F in the Upter Canada Gazette. YORK, OCTOBER 2. West this week a copy of an Address to the Prince Regent from the Parliament of Lower Canada, in 1815, on the subject of the admission of Americans into the Canadas. The subject requires the most serious attention, and perhaps never more so than at the present moment, when the government of the United States is using with the utmost diligence the leisure afford-Est by peace to provide for the vigorous prosecurion of war, by strengthening and increasing their frontier posts, adding very considerably to their navy, and recently commencing two military roads on the borders of Lower Canada, on which they propose giving great encouragement to settlers, to facilitate the keeping them in repair. The dismantling of their navy, is an argument rather in favor of the above preparations, as they are well aware that they can with the greatest facility equip and man a squadron on this lake, before any men could even commence the voyage from England, after a declaration of war by the States; so that the agreement to dismantle the vessels belonging to both Nations on the Lakes, is evidently much in favor of the Americans.

Prince Edward's Island, Sept. 1. About a week since was stranded on the Bar of New-London harbour in this Island, the brig Harriet, Hanna, master, from Dublin, with passengers, and, it is said, bound to Quebec, and from thence to this Island, to load with timber, out eleven weeks .---They were seven weeks in the Gulph, ar I tempting to get to Quebec, and got as far as Gaspe; previous to that several had died with sickness and famine, from so long passage. All the provisions which the passengers laid in had been exhausted some weeks previous to their arrival at Gaspe, when the master then commenced to make his fortune upon their miseries; by charging them at the most extravagant rate for every pound of bread, and the fresh fish that would be occasionally caught in like manner, not permitting them to catch any themselves. It deserves to be mentioned that Mr. O'Hara, at Gaspe, was a true and generous friend to these poor creatures, by compelling the master to procure a vessel to take forty of them to Quebec-twenty of them, which, Brig John and Robert, Donaldson, Jamaica, balfrom their reduced state, were landed and left in the woods, at Gaspe, and the remaining passengers on board, between fifty and sixty, Mr. O'Hara furnished with three day's provision, allowing them forty-eight hours to get to this Island; and in a measure to increase their sufferit.gs, they were driven ashore at New-London aforesaid, where the inhabitants fulfilled the precepts of the gospel, by feeding and lodging them, and giving them every comfort within their power. It is certainly not in the power of any pen to describe their sufferings---one instance ought to be mentioned, viz: one of the families on board, consisting of husband and wife, with ten children; the father was unable to pay for two of his children, (boys) but upon consideration of the father having paid for all the rest, the master agreed to take the whole family, (the boys in question) --- after sailing from Dublin, and one hundred miles from it, they had occasion to call at a distant port, where the master met with two persons who wished to take passage at £5 each; to accommodate these men, the captain landed the boys, contrary to the most solemn entreaties of their parents, and sailed, leaving the boy's on the wide world. The mother died shortly afterwards, on the passage, with grief and distraction, and one of the children.

Several affidavits having been made respecting the captain's conduct, and sent to his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, and we have no doubt but the captain will be taken care of.
