New-Brunswick Legislature

Extracts from the Journals of the House of Assembly.

SATURDAY 15TH FEBRUARY.

Read a second time "A Bill to prevent the exportation of Provisions out of this Province for a limited time."

Ordered that the Bill be now committed.

Mr. P. Fraser took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Fraser from the Committee, reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill and made several amendments thereunto; which he delivered in at the Clerk's Table, where the same were read.

Ordered that the report be accepted, and that the Bill with the amendments, be engrossed.

The House, according to the order of the day, resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, upon the report of the Committee appointed to enquire into the necessities of the Inhabitants of the Province, occasioned by the failure of the last crop.

Mr. Mackay took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Mackay from the Committee reported, that they had gone into consideration of the business to them referred, had made progress therein: and that the Committee had directed him to move for leave to sit again on the consideration of the same; which report the House agreed to.

Read an engrossed Bill "to prohibit the exportation of Corn, Meal, Flour and Potatoes, out of this Province for a limited time."

Resolved that the Bill pass.

Ordered that Mr. Ward, and Mr. Smith, carry the Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence to the same.

Mr. Humbert presented a petition of sundry inhabitants, owners of Land, in the neighbourhood of Loch Lomond, in the County of Saint John, praying aid towards opening the communication between Frog-Pond and the lower end of the French Lake.

Ordered that the Petition be received and referred to the Committee appointed for the purpose of ascertaining what sums are

wanted for the Bye-Roads and Bridges in the several Counties in this Province.

Mr. Mackay moved for leave to bring in "A Bill in amendment of an Act for regulating, laying out, and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways within the several Towns and Parishes in this Province."

Leave was granted.

Mr. Allen moved for leave to bring in "A Bill to amend and explain an Act, intitled An Act to impose a duty on Horses, Horned Cattle and Sheep, imported into this Province from the United States."

Leave was granted.

Read a first time "A Bill to regulate the Grand Manan Fishery."

Mr. Simonds moved for leave to bring in "A Bill to alter and amend an Act intitled, an Act for the more easy and speedy recovery of small debts."

Leave was granted.

Mr. Humbert moved for leave, to bring in "A Bill in addition to and amendment of an Act intitled an Act against the profanation of the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday."

Leave was granted.

Mr. Wetmore moved for leave to bring in "A Bill to alter and amend an Act intitled, an Act to encourage the establishment of Schools." Passed the 10th March, 1816.

Leave was granted.

Mr. Agnew moved for leave to bring in "A Bill to prevent cruelty to Animals."

Leave was granted.

Mr. Millidge presented a petition of sundry Proprietors of Lands at Red Head, in the County of Saint John, praying aid towards improving the road between that place and the city of Saint John.

Ordered, that the Petition be received and referred to the Committee appointed for the purpose of ascertaining what sums are wanted for the Bye-Roads and Bridges in the several Counties in this Province.

Mr. P. Fraser presented a Petition of two of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Fredericton, praying aid for the support of the Poor thereof.

Ordered that the Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.
