A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to the third Tuesday of this instant December, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the third Tuesday in January next ensuing, then to meet at Fredericton for the dispatch of Business.

A Proclamation.

WHEREAS it has been represented to me that, notwithstanding the Regulations lately published respecting the cutting of Pine Timber, sundry Persons are now engaged in cutting Timber on Lands expressly reserved for His Majesty's use, pretending to have permission under Licences which are no longer in force;—These are, therefore, to require all such Persons immediately to desist from cutting Timber, or in any way trespassing upon Lands reserved for the King's use, in any part of this Province; and any person who shall be found so trespassing, after the date hereof, will be forthwith prosecuted.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN, GREETING: NOTICE is hereby given that upon the application of Hugh Johnston, Hugh Johnston, junr. and John R. Petitioners for GRANTS of LAND having frequently neglected to set forth in their PETITIONS, the particulars required by public Notice: The following is published by authority,—and no Petitions can be hereafter attended to unless they contain all the requisites mentioned in the following Notice:

NOTICE is hereby given, that every Person who shall hereafter make application for a GRANT of LAND must set forth in his Petition the following particulars:—viz.

The place of his Birth; to what County he is subject; his present place of residence; and where he has resided for the last five years;—whether he is married or single; and whether he has had any and what Grant or Allotment of Land from the Crown; and also the particulars situation of the Land applied for; and whether it is in its natural and uncultivated state, or whether any improvement has been made thereon; and the intention and ability of the Petitioner forthwith to cultivate and improve, by himself or by his servants or associates, the Land for which he applies, according to the Royal Instructions, and also that he has not directly or indirectly bargained or agreed for the sale or transfer of such Land to any Person or Persons whatsoever; and shall verify his Memorial by an Affidavit in the following form:

"On the day of before me one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of personally appeared the above named and made Oath that the several matters and things set forth in the before written Petition are just and true."

Regulations respecting the granting of Licences to cut Pine Timber.

NO Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Land reserved for the use of the Crown.

LICENCES to be granted only to British subjects, with condition to be forfeited if assigned to Aliens, and every Licence to specify the quantity to be cut, and to be limited as to time; and no Timber fit for the Navy to be permitted to be cut for private use.

No Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Lands for which application has been made for Grants, and every applicant for a Licence, to describe particularly the Land on which he wishes to cut, and the quantity of Timber, and accompany his application with a Certificate, that the Land has not been applied for to be granted.

ALL applications for Licences to be handed in the first place to the Deputy Surveyor of the Woods, who, if he thinks fit to recommend the application, will lodge it in the Secretary's Office, to be laid, in the usual manner, before a Committee of His Majesty's Council for consideration; and any three Members of the Council to be a Committee for the purpose of considering the applications in question.

And Applicants for Licences are further notified that the FEES to be demanded by the Surveyors of the Woods, are now fixed at twenty shillings for each Licence, and that no other Fee or Emolument is to be demanded or taken excepting the usual Fees in the other Departments through which the application for a Licence must pass. A Proclamation.

WHEREAS by Act of Parliament passed in the Forty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, Power is given to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of this Province, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same;—I have therefore thought fit with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council to publish this Proclamation, hereby authorizing and empowering British Subjects for the space of Six months from the date hereof, to import and bring into this Province from the United States of America, in British built ships or vessels owned and navigated according to Law; Scantling, Plank, Staves, Heading-Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley or Grain of any sort; and British Subjects during the same period, are hereby authorized and empowered to export in British ships owned and navigated as aforesaid, all or any of the said herein before enumerated articles, to any other of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations.

SURVEYOR-GENERAL'S OFFICE, Fredericton, 22d Dec. 1817.

IT having been found that Applicants for Land have, in many instances taken possession of the Lands applied for, and cut off the Timber without taking out their Grants as required by the King's Instructions.—PUBLIC NOTICE is therefore hereby given by Order of Government, that no person whatever is to be permitted to enter upon Lands that he may have applied for, or to cut any Timber thereon, until he shall have actually taken out his Grant for the same; and any Person who shall be found offending herein, will be proceeded against as a Trespasser on the Crown Lands.

Further REGULATIONS respecting the Granting of LICENCES to cut PINE TIMBER.

NO LICENCE hereafter to be granted to any Person to cut Pine Timber who is not actually and bona fide a Freeholder possessing Lands within the Province; and every Applicant for a Licence must make it appear in his Petition that he is a Freeholder within the meaning of this Regulation.

AT a Special Session of the Peace holden at the County Court House in Fredericton in and for the County of York, on Wednesday the 6th of August, 1817, for the Purpose of regulating the ASSIZE of BREAD in the Town of Fredericton,

Ordered that from and after Saturday the 9th inst. the ASSIZE of BREAD be as follows:—viz,

THE Shilling Wheaten Loaf to weigh Two Pounds Twelve Ounces, and the Shilling Rye Loaf to weigh Four Pounds and other Loaves in proportion.

ORDERED that for every offence in Baking and Vending any Loaf of Bread under the weight above mentioned, the Person so offending shall pay a fine of ten shillings to be recovered upon conviction, before any one of His Majesty's JUSTICES of the PEACE on the oath of one or more credible witness or witnesses, or view of the Justice and levied by Warrant of Distress and Sale of the Offenders Goods; and when recovered, (after deducting the costs and charges) to be paid into the hands of the overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Fredericton.

ORDERED that the respective Bakers be furnished with a Copy of the above regulations, and that they be published in the Royal Gazette.
