The following is a copy of an important Bill which passed both Houses of Congress, by almost an unanimous vote, and only wanted the signature of the President, at the last date, to become a law.

See. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That from and after the thirtieth of September next, the ports of the United States shall be and remain closed, against every vessel owned wholly or in part by a subject or subjects of his Britannic Majesty, coming
