AGRICULTURE.

(From the Boston Commercial Gazette.)
We consider it matter of congratulation that men of opulence and talent are giving their attention to the subject of Agriculture. We believe, that on no concern of greater interest to a nation such as ours, can their patronage be bestowed. In all the branches of Agriculture, our country is susceptible of great improvements. And we cannot but cherish the patriotic belief, that it is destined to surpass even the old world in this respect. We have an extensive territory of various soils and temperature, fertilized with rivers, with a constantly increasing population, second to no people on earth for hardihood, enterprize and ingenuity. We also live in an age of invention and improvement. Discoveries have lately been made in many departments of science, of which the practical and intelligent agriculturalist may avail himself, without great study or elaborate research. A knowledge of chymistry, particularly, which has of late been much extended, affords great facilities to the various interests of agriculture. We may avail ourselves of the improvements made and making in Europe: there is a laudable spirit of inquiry among the lower classes; and many of our opulent citizens are instituting experiments, the result of which cannot fail to be highly beneficial to the landholder and the husbandman.

Under these favourable circumstances there is every inducement for industry and exertion in those engaged in agricultural pursuits. It seems to be the most certain way to advance their interests. And it is undoubtedly the best method to preserve health and morals. The employment is happily adapted to a people living under the mild reign of republicanism: it is suited likewise to the contemplative habits of the philosopher, and to the inquisitive disposition of men of science.

Even England, commercial as she is, in her pursuits and policy, and indebted, as she certainly is, in a great measure, to navigation and manufactures for her wealth and power, has not been indifferent to the advantages of agriculture. And she could never have supported her armies and navies in times past, but for a sedulous attention and patronage given also to the agricultural interests. The celebrated Mr. Roscoe, in an address lately pronounced before a learned Society at Liverpool, has spoken highly of the blessings of agriculture. Our excellent Governor has the merit also, of having recommended the subject in a late speech to the legislature, as worthy of peculiar attention, being in his view connected with the best interest and highest prosperity of the nation.

The Massachusetts Agricultural Society have deserved well of the Commonwealth. They are actuated by the most liberal and patriotic views. In their efforts to promote the objects of their association, they have been indefatigable and judicious. To them the public is indebted for the plan of an annual collection of the citizens, for purposes of inquiry and emulation on subjects relating to improvements in all the arts of husbandry, in grain and fruit, and what renders the situation of the common class of people more eligible, and eventually increases the wealth and resources of the State. Their exertions must produce the best effects. A spirit of emulation is excited—a more correct knowledge of the arts of life is diffused—labour gains much. The experiments of the rich turn to good account among those not able or not willing to resort to new methods of husbandry. The advantages to

the farmer, and indirectly to the whole state, will, in a few years, be incalculable. We feel it a duty we owe the public, to bestow our full praise on such laudable efforts; and though our paper is more particularly devoted to the concerns of commerce and commercial men, we think these remarks will not be unacceptable to them: for commerce and agriculture, we believe, to be eventually beneficial and auspicious.

Dr. Humphrey Davy has published a number of experiments on Agricultural Chymistry which are highly interesting, and may in fact be considered as establishing a new era in the science of agriculture. The Editor has a London ed. vol. of these experiments, with numerous plates in his possession.
