TROUBLES IN IRELAND.

[From the Weekly Freeman's Journal.]

The extraordinary scenes to which the revenue laws of this country are constantly giving rise cannot fail to attract the notice of the most inattentive observer of passing events. We perceive by the reports of the proceedings in Parliament, that the people of the North still continue to load the table of the House of Commons with petitions, setting forth the hardships, the losses and cruelties which they suffer from the rigorous and rapacity of still-hunters; the large fortunes which are suddenly amassed by Excise officers; and the disingenuous and reprehensible arts which are daily put in practice to entrap the unwary, and impose fines upon town lands and parishes. Whilst these doings are going on in the North, we scarcely open a provincial paper, printed in the South or the West, which does not contain reports of conflicts between the country people and parties engaged in still hunting adventures. Hostilities on these occasions seem to be considered as matters of course, and preparations appear to be generally made on both sides accordingly. Regular engagements take place, and precise details of operations are published. The positions and manœuvres of the contending powers are described, and lists of killed and wounded are attached to the bulletins which are issued. It was but yesterday that we received an account of an affair that happened in the county of Galway, in which it was found necessary to "cover the retreat" of the revenue forces, by the discharge of cannon; and we find in the *Kerry Evening Post*, which has since been received, a statement of a rencontre attended with very fatal results. We annex the article from the *Kerry paper*, remarking merely, that there is a very striking discrepancy between the narrative of the Journalist and the verdict of a Jury empanelled to state their opinion as to the circumstances which led to the death of one of the slain:

TRALEE, May 24.—On Thursday last Messrs. Davidson and O'Reilly, officers of excise, assisted by a party of the 97th, commanded by Lieut. Flint, succeeded in detecting a distillery in the mountains of Coolasought, five miles from Castleisland, in this county, which had been established on a very extensive scale. There were seized on the above occasion, two copper stills, capable of containing 100 gallons each, one copper still-head, and a worm of the same material; 20 casks of various dimensions, a mash keeve containing 100 gallons, 2 coolers, and various other utensils used for the purpose of distillation, even to the minutest article. There were destroyed upon the spot above 1,000 gallons of potale, and 60 gallons of singlings. When the party conducting the seizure were passing through the town of Castleisland, on their way to the King's stores, Tralee, they were attacked by a most infuriate and desperate mob, nearly to the number of 2,000, who commenced their onset by throwing a volley of stones, by which Lieut. Flint and several of the soldiers were wounded. Though the mob were repeatedly warned to desist by Mr. Twiss, a magistrate of the county, and also by the officers who were with the party, they still continued to press forward on the soldiers with the most savage fury. In order to save the lives of the party as well as to make good the seizure, the military, after long forbearance, were obliged to fire, in consequence of which there was one person killed, and another wounded. After the mob had been dispersed, and the seizure had been forced through the town in despite of opposition, the party were reinforced by 20 men, commanded by Major Hare, and in the course of a few hours the whole was safely lodged in the King's stores, Tralee.

Halifax, August 4.

A Coroner's Inquest was held on Saturday last, upon the body of Daniel Daly, a soldier of the 74th Regiment, found floating in the Harbour.—Verdict, *Accidental Death*. It is supposed he fell overboard during the time the Transports with the 74th Regiment lay in this Port.

Saint John's, N. E. July 11.

Arrived on Tuesday last, the Transport brig Loyal Briton, Capt. Plunkett, in 7 days from Halifax, with a detachment of 205 men of the 74th Regiment, under the command of Lieut. Colonel Manners, to relieve the division of the 98th, now doing duty in this garrison; also, on Wednesday, Transport brig Importer, from Sydney, with a detachment of the 60th Regiment, on their way to England, relieved at the last mentioned place by a detachment of the 74th.

JULY 26.

His Excellency Vice-Admiral Sir C. Hamilton, Bart. Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of Newfoundland, &c. &c. arrived here on Sunday last in his Majesty's ship Ister, 42 guns, Capt. Forrest, from Portsmouth.

The division of the 98th Regiment for Cork, embarked yesterday afternoon, on board the brig Importer for that place, as did those of the same corps on board the Loyal Briton for Halifax.

On Wednesday last, William Dowd, a private in the 74th Regiment, fell from the half-moon battery at Signal Hill, a height of about 40 feet from the ground, and fractured his skull in such a dreadful manner, that he expired in about eight hours after. The deceased bore an unexceptionable character, and had been in nine different engagements in the Peninsula, during the late war, and never received a wound.

HALIFAX, July 31.

Extract of a letter from New-York to a mercantile House in this town, dated July 10.

"By a recent indulgence of our Corporation, the law requiring a bond at the rate of 300 dollars per head from the captain and consignee, as security against the passengers in any vessel becoming a charge on the public, may be commuted for, by paying 5 dollars to the Corporation. Exclusive of this, every passenger in the cabin pays

1½, and every steerage passenger 1 dollar per head to our Custom House; making, in all, an unavoidable expence from 6 to 6½ dollars for each individual—for which the vessel is responsible.—As in most cases, it is absolutely impossible to recover from the passengers on their arrival here, this sum should therefore, to prevent trouble and loss, be included in the original charge for their passage.

"In many instances I have known that passengers have, within the period of the bond (two years) cost the Consignee from 100 to 200 dollars.—No prudent man is therefore disposed to give bond in such cases. A passenger who is a citizen of the State of New York, does not come within the meaning of the law; but a citizen of any other State, is equally liable as a Foreigner to its provisions. You may do a service by making this known through the medium of your Newspapers, for the information of those who are not aware of our municipal and port regulations."
