A Proclamation.

WHEREAS by Act of Parliament passed in the Forty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, Power is given to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of this Province, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same...

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the second day of June, in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, and in the fifty-seventh year of His Majesty's Reign.

AT a Special Session of the Peace holden at the County Court House in Fredericton in and for the County of York, on Saturday the 5th day of April, 1817, for the Purpose of regulating the ASSIZE OF BREAD in the Town of Fredericton,

Present,

T. WETMORE, W. F. ODELL, G. CLOPPER, S. AGNEW, H. SMITH, F. P. ROBINSON, T. C. LEE,

Esqrs. Justices.

Ordered that from Wednesday the 9th inst. the ASSIZE OF BREAD be as follows, -viz.

THE Shilling Wheaten Loaf to weigh Two Pounds Four Ounces, and the Shilling Rye Loaf to weigh Three Pounds Six Ounces; and other Loaves in proportion.

ORDERED that for every offence in Baking and Vending any Loaf of Bread under the weight abovementioned, the Person so offending shall pay a fine of ten shillings to be recovered upon conviction, before any one of His Majesty's JUSTICES of the PEACE on the oath of one or more credible witness or witnesses, or view of the Justice and levied by Warrant of Distress and Sale of the Offenders Goods; and when recovered, (after deducting the costs and charges) to be paid into the hands of the overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Fredericton.

ORDERED that the respective Bakers be furnished with a Copy of the above regulations, and that they be published in the Royal Gazette.

ALL Persons are hereby required to desist from digging Sand and Gravel upon the Bank of the River or in any other part of the Public Ground, in and near to Fredericton, or in any other way injuring the same, and also to abstain from erecting Buildings or Fences, or making any other encroachments upon any part of the said Public Grounds; and any person disobeying this order, will be forthwith prosecuted.

POST-OFFICE, FREDERICTON, 14th April, 1817.

The following extract from an Act of Parliament, is published for the information of the FERRYMEN in this Province: - And Notice is hereby given that prosecutions will be commenced against all Persons who shall in future offend against the said Act.

STATUTE made and passed in the 9th year of the Reign of Queen ANN, Chap. 10. Sec. 23.

And for as much as the Post must necessarily cross several Ferries in North America, in which the Ferrymen give great delays, and sometime have endeavored to exact money from them notwithstanding the same have been always free for the Post: Be it therefore enacted by the authority aforesaid, that no Deputy or Agent of such Postmaster General travelling with any mail of Letters shall pay anything for passing or repassing any Ferry within any of the Colonies or Plantations of Her said Majesty in North America aforesaid, but such Ferrymen shall forthwith, within one half hour after demand, convey such Deputy on pain of forfeiting for every such offence, the sum of FIVE POUNDS, to be recovered in any Court of Record within any of the Provinces or Colonies in North America, by bill, plaint, or information, wherein no Essoin, Protraction or Wafer of Law shall be allowed; one moiety thereof to Her Majesty, her Heirs and Successors towards the support of the Government of the said Provinces, and the contingent charges thereof: and the other moiety to the Postmaster General who shall sue and prosecute for the same, together with full costs of Suit.

Letter from Stockholm, March 18.

The Gazette of the 15th contains the following official article: -

Stockholm, March 14.

This article states Lindhorn's denunciation; which, though coming from a source deserving little credit, was, however, too serious not to call for an examination into its truth. It then mentions the address to the Crown Prince, in which he was requested to convey the sentiments of their loyalty to his Majesty. All have kindly requested, that the most energetic measures may be adopted against those whom the law shall find guilty; and all express their horror at those who, in their impotent madness, should attempt to attack a constitution founded on the love of the Swedish people - on their most lively gratitude for services performed - on the national will, expressed by the representatives of the people; and with their approbation, is firmly secured, against all change of sentiment, against all the calculations of faction.

The military deputies were introduced by Count Stedingk, accompanied by Field-marshal Count Essen, who expressed their attachment in the warmest terms.

His Royal Highness, in his answer, said, after thanking them for what they had done - 'What will this weak and contemptible handful of restless men have, who seem to conspire in the dark to disturb the public tranquility? If their plans have been merely against my life, and that of my son, I should not deign to pay any regard to them. I am a soldier, and have long learned to despise life; but they want to shake your fundamental laws, to attack your honour and freedom; therefore, I must rise to defend them. The free choice of the nation has called me to the throne of Sweden: the army knows that I did not seek this honour; but I have justified it, by defending your choice. I thereby, at the same time, defend your rights; and will continue to do, by exerting all the faculties which nature has given me, and which perhaps have procured me some reputation. Truly I did not come among you to gratify a vain pride; for myself I have gained glory enough. The happiness of Sweden is the sole object of my exertions, the sole spring of my actions. I desire freedom for you, I desire your welfare; and, in spite of all the attempts that may be made, I shall succeed in securing to you this most valuable possession to all honest men.' He concludes by telling them if ever he forgets his duty, to turn against him the arms which they now offer for his defence. Attempts have been made to make some of my brethren in arms suspected: far from me be so odious a thought. The brave man can never be perjured: honour and loyalty have their abode under the coat and in the breast of the soldier.

One of the most remarkable speeches of his Royal Highness is that to the Deputation of the Citizens, of which the following are passages: -

For some months loose reports have been circulated in the country: sometimes they said the King was dead, then my son was dying, then my life was in danger: this was done to alarm the country. Some later denunciations have attracted the attention of the police and of the government. Judicial inquiries are instituted; and the criminals or the false informers, will be punished. I could forgive the authors of these reports if they only aimed at my life; but they seek to overturn your liberty, your constitution, your national honour; in short, every thing that is most sacred to the honest citizen.

They have ventured to mix the names of a family which you have excluded from the throne. You know, yourselves, gentlemen, that I did not cause their fate. - When, in the distressed state to which a
