abundance. The result of which is obvious, for not only the Vender is in part losing his profits by not bringing his produce to Market where he would have more purchasers, but the conscientious Consumer must often go without his Dinner. It therefore appears a paramount duty with the Persons having the direction of the Market, that they should cause some steps to be taken which would remedy this growing evil, as it every day comes to be more severely felt.
