WHEREAS the GENERAL ASSEMBLY of this Province, stands prorogued to the second Tuesday of this instant, December, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the first Tuesday in February next ensuing, then to meet at Fredericton for the dispatch of business.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the sixth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, and in the fifty-seventh year of His Majesty's Reign.

A Proclamation.

WHEREAS by Act of Parliament passed in the Forty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, Power is given to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of this Province, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same; I have therefore thought fit with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council to publish this Proclamation, hereby authorizing and empowering British Subjects for the space of six months from the date hereof, to import and bring into this Province from the United States of America, in British built ships or vessels owned and navigated according to Law; Scantling, Plank, Staves, Heading-boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley or Grain of any sort; and British Subjects during the same period, are hereby authorized and empowered to export in British ships owned and navigated as aforesaid, all or any of the said herein before enumerated articles, to any other of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations.

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returned home to his father, who again put the former question to him, to which the son answered in the affirmative. He then informed his son that there was a culprit in gaol for steeling a horse and that there was sufficient evidence to prove it against him. Now, says the father, if you can clear him, you may tarry at home; but if you do not, you must return to London, and stay another year. The son replied that he could, and would do it for half a crown. He accordingly went to the gaol to see the prisoner, and asked him if he stole the horse? To which he replied that he did actually steal him, and there was sufficient evidence to prove it against him. He then told him that for half a crown he would clear him. The prisoner said he would freely give him all lie was worth to be acquitted, but he saw no chance to save his neck from the halter. He then asked the prisoner to give him the age, colour, and marks of the horse he had stolen; and said take particular notice of me, that you may know me when you see me again; for on the day of your trial, I shall be seated not far from the judge, in a posture of sleep; and when you are arraigned at the bar, you must plead *not guilty*. When you are questioned how you came by the horse, you must point to me, and tell them you bought him of me.

Accordingly, when the prisoner appeared at the bar, he was asked the usual question--and he replied *not guilty*.--He was then questioned how he came by the horse? He informed them that he bought him of that gentleman (pointing to the young lawyer, supposed to be asleep.) One of the judges gave him a jog, and roused him up, and asked him if he heard what the villain said? The lawyer asked him what it was? He says he bought the horse of you, (replied the judge.) Very likely he did, (said the lawyer) and took a paper from his pocket, containing the identical description of the horse in question.

When he informed them that he positively sold the horse to the prisoner, he was asked how he came by him? I can very easily tell you gentlemen--My father keeps a largestall of sheep, and every night there would be some stole from his flock. I accordingly took four of his servants one evening, and went on watch. We were not there long before there came a man who caught two of the sheep, put them in his wallet, flung them across his horse, and made off. We immediately pursued him, when he made his escape, and left his horse behind. I took the horse, rode him to market, and sold him to the prisoner who is arraigned before this court.--Now may it please your honors, I should be very glad to know who claims this horse; for I shall then be enabled to get pay for all my father's sheep which he has lost.

In the interim, the claimant disappeared, and no other person coming forward to own the horse, the prisoner was cleared from the charge, and the son had liberty to stay at home.--London paper.

BERMUDA, Oct. 29.

We have had several arrivals since our last, but the barque Glenbernie, Evans, master, is worthy of notice, from the circumstance of her falling in, on her passage hither from Glasgow, with a piratical vessel, and brought ten of the crew into the River. The following is the account given by N. M'Kinnen, one of the party, from the commencement of their voyage:

"Having agreed on the 23d of July, with the brig Africano, Captain Burke, bound for Africa, and sailed the same day for Amelia Island, there to get a supply of arms, ammunition, and provisions. On the 30th of July, arrived at the above place, and by the 13th of Aug. had our supplies completed; and sailed from thence on the 25th, intending to touch at the Cape de Verd Islands. On the 16th of Sept. spoke and boarded the brig Mercator, S. De Graves, master, of Salem, bound for St. Salvador--
