the fury of the tempest. Being in the vivinity of the ice to the northward, we were the ship, and lay-to under those two small sails for sixty hours. The sea ran tremendously We carried a boat at each quarter ship, suspended by the davits, much above the deck; on the second day of the storm's continuance, a heavy sea struck the ship, and with dreadful violence came on deck, but happily did no serious damage. It lifted up the weather quarter boat, and had nearly thrown it upon deck; and the lee boat, with another on the chocks, were completely filled with water. It lifted an eighteen-pounder car onade quite out of its place, and washed away or stove in the quarter and waistboards, fore and aft.

"During the whole continuance of this gale, the barometer never varied one-fifth of an inch."

* Some time afterwards, when mentioning this circumstance to an old Greenland commander, he told me he had himself more than once seen the phenomenon I described, and always considered it as a prognostic of a storm; at the same time, its position pointed out the quarter from whence it would commence.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 10. Yesterday, after the Chief Judge had delivered the charge, Judge Houston stated, that during the vacation, a number of the National Imelligencer, containing an essay signed Franklin, respecting the South American privateers, had been enclosed in a blank cover, and sent to him. His honor stated, that that essay contained a paragraph which might be construed into a threat, and might have been, and probably was, intended as a threat. We do not remember the precise terms of that paragraph, but the amount of was, that any one who should condemn persons for engaging in the holy cause of assisting the Patriois of South America, could not long expect to live either as a judge or man. His Honor observed, that that paper could not have been sent to him with any good motive, and he spoke in terms of just and becoming indignation, of an attempt either to influence the mind of a Judge on a subject upon which he was about to act in a judicial capacity, or to deter him by threats from a faithful discharge of his duty, and said, that he should in all cases discharge his dury in the execution of the laws of his country, regardless of every attempt to bias his mind, or deter him by threats.

The cases of those gentlemen who have been recognized to answer the informations lodged against them for privateering under South American flags, against the commerce of nations with whom our government is at peace, will be laid before the Grand Jury, and if bills are found, they will probably have their trials during the term.

Before this time the British have restored to the Americans the settlement of Columbia-River; and it is probable that next year a regiment of United States troops will be stationed there, and a line of posts established across the continent.

A letter dated Havana, 18th ult. received by the schooner Comet, at Charleston, says, Coffee is at a price never before known in this city; sales have actually been made at 3; cents, per 100 lbs; and contracts for the coming crop have been made at unpresented high prices."

Another letter of the 19th ult. quotes collee at 30 dols.; rice 9 62½; flour 19. The crop of coffee is represented as not so abundant as was expected a few months since.
