### A Proclamation.

THEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to the second Tuesday in December next; I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the first Tuesday in February next, then to meet at Fredericton for the dispatch of Business.

## A Proclamation.

THEREAS by Act of Parliament, passed in the forty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, power is given to the Governor, Lleutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of this Province, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same, I have therefore thought fit, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to publish this Proclamation, hereby authorising and empowering British Subjects, for the space of Three Months from the date hereof, to import and bring into this Proviuce from the United States of America, in British built ships or vessels, owned and navigated according to Law, Seantling, Planks, Staves, Heading-Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort, Bread, Biseuit, Flour, Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley, or Grain of any sort; and British Subjects, during the same period, are hereby authorised and empowered to export in British ships, owned and navigated as aforesaid, all or any of the said herein before enumerated articles, to any other of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Saint John, the eleventh day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and in the fifty-eighth year of His Majesty's Reign.

A Summary Account of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge.

(Concluded from our last.)

II. To disperse the Holy Serie-TURES, the LITURGY, and many pious and judicious Books and TRACTS in the English language, on all the leading points of faith and practice, has been another principal branch of the Society's designs, both at home and abroad: and in the pursuit of this object, they have been enabled, through the munificence of numerous benefactors, to send forth an almost incredible number of all these, as they trust, to the great temporal and everlasting comfort and welfare of multitudes of their fellow creatures. Of these books and tracts, and of the reduced prices, at which they are to be obtained by liteir own members, a detailed Catalogue is annexed.

Society was directed to the very important object of providing the Members of our Church with the means of perusing the Holy Scriptures with greater edification and comfort, and of preserving them sted: fast in the profession of a pure and uncorrupted Faith, by the publication at a moderail raie, of a FAMILY BIBLE, accompanied with Notes, explanatory and practical, in all points of Doctrine and Discipline to be selected from approved Writers of the the Belley Islands,

Church of England. This object has been happily accomplished; and an Edition, consisting of 16,500 Copies, on royal and medium paper has been already disposed of. A new Edition, similar in all respects to the first, and to be furnished to the Public on the same reasonable terms, is now in the course of publication.

The Society has also, from time to time, at very great charge, alded the Publication and Distribution of the Scriptures, and of various approved devotional and instruclive Treaties in the WELCH, MANKS, GABLIC, PORTUGUESE, FRENCH, DA-NISH, and GERMAN Languages.

In the year 1709, the Society circutated copies of a new edition of the Welch Common Prayer Book.

In the year 1714, they issued Proposals for a new impression of the Welch Bible, which obtained so extensive a patronage, that in 1718 an edition of above 7000 copies was finished, together with the Apoctypha, Book of Common Prayer, Psalms in the Metre, &c. By similar efforts, like impressions of 15,000, 15,000, 20,000, 10,000 and 20,000, copies respectively, were printed in the years 1748, 1733, 1770, 1799 and 1809; besides sundry separate editions of the New Testament and Liturgy. And though, by some of these very costly undertakings, the Society for a time was greatly reduced in its funds yet through the blessings of DIVINE PROVI-DENCE, it was ever enabled speedily to regain more than its former powers, and to continue to prosper in its resources and ope-

During all this period, many of the most valuable devotional and didactic Treatises, on the Society's Catalogue, have, as occasion required, been translated into the Welch language and printed for distribu-

rations more and more.

In like manner, in the year 1763, the Society issued Proposals for printing the Bible, the Liturgy, and religious Books and Tracts in the vulgar tongue of the Iste of Man; in consequence of which (the undertaking being enforced by the recommendation and patronage of the excellent primitive Bishops Wilson and Hildesley) they were enabled, in a few years to disperse, gratuitously, a large impression of the New Testament, Book of Common-Prayer, Christian Monitor, Lewis's Exposition, &c. &c. respectively. In 1773; they finished an edition of the Bible and Apocrypha, in the Manks language, and, in 1776, another of the New Testament in the same. Soon afterwards, 3000 copies of the Book of Common Prayer, and 3500 of Bishop Wilson's Treatise on the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, were printed and distributed: and in 1808, at the suggestion of the late Lord Bishop of Sodor and Man, they undertook a third edition of the Book of Common Prayer, which has been since finished, and is now in distribution, at a charge to the natives of little more than one third of the prime cost.

III. A third great branch of the Socie-Ty's designs has been to diffuse the blessings of Christianity by the establishment and support of RELIGIOUS MISSIONS, and other expedients necessary to that end; and, accordingly, while it has been careful to provide for the spiritual welfare of a few small islands near our own shores, it has also extended its regard to the destitute condition In the year 1813, the attention of the of the natives of AFRICA, and, on a more

enlarged scale, to those of Asia. In the year 1752, the Society accepted a trust from the Rev. Mr. Hartshorne, Rector of Brosely, Salop; and from that trust, aided by the contributions of many other charitable individuals, but yet not without a considerable additional charge upon the general funds, we have been enabled to open Schools, and to support two Clergymen, as established Missionarios, in
