

LONDON, APRIL 22.

We have extracted from a Brussels Paper an article, purporting to come from Vienna, and entering into a discussion of the relations of the European Powers with Turkey. The object of it is to shew, that both Turkey and Russia are arming; that a misunderstanding subsists between the two powers, which is not to be adjusted unless some sacrifices are made by Turkey. These sacrifices are, not any territory, which Turkey has conquered from Russia, but territory which Russia had conquered from Turkey, but which she consented to restore, in order that she might be able to employ her whole force against Bonaparte. A more unjust motive for the renewal of war could not have been imagined. For what was the conduct of the Porte at the moment of Russia's trial and agony? She desired only the restitution of her own territories, resisting all the overtures of Bonaparte to continue the war, and thus divide the force and attention of the Russian troops. She merely desired to have that which belonged to her restored. To have that restoration brought against her as a motive for a new war would be very much according to the principles of Bonaparte, that is, totally against every principle of honour, justice, and good faith.

PARIS, APRIL 18.

"The amelioration of the King's health is so rapid and confirmed, that it is already announced he will hear Mass on Sunday next in the Chapel of the Thuilleries, and will resume his accustomed promenades. (The news then contained in your Paper of the 12th inst. is incorrect."

The Princess Charlotte is said to be in a situation which must gratify the Nation at large, and give an additional security to the House of Brunswick.

It is said that the Marquis of Huntly is to be appointed Governor of the Cape of Good Hope, in the room of Lord Charles Somerset, who goes to India.

A NEW COMET.—MIDWOLDA, APRIL 13.—Yesterday evening, about 15 minutes past ten o'clock, a Comet was seen in the West, but on account of the dark clouds it was not visible above three minutes. Its lights outshone the other stars, so that it was not easy to determine precisely in what constellation it appeared; however it was in or near Gemini.

IT is with much concern that The COMMANDER OF THE FORCES announces, that with a view to carry into effect the further Reductions in the Military Establishment of this Country, which His Majesty's Government have thought it necessary to Order, His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT'S Commands have been received by His Excellency for the immediate Reduction of the 104th Regiment.

The merits of this Corps have been sufficiently proved by the Credit which it acquired in every situation of Actual Service in which it was placed during the late War, nor has its invariable Regularity and good Conduct in Quarters been less marked than its behaviour in the Field.

Composed (almost wholly) of the Natives of all the British American Colonies, and combining the advantages of a Regular Regiment of the Line with those peculiar to Local Corps, the 104th Regiment may be regarded as an interesting Experiment, the Success of which has been completely established by the concurring Testimony of every General Officer under whom it has served.

The Commander of the Forces desires that this Order may be read to the 104th Regiment previous to its Reduction, and that Lieutenant Colonel MOODIE, the Officers, Non-Commissioned officers and Men of the Corps will accept his best Wishes for their Individual Welfare.

A Proclamation.

WHEREAS by Act of Parliament passed in the Forty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, Power is given to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of this Province, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same—I have therefore thought fit with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council to publish this Proclamation, hereby authorising and empowering British Subjects for the space of three months from the date hereof, to import and bring into this Province from the United States of America, in British built ships or vessels owned and navigated according to Law; Scantling, Plank, Staves, Heading-Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley or Grain of any sort; and British Subjects during the same period, are hereby authorized and empowered to export in British ships owned and navigated as aforesaid, all or any of the said herein before enumerated articles, to any other of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations.

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the second day of June, in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, and in the fifty-seventh year of His Majesty's Reign.
