His Excellency the **LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR** has received the following Order in Council, and publishes the same by direction of the Right Honourable Earl **BATHURST**, His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

At the Court at Carlton House, the 27th May, 1818, Present His Royal Highness the **PRINCE REGENT** in Council.

**WHEREAS** by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to allow for three years, and until six months after the commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, the Importation into Ports specially appointed by His Majesty, within the Provinces of Nova-Scotia and New-Brunswick, of the articles therein enumerated, and the Re-exportation thereof from such Ports," it is enacted, That it shall and may be lawful in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the Subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into and export from such Ports within the Province of Nova-Scotia or New-Brunswick as shall be specially appointed for that purpose, certain articles in the said Act enumerated, any thing in any law to the contrary notwithstanding: His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, by virtue of the powers vested in His Majesty by the above recited Act, is pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That from and after the date of this Order, and during the continuance of the Act above recited, until further order made thereon, it shall be lawful in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the Subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into the Port of Halifax, in Nova-Scotia, and the Port of Saint John, in New-Brunswick, any Scantling, Planks, Staves, Heading-Boards, Shingles, Hoops, Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or live Stock of any sort, Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Pease, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley or Grain of any sort, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Fruits, Seeds, and Tobacco: Provided that such articles shall in all cases where the same shall be imported in Foreign vessels, be of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the Country to which the vessels importing the same shall belong: And that it shall be lawful, in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, to export from the said Ports, any of the said articles, either to the United Kingdom, or to any other of His Majesty's possessions:

And it is hereby further ordered, That it shall and may be lawful in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the Subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to export from the Ports of Halifax, in Nova-Scotia, and Saint John, in New-Brunswick, any Gypsum, Grindstones, or other produce or manufacture of the said Provinces, and also any produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in the West Indies, or any goods whatever which shall have been legally imported into the said Provinces: Provided, that none of the said articles shall be exported from the Ports above named, to any Foreign Country or Place, in any Foreign vessel, unless such Foreign vessel shall belong

to the Country to which the said articles shall be exported: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

### A Proclamation.

**WHEREAS** by an ACT of the General Assembly of this Province, made and passed on the eleventh day of March last, the Lieutenant-Governor or Commander in Chief of this Province for the time being is authorized and empowered, "whenever it shall appear and be made known to him, that an ACT made and passed in the Province of Nova-Scotia, for the encouragement of the Trade of that Province in PLASTER of PARIS or otherwise called GYPSUM, shall have ceased to operate and shall be no longer in force in that Province," by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council by Public Proclamation to suspend the further operation and execution of the Act made and passed in the fifty-sixth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An ACT for the encouragement of the Trade of this Province in PLASTER of PARIS or otherwise called GYPSUM," until His Majesty's Royal Pleasure shall be signified respecting the same.

And whereas it does appear and has been made known to me, that the said ACT of Nova-Scotia above mentioned, has been repealed, and is no longer in force in that Province; I DO THEREFORE, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, hereby suspend the further operation and execution of the said ACT made and passed in the Fifty-sixth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "an ACT for the encouragement of the Trade of this Province in PLASTER of PARIS or otherwise called GYPSUM," until His Majesty's Royal Pleasure shall be signified respecting the same—whereof all persons whom it may concern, will take due notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

### A Proclamation.

**WHEREAS** it has been represented to me that, notwithstanding the Regulations lately published respecting the cutting of Pine Timber, sundry Persons are now engaged in cutting Timber on Lands expressly reserved for His Majesty's use, pretending to have permission under Licences which are no longer in force:—These are, therefore, to require all such Persons immediately to desist from cutting Timber, or in any way trespassing upon Lands reserved for the King's use, in any part of this Province; and any person who shall be found so trespassing, after the date hereof, will be forthwith prosecuted.

Petitioners for **GRANTS of LAND** having frequently neglected to set forth in their PETITIONS, the particulars required by public Notice: The following is published by authority,—and no Petitions can be hereafter attended to unless they contain all the requisites mentioned in the following Notice:

**NOTICE** is hereby given, that every Person who shall hereafter make application for a **GRANT of LAND** must set forth in his Petition the following particulars:—viz.

The place of his Birth; to what County he is subject; his present place of residence; and where he has resided for the last five years;—whether he is married or single; and whether he has had any and what Grant or Allotment of Land from the Crown; and also the particular situation of the Land applied for; and whether it is in its natural and uncultivated state, or whether any improvement has been made thereon; and the intention and ability of the Petitioner forthwith to cultivate and improve, by himself or by his servants or associates, the Land for which he applies, according to the Royal Instructions, and also that he has not directly or indirectly bargained or agreed for the sale or transfer of such Land to any Person or Persons whatsoever; and shall verify his Memorial by an Affidavit in the following form:

"On the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ before me, \_\_\_\_\_ one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of \_\_\_\_\_ personally appeared the above named \_\_\_\_\_ and made Oath that the several matters and things set forth in the before written Petition are just and true."

AT a General Sessions of the Peace holden at Fredericton on the 15th day of January, 1818.

Regulations respecting the granting of Licences to cut Pine Timber.

**NO** Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Land reserved for the use of the Crown.

**LICENCES** to be granted only to British subjects, with condition to be forfeited if assigned to Aliens, and every Licence to specify the quantity to be cut, and to be limited as to time; and no Timber fit for the Navy to be permitted to be cut for private use.

**NO** Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Lands for which application has been made for Grants, and every applicant for a Licence, to describe particularly the Land on which he wishes to cut, and the quantity of Timber, and accompany his application with a Certificate, that the Land has not been applied for to be granted.

All applications for Licences to be handed in the first place to the Deputy Surveyor of the Woods, who, if he thinks fit to recommend the application, will lodge it in the Secretary's Office, to be laid, in the usual manner, before a Committee of His Majesty's Council for consideration; and any three Members of the Council to be a Committee for the purpose of considering the applications in question.

And Applicants for Licences are further notified that the **FEES to be demanded by the Surveyors of the Woods, are now fixed at twenty shillings for each Licence, and that no other Fee or Emolument is to be demanded or taken excepting the usual Fees in the other Departments through which the application for a Licence must pass.**

Further REGULATIONS respecting the Granting of LICENCES to cut **PINE TIMBER.**

**NO LICENCE** hereafter to be granted to any Person to cut Pine Timber who is not actually and bona fide a Freeholder possessing Lands within the Province; and every Applicant for a Licence must make it appear in his Petition that he is a Freeholder within the meaning of this Regulation.

**IT** having been found that Applicants for Land have, in many instances taken possession of the Lands applied for, and cut off the Timber without taking out their Grants as required by the King's Instructions.—**PUBLIC NOTICE** is therefore hereby given by Order of Government, that no person whatever is to be permitted to enter upon Lands that he may have applied for, or to cut any Timber thereon, until he shall have actually taken out his Grant for the same; and any Person who shall be found offending herein, will be proceeded against as a Trespasser on the Crown Lands.
