

about Penn River, and on the following day we heard of their appearance at Callian and Bewndy. Some of the inhabitants of a village above Salsette, brought in a horse belonging to one of the Pindaries. On the 29th, a body of these Freebooters had come to plunder the village on the Marhatta shore opposite to Tannab, and were chasing the poor inhabitants down to the river's edge. One of the horsemen ventured too far, and his horse was swamped in the mud, and he was obliged to abandon the animal; some of the Selsette people afterwards went over and extricated the horse and brought him to the Magistrate. Numerous Marhatta families have, within these few days past, sought for refuge in the Islands of Caronja and Salsette; and we heartily congratulate those of our friends who have been accustomed, at this season of the year, to take up their residence in various parts of the Deckan, that a propitious destiny should have led them to relinquish the practice this year, otherwise they must have inevitably fallen sacrifices to the sanguinary dispositions of these plunderers.

We learn that the principal object of the Pindaries, in entering the Concan, was to seize a large quantity of Kinco (Silks) which was a few days ago exported from Bombay to Chowul for the interior. This we understand they got hold of in Chowul district, carrying it afterwards successfully off. Two of their men were, however, wounded and taken prisoners by the Marhattas. They say that these marauders, who have thus been plundering, were sent down by Tambuckjee and that it is their intention to sweep the coast as far as Surat.

If this statement be correct, we trust the vigilance of the police will be directed to the object of endeavoring to trace any of the emissaries of the Pindaries, who may be of this island, unquestionably for the purpose of giving information of the course of consignments of goods leaving this port.

OUR FOREIGN RELATIONS.

It is with much gratification that we are enabled to state, upon the highest authority, that our relations with foreign powers generally, were never upon a more favorable and amicable footing. The strongest manifestations of friendship and expressions of a sincere desire for a perfect reciprocity in commercial and other affairs, we have substantial reason to believe, have been received by our government, through the medium of our public functionaries, from the emperor of Russia, the Regent of England, the king of France, and other powers of Europe. We shall not be surprised should we soon experience such a modification in British edicts, as to allow us a FREE and UNRESTRICTED PARTICIPATION in her WEST-INDIA TRADE.

The Administration of Mr. Monroe certainly commences under auspices the most pleasing and favorable; and it is devoutly to be hoped, that its issue may be as honorable to him, and as glorious and beneficial to the nation, as its objects are just and sacred.

NEW-YORK, JUNE 18.

Arrived ship Milwood, Bailey, Isle of May, 27 days. Capt. B. informs, that most of the Salt Ponds in the Cape de Verdes had recently been inundated and nearly destroyed.

Latest from Cadiz.—Capt. Williams, of the brig Nyph, 37 days from Cadiz, informs, that a fleet, with troops on board, had sailed from that place for South America, under convoy of a frigate and two sloops of war.

It was reported at Cadiz, that the inhabitants of Barcelona were in a state of rebellion; that Gen. Lacy had been assassinated, and that the mob had emasculated all the troops at that place.

NORFOLK, JUNE 11.

risen and driven off the Prince Regent; both vessels passing very rapidly, Capt. W. was unable to hear the particulars.

CHARLESTON, JUNE 6.

Capt. Raeburn, arrived on Wednesday from Barbadoes, informs that just before his sailing, several Transports had arrived there with troops from England.

ST. JOHN, JULY 5.

A New mode of Borrowing Money!

A circumstance, having in its tendency, a crime of a most heinous nature, has excited the attention of the public during the last week, the particulars of which, so far as have come to our knowledge, are as follows:—

On Monday the 23d ult. in the evening, Mr. JOSIAH HUGHSON, of this City, received an anonymous letter requesting him to deposit one hundred pounds (which was to be chiefly in gold) in a hogshead of sand standing in the Market-square on the following evening at 9 o'Clock, which the writer said he would repay with interest in three months—at same time adding that he had obtained money in like manner before, and punctually repaid the same, and that in case he failed to comply with the request, his life should pay the forfeit. Mr. H. went to the place appointed, and feigned to deposit a bag, as directed; on leaving the place, a man was observed to go to the hogshead, and retire on Mr. H.'s approach to meet him. On the evening of the 25th, Mr. H. received a second letter, informing him of the disappointment of the writer in not finding the money, and threatened with the most horrid imprecations, that unless the £100 was deposited in the cleft of a rock in the graveyard, Portland Parish, at 11 o'Clock the next day, he would certainly put his threats in execution.—Thither Mr. H. went, accompanied by a friend, and saw the place as minutely described in the letter, for the deposit of the money. On Thursday morning last, a third letter was put into the Store door of Mr. HUGHSON, stating, that it was useless for the writer to confirm his assertions by an oath; but that the above-mentioned sum must be left in a small cavity of a stone fence at the North end of the City. Necessary precautions were immediately taken for the discovery of those atrocious villains, by several persons secreting themselves in the vicinity of the place of deposit. Mr. H. then went, and once more feigned to deposit the money—and in a short time after a laboring man, named John Gallagher, came and searched for the treasure; after which he was joined by a Nathan Harper, (who lately kept a grog shop in Coopers' Alley,) with whom he entered into close conversation; when they were both seized, and brought before the Recorder, &c. and examined; and were again brought up yesterday for a second examination, the result of which has not as yet been particularly ascertained. They were, however, committed to the House of Correction for one month.

In the first letter Mr. H. is informed that the hand was counterfeited, therefore it would be vain for him to attempt to find it out.

On the same morning, a Mr. SMITH, Hairdresser, received a polite note, informing him, that as he had interested himself very much in Mr. HUGHSON'S favor, he must deposit ten guineas in a certain described place, or take the consequences.
