Payment will be made monthly, in Bills of Exchange, at par, for the quantities delivered within the month.

FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

17TH NOVEMBER, 1818.

The Halifax papers received since our last, contain London dates to the 17th and Liverpool to the 19th September inclusive. The latest accounts from Kew palace says, "Her Majesty has not had so good a night as the two last, and is not so well this morning as she was yesterday."

The British Parliament has been prorogued to the 12th instant.

Marital Law has been proclaimed in the Canadian Provinces in consequence of a rebellion having broken out there.

It is said that the Allied Powers will not interfere in the South American quarrel any farther than to offer their guarantee for the terms proposed to the revolters by the King of Spain.

The 35th regiment of infantry, commanded by the Duke of Richmond, now stationed at Brighton, is expected to leave England, for Quebec, next Spring.

The Spanish Expedition was expected to sail from Cadiz early in November; it will consist of four ships of the line, six frigates, and from 12 to 16,000 men.

The King of Prussia, it is expected, will arrive at Aix-la-Chapelle, Sept. 24 or 25; and the other Sovereigns will make their solemn entry Sept. 27.

His Majesty's ship Griffin has arrived at Portsmouth from St. Helena—The Colony was very sickly—Capt. Paisley, of the Redpole, died July 17—Sir H. Lowe had been dangerously ill; and Bonaparte had not been seen out of doors for several months.

London, September 16.

Last night's Gazette contains a Proclamation by his Royal Highness the Prince Regent, by which the meeting of Parliament is further prorogued from the 2d of October to the 12th day of November. It is not stated in the Proclamation that Parliament will then meet "for the dispatch of business." We may, therefore, conclude that the Legislature will not be assembled earlier than in the month of January, unless it becomes imperative on the Crown to require its assistance by the occurrence of a distressing event, which the present state of her Majesty's health offers but too much reason to apprehend. Should the fears arising from the Queen's illness be unhappily realised, it is very probable that Parliament will be suffered to meet on the day to which it now is further prorogued.

In the Gazette notice is taken of the riotous attack made on Wednesday, the 2d, by the refractory tradespeople of Manchester, upon the factory of Messrs. Gray and Co. commonly called Ancoats Mill, in Pollard Street, Manchester, and a pardon is offered to any person or persons who shall give evidence against the planners of the outrage. The constables of Manchester, however, give

greater encouragement for the production of evidence, by offering a reward of two hundred guineas.

The operation which her Majesty underwent, on Saturday night appears to have given her considerable relief; at least, it is certain, that at present, she is in a great measure free from those severe pains and spasms of the viscera, which, on Saturday, seemed to threaten her speedy dissolution. Her Majesty, however, notwithstanding this temporary cessation of pain, is in a state of extreme debility: unable to bear the slightest motion, to lie down in her bed, or even to move from her chair at all. Neither has it been judged advisable for her chair to be wheeled into the adjoining room, where the Princesses have been in the habit of personally waiting on their suffering Parent, during her little repast with the most affectionate anxiety; and now her Majesty takes her repast in her bed-chamber. Her Majesty, indeed, has lately received very little food, and that of the lightest kind; the wing of a roasted partridge, or some such trifle, constituting her dinner.

RUNCORN A FREE PORT.

It is with great pleasure we are enabled to announce, that chiefly through the interference of an established and active Officer of the Revenue, in Liverpool, Runcorn is declared a Free Port for shipping ordinary Merchandize of every description for six months certain with a high probability that this advantageous regulation will be perpetual.—To shippers of salt, earthenware, &c. this is a matter of great moment, as the custom hitherto has been, to carry goods from hence to Liverpool, to be re-shipped; and the importance of it, therefore, in a commercial point of view, is obvious; and the obtaining the favour was for a long time a favorite but unsuccessful object of the late Duke of Bridgewater.
