

The Moniteur received yesterday communicates official notice of new changes in the French Cabinet. The Duke de Feltre is superseded in the Ministry of War by Marshal Gouvion St. Cyr: and M. Mole is appointed to the Ministry of Marine, lately held by the Viscount Dubouchage. So far as these changes relate only to the personal interests of the former and present Ministers, they are doubtless very immaterial to us; but it is not so, when they are considered as indicating the policy which prevails in the French Councils. If Lord Liverpool were removed, to make place for Sir Francis Burdett, the dullest Jacobin in France would be sensible that revolutionary ideas had gained a vast triumph. We have indeed often stated, that so long as the Army of Occupation remains entire, so long as we exact a strict payment of the contribution due to us, so long we may look with contempt on the predominance of revolutionary interests in France; but to know whether they do predominate, or not, is very charge his said debt or debts within three important ; and of that fact we have an indubitable criterion in the nominations which are made to chief offices of State. THEREAS by Act of Parliament passed in the Forty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, Power is given to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of this Province, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated. articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same --- I have therefore thought fit with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Conneil to publish this Proclamation, hereby authonsing and empowering British Subjects for the space of Jix months from the date hereof, to import and bring into this Province from the United States of America, in British built ships or vessels owned and navigated according to Law; Scantling, Plank, Staves, Heading-Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort ; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, E Live Stock of any sort ; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Cas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley or Grain of any sort; and British Subjects during the same period, are hereby authorized and empowered to export in British ships owned and navigated as aforesaid, all or any of the said herein before enumerated articles, to any other of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations.
