The case, as detailed by his Lorship, appears to be that an individual of the name of Ferguson, made an unauthorised ase of Lord Douglas's name, in promising to provide for the friend of a Mr. Bankes, a free holder in the county of Lanark, provided he (Mr. B.) voted for Sir Alexander Cochrane, who had announced his intention of offering himself as condidate, for that county at the next election. Banishment from Scotland.

On Wednesday se'nnight came on before the High Court of Justiciary, at Edinburghy the trial of the Rev. Joseph Robertson, Minister of the Gospel, Leith Wynd Chapel, Edinburgh, and Wm. Pearson, spirit-dealer in the Canongate, accused of a falsehood, fraud, and forgery, and also of celebrating clandestinely and irregularly, marriage, contrary to the Act of first Parliament of Charles II. 1661, chap. 34. The libel was found relevant at a former meeting of the Court, and the pannels having pleaded not guilty, a Jury was chosen, and the trial proceeded. Seven witnesses were examined in support of the prosecution, and five in favour of the prisoners. Thursday the prisoners being found guilty, they were sentenced to be imprisoned three months in the Canongate gaol, and afterwards Mr. Robertson to be banished from Sectland for life, and Pearson for 14

Lord Nelson's boatswain, James Phillips, died last week, in Bedminister, and was insered on Sunday last, in Redeliff churchyard, Bristol. This gallant tar had received four large sabre wounds on his head, several gun and pistol shot wounds in his body, and three balls in his right leg and thigh. After the memorable battle of Trafalgar, his hull being much shattered, he obtained an honourable discharge, and was laid up in ordinary. He had just attained the age of his beloved Admiral, 47 years.

In a late debate in the British House of Commons, Lord Castlereagh said, " the true interest of every Country was to throw wide open its Ports to the unrestrained Commerce of other Countries." And the sentiment was cheered from every part of the Hause.

In answer to the inquiry of a writer in the Palladium, the National Intelligencer has published extracts from two British Laws, shewing that a trade is authorised to the English West-India Islands in the vessels and produce of American Colonies belonging to European Nations -- though vessels of the U.S. are not permitted to earry our produce.

SNOW AND HALL

The western part of the state of New-York, experienced, the latter end of last month, a greater fall of snow than has fell at any one time during the past winter. On the 20th April, the mail stage went into Geneva on runners, and at Moscow, (not in Russia!) the snow was two feet deep---At Cornwall, one of the most violent hail storms ever felt, has occured. It came from sea, against the wind, being driven by an upper current of air over Blackheath point, taking a N. W. direction, and extending two miles in breadth. Many of the harl stones measured two inches and half in circumferrence; they lay on the ground to the depth of six inches; but near hodget and in low places, they were three feet in depth.
