Extraordinary Foot-Race in the East-Indies.

Extract of a letter from an Officer in the East-India Company's service to his Mother in London, dated Camp Deatah, Reserve of the Grand Army, March 20, 1818:
“On the evening of the 6th, at Odate, some Officers were amusing themselves by leaping and running short races. I was fortunate enough to beat every one. An Officer observing that he did not think it possible for any man to run eight miles on end, during the warm weather we then experienced. I then offered to run sixteen miles, without stopping, on the next day, for a bet of 200 rupees. Another Officer betted me 200 rupees to 100, that I did not run it in two hours, which bet I also accepted. The next morning I started, at nine o'clock, to run eight miles out, and return, the thermometer being 95, and the road sandy. In the first hour, I went nine miles and one furlong; the people were astonished; they could scarcely ride on account of the heat, and never supposed it possible for me to run such a distance in so short a time without practice. Those on good horses galloped back, and took all the bets they could. Before one hour and a half had expired I had gone thirteen miles, and as I still continued to run strong, the bets rose three to one in my favour, and I came to the winning flag, at good speed, 54 minutes and 50 seconds after ten, amidst the huzzas of about 20,000 people. The right division being but three miles distant, some thousands came to see the race. Every thread I had on was thoroughly wet, and, owing to the heat, some of the horses that went with me were done up. There was likewise another bet that Colonel Skinner's *hurkari*, or professed runner, should start with me, and beat me by a mile; but to my great surprise I beat him by ten minutes in the first hour, and he came in fourteen minutes after I had gone the sixteen miles; therefore, instead of his beating me a mile, I beat him by nearly two miles. Large sums were lost by those who betted against me; I, myself, won but 500 rupees, as I betted 100 on going 12 miles in one hour and 25 minutes. This morning a bet was made that I did not run 100 yards in 15 seconds, but I ran it in ten seconds.”
