

Serrihaem, and which were actually delivered at the port of Rio Formoso, under the protection of the corvette Mercurio; an act by which these people have acquired a right to the esteem and applause of the whole world. The following is a letter received by the commandants, from the Judge of Orphans of the above named town; a letter whose truly Portuguese style attests the existence of the grandsons of the heroes of Pernambuco, and consequently promises the speedy punishment of the rebels.

Copy of a letter to the chief of the blockading squadron of Pernambuco.

"On this occasion the people of Serrihaem seek of your Excellency all the assistance, armament and ammunition, as well as a skilful officer and some men if possible, to defend the crown of our sovereign, seeing we are already to shed the last drop of our blood for him. The bearer of this can, if it be the wish of your Excellency, point out the place where the disembarkation ought to be made, which is in the harbor of Rio Formoso, where all the people will be found with arms open to receive them, and equally ready to receive the orders of your Excellency, given in the name of the same Sovereign. We have made choice of this place, which we are fortifying, to cut off all communication and correspondence which might be had with the troops that have marched against Lagoas, the number of which is very small. We hope from your Excellency all the assistance that is in your power to give, for the service of our Sovereign. God preserve your Excellency many years.

BAHI, May 2.---From the commandant of the blockading squadron, we learn that the proclamations issued against Pernambuco by our governor, have made a serious impression upon the rebels. If the blockade from Bahi had not come so promptly, the rebels would have received a great quantity of arms, powder and provisions from Recife.

By the last intelligence from Paraguay it appears that Major Gordilbo, commandant of the Partizans, marched on the 21st upon Porto das Pedras.

MAY 3.---The English vessels Island and Lion have arrived at this port, having been ordered off from Pernambuco by Rufino Pares Baptista, commandant of the blockading squadron, and from them we learn that the soldiers of Bahi are stationed on the whole coast of Pernambuco.

MAY 6.---By a ship which arrived during the week past from Rio Janeiro, we learn that they are laboring with the greatest activity in fitting out land troops to go against Pernambuco. This same ship reports that she spoke a privateer a few days after she sailed, of very large force, but she did not show any hostile disposition, and did not give any information of her destination. An abundance of provisions has gone from that port for Lagoas and other places where our troops are stationed, to whom all the faithful inhabitants are united, and to them also they have been compelled to furnish arms and provisions, which is the cause why our soldiers have been for a short time on half rations of flour. This has been immediately succeeded by the zealous care which the government has given to this important matter. We judge that by the present moment, Marshal Mello, who separated from Penedo, will have formed a junction with Major Gordilbo, who is stationed at Una. The people of Rio Formoso have already taken up arms against the rebels, who seem only to attempt to defend Recife and Olinda, where already parties are suspected against them.

The following order of the day has been published here during the past week;

By the Royal Order of the 9th of this month, it has been communicated to me by the proper Secretary of State, that his Majesty the King, our Lord, has well approved all the measures lately adopted by this government, relative to the events that have taken place at Pernambuco; his august Majesty deigning to pronounce, in a manner the most honourable to us all, his most perfect confidence in his faithful subjects of Bahi. This I conceive it to be my duty in this manner to make known to all the military, and the individuals whom I have the inestimable fortune to govern.

COUNT OF ARCOS.

Bahi, April 30, 1817.---On Saturday the 4th inst. there entered this port the Portuguese brig Vigilant, and the English ship

Eliza, which attempted to enter Pernambuco, being ordered off by the Commandant of the blockade Rufino Perez Baptista, and by them the information is confirmed that the Portuguese flag is flying along the whole extent of the coast of this province. [Here follows a communication signed by several military officers of Tamandare, which seems to be a small post near Pernambuco, dated April 21, in which they offer their services to the commanding officer of the blockading squadron of Pernambuco, anchored in the harbour of Recife.]

BAHI, April 25.---From information which we have received here from the South, we learn that the people of Monte Video are very well contented with the new Portuguese government, and have the greatest honor for Artigas and his troops.---The indefatigable Lecor has restored tranquillity to the country which had formerly been disturbed by parties of highwaymen. [The latest date in these papers from Monte Video is March 6.]

DIED] At Halifax on Tuesday the 1st instant, after a lingering illness, Mrs. AMELIA SMYTH, Lady of the Lieutenant-Governor of this Province. Her remains were interred on the Tuesday following.

St. John, July 12.

ACCIDENT.---Last week a shocking and unusual, perhaps unequalled accident, took place on board the ship Herald from London.---A Seaman, in the Act of unbending the foretopsail, fell from the yard and struck the deck with great violence; one of his legs fell across a beam, in which wooden pins are fixed for belaying sheets, one of which penetrated, and came through the whole substance of the thigh, three inches above the knee, carrying with it a great portion of the integuments without a great hemorrhage. On examination by D. W. H. SMITH, it was discovered that two distinct fractures were made, a transverse one on the superior part of the os femoris, and the other on the inferior part, three inches above the wound mentioned; the left thigh bone was also fractured in two similar places with considerable laceration, the whole presenting a dreadful and mutilated object of human misery. The unfortunate man is as comfortable as the case will admit, and justly claims a share of public commiseration.

LONDON, MAY 12.

Not less than 20,000 stand of arms have been already shipped off for Portugal. The last letters from Lisbon state, that the King of Portugal had lately drawn on the Regency, from the Brazils, for the sum of £60,000 which they refused to pay.

Every intelligence from Turkey confirms the report of its warlike preparations, but affords no certain information of their object. On the one hand it is said the Porte has views on Persia; while, on the other, it is affirmed, and with perhaps more truth, that certain recent demonstrations on the part of the Christian Powers have excited apprehensions at the Ottoman Court which makes it desirous to present as imposing an attitude as possible to its imagined foes.

A Paris letter says "a considerable movement of Austrian troops is making towards Rome; and a report has been received that the Pope has quitted his capital."
