WHEREAS by Act of Parliament passed in the Forty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, Power is given to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of this Province, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same...

POST-OFFICE, FREDERICTON, 24th April, 1817.

The following extract from an Act of Parliament, is published for the information of the FERRYMEN in this Province:—And Notice is hereby given that prosecutions will be commenced against all Persons who shall in future offend against the said Act.

ANDREW PHAIR, Postmaster. STATUTE made and passed in the 9th year of the Reign of Queen ANN, Chap. 10. Sec. 29. "And for as much as the Post must necessarily cross several ferries in North America, in which the Ferry-men give great delays, and sometime have endeavored to exact money from them notwithstanding the same have been always free for the Post: Be it therefore enacted by the authority aforesaid, that no Deputy or Agent of such Postmaster General traveling with any mail of Letters shall pay any thing for passing or re-passing any Ferry within any of the Colonies or Plantations of Her said Majesty in North America aforesaid, but such Ferry-men shall forthwith, within one half hour after demand, convey such Deputy out pain of forfeiting for every such offence, the sum of FIVE POUNDS, to be recovered in any Court of Record within any of the Provinces or Colonies in North America, by bill, plaint, or information, wherein no Estreat, Protection, or Writ of Law shall be allowed; one to wit, the cost to Her Majesty, her Heirs and Successors towards the support of the Government of the said Provinces, and the contingent charges thereof: and the other moiety to the Postmaster General who shall sue and prosecute for the same, together with full costs of Suit."

Regulations respecting the granting of Licences to cut Pine Timber.

NO Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Land reserved for the use of the Crown.

LICENCES to be granted only to British subjects, with condition to be forfeited if assigned to Aliens, and every Licence to specify the quantity to be cut, and to be limited as to time; and no Timber fit for the Navy to be permitted to be cut for private use.

No Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Lands for which application has been made for Grants, and every applicant for a Licence, to describe particularly the Land on which he wishes to cut, and the quantity of Timber, and accompany his application with a Certificate, that the Land has not been applied for to be granted;

ALL applications for Licences to be handed in the first place to the Deputy Surveyor of the Woods, who, if he thinks fit to recommend the application, will lodge it in the Secretary's Office, to be laid, in the usual manner, before a Committee of His Majesty's Council for consideration; and any three Members of the Council to be a Committee for the purpose of considering the applications in question.

AT a Special Session of the Peace holden at the County Court House in Fredericton in and for the County of York, on Wednesday the 6th of August, 1817, for the Purpose of regulating the ASSIZE of BREAD in the Town of Fredericton,

Ordered that from and after Saturday the 9th inst. the ASSIZE of BREAD be as follows:—viz.

THE Shilling Wheaten Loaf to weigh Two Pounds Twelve Ounces, and the Shilling Rye Loaf to weigh Four Pounds and other Loaves in proportion.

ORDERED that for every offence in Baking and Vending any Loaf of Bread under the weight abovementioned, the Person so offending shall pay a fine of ten shillings to be recovered upon conviction, before any one of His Majesty's JUSTICES of the PEACE on the oath of one or more credible witness or witnesses, or view of the Justice and levied by Warrant of Distress and Sale of the Offenders Goods; and when recovered, (after deducting the costs and charges) to be paid into the hands of the overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Fredericton.

ORDERED that the respective Bakers be furnished with a Copy of the above regulations, and that they be published in the Royal Gazette.

LONDON, SEPT. 27.

The Moniteur received yesterday communicates official notice of new changes in the French Cabinet. The Duke de Feltré is superseded in the Ministry of War by Marshal Gouvion St. Cyr; and M. Mole is appointed to the Ministry of Marine, lately held by the Viscount Dubouchage. So far as these changes relate only to the personal interests of the former and present Ministers, they are doubtless very immaterial to us; but it is not so, when they are considered as indicating the policy which prevails in the French Councils. If Lord Liverpool were removed, to make place for Sir Francis Burdett, the dullest Jacobin in France would be sensible that revolutionary ideas had gained a vast triumph. We have indeed often stated, that so long as the Army of Occupation remains entire, so long as we exact a strict payment of the contribution due to us, so long we may look with contempt on the predominance of revolutionary interests in France; but to know whether they do predominate, or not, is very important; and of that fact we have an indubitable criterion in the nominations which are made to chief offices of State. It is most remarkable, yet it is unfortunately too true, that if a man has distinguished himself by peculiar fidelity to the King, if he has shed his blood and sacrificed his fortune in his service, if he has endured exile, imprisonment, the loss of parents, of children, of friends, of relations, that man is sure to be persecuted, to be excluded from office, to be calumniated, perhaps to be assassinated: and in fact there is no one such person, no not one, at the present moment, admitted to a share in the French Government. On the contrary, with the exception of the Duke de RICHELIEU, (a mere man of straw) every member of the cabinet of Louis XVIII was in office under Bonaparte! They are as follows:—

- GOUVION ST. CYR, a Marshal under Bonaparte
PASQUIER, a Prefect of Police under Bonaparte
CAZE, a Clerk to the mother of Bonaparte.
LAINE, a member of the Legislative Body under Bonaparte.
MOLE, a Director of roads and bridges under Bonaparte.
CORVETTO, (a Genoese) Counsellor of State under Bonaparte.

This is what The Courier calls "the wisdom of avoiding extremes." Strange! that the only men in France who do not run into extremes, are those who were brought up in the school of Bonaparte! Strange, that Bonaparte should have possessed the secret of forming the best, the only trust-worthy servants for Louis XVIII! Now, really, is not this an insult on common sense? Is it not the same, or even a stronger case, than if any one were to say that the best possible supporters of Mr. Pitt's principles, the only men to carry his measures in effect were Lord Holland and Lord Grey? The French Ministers whom we have named are certainly not to be ranked with Robespierre, or Fouché. They never presided at massacre, or plundered churches; but they are all more or less revolutionary, they all admire the Revolution, and consider that to have been a benefit to mankind, which we consider to be the curse and disgrace of the age. They swear, indeed, that they will be faithful and bear true allegiance to King Louis XVIII; and if it were the first protestation they had made, the first oath they had taken, we might suppose that they were more in earnest than Ney was when he swore to bring Bonaparte to Paris in an iron cage; but as they have all equally sworn allegiance to Bonaparte, we know not on which side their oaths are the more sacred. We must therefore judge them by a different test, by the measures they have adopted, and by the
