BATAVIA, MARCH 16. Various letters from Baujoewaugie, men tion that towards the middle of January the mountain Idienge, situated at about twenty four leagues from Baujoewaugie, began to break out and spread fear and desolation over the surrounding country. On the night of the 23d and 24th of January there was a great eruption; immence columns of fire and smoke, and inflammable substruces, ascended from the mountain, with a noise similar to thunder or artillery; the earth quaked even as far as Baujoewaugie. A prodigious quantity of cinders, earth, and sand, vomited forth by the mountain, soon covered all the neighboring fields, and utterly destroyed the crops of rice, which had before presented the most beautiful appearance. The air became so surcharged with clouds of ashes and sulphurous smoke, that it was scarcely possible to respire, and for several days afterwards the light of day was scarcely visible at Baujoewangie. The greater part of the birds of the air have perished, and along the rivers nothing is to be seen but dead fish floating on the surface of the waters. Enormous blocks of stone and trees of a prodigious bilk, were precipitated with a fearful crash from the highest mountain, and overwhelmed. in their course, houses, and bridges, and every thing which they encounsered. The rivers every where burst their banks, and in many places rose as hie as 14 feet above their ordinary level. The affrighted inhabitants fled from all parts towards the shore and town of Baujoewaugie, but were stopped at every step in consequence of the roads being rendered impassable by the inundations and the destruction of the bridges. The subsequent news is somewhat more assuring; the mountain has ceased to emit any more fire; undations yet abated. The desolation occasioned by this disastrous phenomenon, is payment to fearful; and there is reason to apprehend that it will occasion great scarcity of provisions. Many people are soffering under diseases occasioned by the bad quality given to the waters by the ashes, and a general mortality has seezed the horned cattle. In the district of Gabang a mountain tombled down on the 27th of February, and buried wight families who dwelt under it. A similar event took place in the nights of the 4th and 5th of March, in the district of Talage where
