Death from Fright.—An Inquisition is taken last night before Hugh Hewis, q. Coroner at the Pine Apple, Pinlico, the body of Mrs. Mary Ana Bandy, of o. 6 Palace st. Pimilico.

Sarah Gardner deposed that she was sernt to the deceased; she had lived with r about nine year. for, she died in three hours after. Witness believed her death was caused by excessive fright, from an idea that thieves were in the house. Witness believed that the mind of the deceased was more affected by her having been a short time before reading in a paper the account of the murder and execution of Godalming.

Mr. Charles Edwa d Clark, surgeon, Pimilico, stated that he was called to attend the deceased about four o'clock on Tuesday morning; he found her lying in the drawing room, in a senseless state; he endeavored to stimulate her system and restore animation, but failed; she died at five o'clock the same morning. The death of the deceased was probably caused by excessive terror.

The jury then took a view of the body, and observed a blackness round the throat and on the shoulder.

The surgeon at their request, went and examined the body, and on his return said that the marks round the throat were caused by the ribband of her caps being tied very tight, and the blackness on her shoulder was from purrefaction.

The jury consulted for a short time, and agreed to return the following virdict—"The death of the deceased was caused by excessive fright."
