A SON KILLED BY HIS FATHER.

UNION HALL. A transaction, at which humanity shudders, was on Saturday the occasion of attracting about this office a crowd of between three or four thousand persons. John Fawcett, an elderly man was brought before Mr. Serjeant Sellon, charged with shooting his son, John Fawcett, junr. on Friday night, about eight o'clock.

Jane Cummins, of Duke's-place, Westminster, stated, that on Friday evening she was passing along Joiner-street, Tooley-street; the door of Mr. Bush, potato-merchant, was open; the prisoner fired a pistol at some person on the stairs; she went into the passage, and saw that the wounded person was a young man. He staggered into the warehouse, and fell in a chair. She inquired where he was hurt; he said "the right side." She observed the blood running from his side in a torrent. She asked him if he knew who it was that fired the pistol; he replied, "Oh! it was my farther!" The prisoner looked piteously at the wounded man for several moments; he appeared horror-struck at what he had done, and did not attempt to escape until she cried out "Murder;" he then ran away.

Mr. Frederick Bassat, dresser at St. Thomas's Hospital, sworn. "On Friday night a young man, named Fawcett, was brought into the hospital. I dressed his wound; it is a gun-shot wound on the right side. His state is so dangerous, that I do not expect him to live."

Mr. William Speck, solicitor, St. John's, Southwark, sworn—"Last night I was passing along Tooley-street, in company with my brother; saw a man with a pistol in his hand run out of Bush's house. He ran very fast; I followed until I overtook him in a court, where there was no thoroughfare. He had then no pistol. After giving him in charge to a constable, I went to look for the pistol, and found it in a Court through which the prisoner ran. I afterwards went to him at the watch-house; he complained that Mr. Bush conspired with his wife, and that his intention was to shoot Bush."

William Bush sworn. "I was up stairs on Friday night with prisoner's wife who is my housekeeper. His son was there also; a little girl of mine was below. The prisoner came and inquired for me; my girl came to the bottom of the stairs, and called out "Farther;" prisoner's son went down. A few moments afterwards I heard the report of a gun or pistol. I went down stairs, and found young Fawcett weltering in his blood. I have maintained the young man at my house a very considerable time. The prisoner is a biscuit-baker, and lives in Bishopsgate. We are not good friends; and I believe he is jealous of his wife and me."

Other evidence was taken to a considerable length, the tendency of which was to shew that the prisoner shot his son, conceiving him to have been Bush.

At the close of the examination a messenger arrived from the Hospital with the intelligence that young Fawcett had expired. Further proceedings were immediately adjourned until the verdict of the Jury is known. The deceased was a fine young man, 20 years of age. It was stated by Bush, that the prisoner had been heard to threaten the life of his son at various times.

THE YOUNG MAN SHOT BY HIS FATHER.

CORONER'S INQUEST. Yesterday evening an Inquest was held in the Board Room of St. Thomas' Hospital, before T. Shelton, Esq. Coroner, on the body of John Fawcett, aged 19, whose death was caused by a pistol shot wound in the side, inflicted by his own father. The Jury being impaneled and sworn, they repaired to view the body, and on their return, they proceeded to hear the evidence, which was to the same purport as that given at Union Hall. At the conclusion of the evidence, the Coroner, at great length, summed up, and dwelt chiefly on points of law material to the case; he said, that the law could not justify a man who repaired to a house with an intention to murder one man, and by mistake killed another. The Jury retired to a separate room, and after about half an hour's deliberation, returned a Verdict of "Wilful Murder against John Fawcett, sen." and the Coroner bound over the witnesses to prosecute.
