LONDON, SEPTEMBER 20.

For Spanish America.

A morning paper states, "that there is at this moment lying in the river, a ship of nearly 500 tons burthen, regularly chartered to convey a body of disciplined troops actually listed, to fight under the banners of the independents. On board of the vessel there are at present about 300 men, commissioned, non-commissioned officers and privates, of whom the greater part have been in actual service, and are the subjects of Great-Britain. The commander is a Colonel C ----, who is provided with every necessary for the immediate execution of military operations against the Spanish government. The Ship sails in the first instance to St. Thomas's, from whence she will proceed to such part of the Spanish American continent as may require the active service of the troops."

One of the most striking eircumstances in these reports is, the great increase of the revenue within the last 20 years. In 1797, the revenue was £26.820.629 135. 43d. In 1816, it was £73,022,675 16s. 11 4d. being nearly threefold.

LIVERPOOL, OCTOBER 3. The French papers are entirly filled with details of the progress of the election of deputies for the department of the Seine. It is asserted positively, in letters frem

Rio Janeiro, that there is no intention whatever on the part of the King of Portugal to revisit his native country; but some alterations are to be immediately adopted, on account of the inconvenience of the situation of Rio Janeiro as a Royal Court. The Capital is to be removed to St. Paulo; where there is already a small palace for the accommodation of the family. The town is in the Captainship of St. Vincente, and is immediately south of the Captainship of Rio Janeiro. It is, however, stated, that the Prince Royal of Portugal is likely to return to Europe, to undertake the important duties of Viceroy, and to hold his Court for that purpose at Lisbon.

FRANCE .-- The approaching elections have awkened in this unhappy country all the spirit and activity of the factions which divide it. The royalists have long complained, not merely of their neglect, but of their discountenance by the ministry; and the latter, either from secret treachery or from views of policy, have cast so many oglings and glances of invitation upon the republicans and Bonapartists, that they are duped in their turn, and find that they warm this party into so much life and energy by their caressess, that they are outdone in the elections, and are likely to have to contend with a chamber composed of the most violent refuse of the republican and levelling faction. In this dilemma of the ministry the royalists appear secretly to rejoice through their resentment, though they know well enough, that it will plunge them and the throne in new difficulties. The most, however, we can learn from these disputes of the physicians, is, that the patient is in a very bad case. They argue moral disorders of the deepest kind, and they prognosticate mischief.

London, Sept. 1. The King's Health .-- Yesterday the following Bulletin was exhibited at St. James's Palace, of the state of the King's Health ; --

Windsor Castle, Sept. 6. " His Majesty has passed the month in a very tranquil and comfortable state. H Majesty's disorder continues unaltered; but His Majesty's health is good."

Extract of a Letter from Sydney, dated October 25th, 1817.

" SIR,

"The wreck of a vessel has been discovered within a few days past at Cape North in this Island, she struck against the most perpendicular part of the Cape called the Sugar loaf, and must have sunk immediately with all her crew, Parts of the vessel have come on shore, the end of the fore-yard was above water, from the size of which, together with other parts, it must be a vessel of 150 tons and lost about a month since. I beg you will have the goodness to insert this in your paper in the hope that it may be some inducement to Government to erect a Light House on St. Paul's Island, as there are seldom less than four or five square-rigged vessels cast away yearly about the Cape that we hear of; how many share the fate of this unfortunate vessel and are never discovered I cannot say."
