RESUSCITATION PREVENTED.

BOULDGNE, JULY 6.

About two o'clock I was informed that a young man and woman had drowned themselves in one of the fosses outside of the Tower walls. With many others I hastened to the spot, where the unhappy pair had been taken out of the water about a quarter of an hour, The young man was French; the young lady's father is an English gentleman, residing in Callis. I proposed that exertions should be made for their resuscitation, as they had been in the water but a quarier of an hour; but I was informed that the Commissary of Police would imprison any one that touched them before he arrived. Another quarter of an hour passed, and no Commissary arrived. Having communicated my ideas of the means generally resorted to in England, I, assisted by two English sailors and a French physician who was entirely ignorant as to the resuscitative powers, commenced the unpleasant geremony by conveying the young man (who still vomited a little spittle) to a sta ble near at hand. There he was stripped. I then ran to a cottage close by, and heating four bricks quite hot, put them to his feet and hands -having given directions in the mean time to rub the bells, and let the body be in such a position that the water could run out of the mouth. Produring some brandy, his temples were constantly rubbed with it, and his belly with sale and the same liquor, breathing into his mouth, and injecting the body with air by means of a bellows.
