14TH JULY, 1818.

The Surveyor-General has been pleased to appoint Lieutenant G. West, R. N. to be Deputy Surveyor in the Province of New-Brunswick.

Since our last Paper, the remainder of the 98th Regiment left here to join the Regiment at its general rendezvous at Saint John, preparatory to their departure for England; and we understand the whole will sail thence on Thursday next. We are happy to observe that during the time which this Regiment has last served in the Province, not one person, to our recollection, has committed an offence against the Laws, to render it necessary for the civil power to interpose; and the conduct of that part of the Regiment stationed at the Head-Quarters, has been generally quite correct, and such as entitled them, we trust, to the best wishes of the Inhabitants for their future prosperity. Much credit is undoubtedly due, at all times, to the officers, for the good conduct of the men. The strict, though not rigid, discipline observed in the government of this Regiment; reflects credit as well on Major KING, the Commanding Officer, as on the other Officers, whose department has been such as to reserve to them the esteem of the Inhabitants.

This Regiment is succeeded by the 74th;—a Regiment whose good fortune it has been to be very frequently engaged in action during the late war. We have already noticed the arrival of Colonel the Hon. Sir ROBERT TRENCH, the Lieutenant-Col. Commanding the Regiment. There are six companies of the Regiment in the Province—the other four are detached to Newfoundland and Cape Breton.—Of those in this Province, two companies are now at the Head-Quarters here.

To the Editor of the Royal Gazette.

THE education of children is a matter of the first importance, and it should command the attention of all those who may have the least interest in it, in a much higher degree than is commonly imagined. The destinies of nations are influenced by the first principles instilled into the tender mind of youth.—The bravery, the magnanimity, the national, the moral character, of Kingdoms may be traced down to the original principles of instruction. It is of the utmost consequence then for Fathers who may have been blessed with children, to attend to the proper education with the most anxious solicitude. The delight which parents must feel in beholding the quick progress of their children from youth upwards in the various

branches of their education, must be reckoned among the first rank of those blessings which Providence has so liberally spread over the world.—We all feel the greatest pleasure in beholding our plans shoot up under our care, and proceeding step by step to their final accomplishments. At the first dawn of every succeeding week, the farmer may view the gradual advancement of his fields to maturity with the greatest exultation of heart; the merchant will observe the different stages of his commercial plans with the deepest interest. But with how much more interest will the progress of an immortal soul be beheld, emerging we may say from a state of nothingness at its birth, and gradually rising from the bare spark of existence to that light of genius and understanding which leaves a brightness in its track through the world! A parent in being careful of the education of his children is a benefactor to posterity—he who is careless robs society of those who with proper education might have been its brightest ornaments. Who knows but the boy who is now at the head of his class in the school room, may some day be the defender of his country, or the conductor of her councils. This consideration alone should animate the bosom of every parent to rise above all narrowness of mind, and boldly bestow that attention which will be an honor to himself, and a benefit to society.

It is a source of never failing joy to a benevolent mind to consider the daily improvements in every branch of science and art. Among the many discoveries made in our own times, none has been attended with so many beneficial effects as the Madras System of education. This mode of instruction is so grand in its design, and so admirably suited to the structure and rapid development of the human mind, that we may look forward with the greatest confidence to the day when ignorance and superstition shall be no more, and when the divine sentiments of morality and religion will animate every human breast.

It would doubtless be gratifying to many readers to be presented with a concise account of this System of education. We intend to lay such a brief statement before the public, from the period of its discovery through the various stages of its progress over the world, to its improved state at the present day. The permanent practices of a Madras School will be recounted subsequent to its historical sketch.
