

any accident, was attacked by the disorder on the 39th day, and on the 40th fell a victim to his exertions in favour of humanity.

The Dublin papers received on Tuesday state, that in consequence of the depredations recently committed on boats conveying provisions by the Grand Canal to Dublin, the Lord Lieutenant has ordered military parties to be stationed at short distances from each other along the whole line, and escorts to accompany the boats.

Late last night despatches were sent from Earl Bathurst's office to Portsmouth, to be forwarded from thence by the Conqueror, 74; Admiral Pamplin, to Sir Hudson Lowe, at St. Helena.

MARCH 14.

French papers to the 11th inform us, that the arrangement of the French Budget in all its financial details has been finally agreed to by a majority of 47. The total expenditure is fixed at less than 1069 millions of francs, about 45 millions sterling. The King is confidently stated to have declared, that the labours of the Chambers are approaching to their determination.

We are assured that Lord Beresford is on his way to Paris, to concert with the Duke of Wellington the measures which he is to take in the present posture of affairs between the Spanish and Portuguese Governments. Whether the difference relates merely to the question of the delivering up of Olivenza, or of the expedition of Monte Video, we do not know; but it is evident that an alarm is taken by the Portuguese Ministry—and, that, as we have stated, all British Officers attached to Portuguese Corps have actually taken their departure to join the army. It is supposed that Lord Beresford will return by London.

A military negotiation has been opened between the Courts of Brussels and the Thulleries. It is wished to incorporate with the kingdom of the Netherlands the village of La Montague d'Halluin, a position which commands Menin and the environs, and which is necessarily to place the new fortifications in a respectable state of defence.

The States of Wirtemberg were opened on the 3d inst. at Stuttgart, by the King in person, when the project of the new Constitution was presented to that Body.

Accounts to the end of August, of a very disheartening nature to the Royalist cause, has been received from Mexico, by a commercial house at Cadiz. These advices state, that the audacity of the Insurgents daily increases. On August 9, they had carried an important post occupied by 300 infantry, 100 of the Dragons of Mexico, and defended with four pieces of cannon.

There are said to be more powers of Attorney ordered from the Bank of England at this time for the sale of Stock than ever was remembered at any former period.

MARCH 19.

The Spanish Government has again issued a decree, enlarging the time allowed to holders of foreign cotton goods to sell them. They are now allowed the whole of the present year. Those goods which they wish to export must pay a duty of six per cent; but all the goods unsold or unexported at the end of the year, are to be placed at the disposal of Government.

Sir Sydney Smith is said to have received advices at Paris that two Swedish ships, bound to Marseilles, have been taken in the Mediterranean by the row-galleys of the Algerines, and the crews sent into slavery.

MARCH 21.

Paris papers to the 18th have been received: their vacancy of news we must endeavour to supply by private intelligence. The more important laws have all passed the Chamber of Deputies; and, therefore, without any specific announcement of the event, the approaching close of the session might be confidently expected. The only laws that remain for discussion are not laws of policy, but simply of regulation and detail. The House of Peers has only to pass the bills which it has received from the Deputies. In the interval, therefore, between the present and the ensuing session, the new elections for 1817 will take place, and the session of the current year, it is thought, commence soon; so that all the business belonging to it may be transacted without trenching upon the year 1818.

Libels of what is called the revolutionary party are said to be still circulated with great

zeal, both in print and manuscript; and these are chiefly directed against the Princes. The folly and injustice of this is obvious; for if the King, in the plenitude of his power, has chosen a Ministry chiefly out of those who have been enemies to his house, surely this is the time for that Ministry and its adherents to soften animosities by their temper, and to display their love to their royal master, by treating the other branches of the family with kindness and respect; and to apply, generally, the high powers of office to the cultivation of peace and unanimity.

Melancholy Event.—We have to state a melancholy event which happened on board the Steam-boat Powhatan, Captain Shuster on Saturday last about 10 or 11 o'clock. The fuel failing, the boat stopt near Wilton about 6 miles below this city to take a fresh supply of wood. On these occasions, it was the custom for the engineer to open the safety-valve to let the steam escape, and prevent its accumulation. But unfortunately, the valve was not opened in time on this occasion; one of the engineers being engaged about the fuel, and the other failing to lift the valve in time. The consequence was, that the steam rose to 11 or 12 inches, instead of its usual height of 9 inches; and the condensation of it became too great for the strength of the boiler, on the right side of the boat.

This boiler burst with a sudden and loud noise, towards the top, and one of the firmen who was below, almost immediately expired; whether scalded to death, or struck by some fragment, seems not to have been ascertained; one of the engineers had his face slightly grazed, and one of his feet slightly scalded. No other accident happened to any of the other crew or any of the passengers. The boat was towed up to Rockett's on the same day.

Both the boilers of the boat were made of copper—and it was certainly nothing but the want of the necessary precaution in raising the safety-valve in time, that occasioned the melancholy catastrophe.

We are told the remaining boiler is not sufficiently strong to work the boat.

This was the second trip which the Powhatan was making from Norfolk to this city for the last three months. During all that time, she has been at Norfolk undergoing considerable repairs; and now when she had started again in full and complete order, she is arrested on her 2d trip by this distressing occurrence.

The Bill for the prevention of Seditious Meetings, passed the House of Lords on the 25th March, by a majority of 111 to 23.

Extract of a letter dated, Ship Kirk Elba, off Calcutta, 15th Oct. Great alarm has been occasioned, by information said to be received that the Archduke Constantine has entered Persia at the head of 100,000 Russians. The ostensible motive is to acquire possession of their ancient province of Georgia; a project for which only 3 or 4000 men would be necessary.—London paper.
