that carrify the convention with General Gilly. He stated that he should lose his head if he disobeyed new orders he had received from Bonaparte, yet was unwilling to have his name among the list of persons disaffected to the royal cause. After the evidence had been read, the son of the accused, in the uniform of a Colonel of Chasseurs, decorated with the Croix de St. Louis, also that of the Legion of Honour, requested permission to speak in his father's behalf. "Gentlemen," said he, "I come to discharge the most sacred of duries. A son begs, in the abscence of his father, that he may for a moment raise his voice under doleful circumstances. I do not wish to offer a legal defence-I confine myself to objections, founded on the law, acknowledged by the most able lawyers; which seem to leave no doubt respecting the incompetency of a Council of War to try a First Inspector General, to whom the Royal Ordonnances have given all the rights and prerogatives attached to the title of Grand Officer of State, which my father bore. I shall not condescend to justify him against the false and injurious charges you have heard. Unfortunate and absent, how can he repel the shafis of hatred? But of all these calumnies none raises my indignation so much as to attempt to tarnish his character. They have dared to state, that he expected to obtain the rank of Marshal for services during the hundred days he remained in the South. It is notorious, and easy of proof," that my faiher did not quit Paris before the 1st of Aprilthat he never drew a sword in what they have termed a campaign, and that his presence in the South had no other effect than that of preventing civil war and the distresses of Fiance." The young Colonel also retraced all the military services of his father up to the battle of Waterloo, and stated that he had received twenty-one wounds in defence of the Government of his country. The Council retired to deliberate upon the objection to their competency, and at half-past four o'clock declared itself incompetent, under the existing laws, to try the accused.

At a time like the present, when the Farmer is almost discouraged by the late unfavorable Season, with which it has pleased Divine Providence to visit this in common with so many other Countries, we observe with particular satisfaction the notice you have taken of the important object of Agriculture, the surest source of permanent benefit to every Country, and will not fail to give it our serious attention. Having been, with you Sir, inhabitants of the Province since its first formation, we participate in feelings of solicitude for its welfare, and beg you to accept our thanks for your expressions of anxiety for its prosperity.


