LIVERPOOL, JANUARY 29.

We are happy to inform the public, that, by the wise recommendation of some of our principal physicians, and by the active exertions of our parish officers, not less than 2880 apartments, cellars, &c. the abodes of the poor of Liverpool, have been cleansed and whitewashed, and 533 have also been fumigated, after having been visited by contagious fevers. Estimating that five persons, on an average, may inhabit each of these abodes, an important service has thus been rendered to 17,050 human beings. Every friend of humanity will unite in approbation of this very judicious measure, which not only renders the dwellings of the poor more comfortable in appearance, but more salubrious in reality, than any thing of the kind which could have been devised. The whole of this important benefit has been accomplished for less than the sum of £175.

(Late Anti-Gallican) of Jan. 4.

"Napoleon's Campaign in Saxony, in the year 1813, by Baron Von Odeleben, an eye-witness in the French Head-Quarters."

"Napoleon's Generals were accustomed to hold themselves in readiness to proceed from place to place at a moment's warning, and blindly to sacrifice themselves to the will of the Emperor.—Soult had recently ordered his best cavalry to remove from Spain to Germany. During the armistice, his lady quitted Paris for Dresden; two days after her arrival there, the Emperor having received intimation of the retrograde moment of his troops from Vittoria to the French frontier, Soult was again unexpectedly appointed to take a command in Spain. He was under the necessity of departing that very night, selling off his horses, mules, and carriages, and dismissing his servants. The Officers of his Staff were in the same situation, as the greatest number accompanied him; the Duchess bid farewell to the beautiful city of Dresden, after a visit of three days.

"Napoleon's Adjutants, Secretaries, Orderly Officers, and every individual near him, from the Great Ecuier to the meanest attendant, were subjected to the most incredible drudgery and constraint. Caulaincourt was indefatigable in his attendance, and, like him, all were compelled to be in readiness to serve the Emperor hourly, and even momentarily; and, at the same

time, to observe a certain degree of elegance in their dress. In the towns where Napoleon usually fixed his quarters, all were crowded together; besides the Emperor's sitting room, cabinet, at *salon de service*, and dining-room for the Officers, a bed-chamber and study were always assigned to Berthier, so that the Aides-de-Camp were frequently obliged to content themselves with very miserable accommodation. A man of high birth, like General Narbonne, who in the capacity of Ambassador at Vienna, formerly enjoyed the most splendid establishment, frequently lay, during the latter half of the campaign, as Aid-de-camp to the Emperor, on a bed of straw, or a pair of stools, in Napoleon's anti-chamber, in order to be ready to rouse him perhaps six or eight times in one night, whenever any important accounts or dispatches arrived. In Napoleon's anti-chamber the whole of the officers on duty lay on beds of straw; two Aides-de-camp, each of whom had an Aid-de-camp under him, a Chamberlain, two Orderly Officers, and two pages—and when there was the slightest expectation of an approaching rupture or engagement, all were ready at a moment's warning. Thus the anti-chamber not unfrequently presented an appearance similar to the bowels of the Trojan horse. Rostan, the celebrated Mameluke, whom Napoleon had brought with him from Egypt, slept on the ground near the Emperor's apartments, generally facing the door; he served Napoleon in the capacity of a Squire, resembling, in all respects, the famous Sancho Panza, except that he was not under the necessity of attending to his own steed, and had as many relays as the Emperor himself. As soon as Napoleon mounted his horse, Rostan was behind him, carrying his great coat, cloak, a small portmanteau, and an oil-skin covering for himself. He dressed and undressed Napoleon, was constantly near his person, and occasionally waited at his table. It is honouring him too far to suppose that he shared the confidence of Napoleon; or was invested with a certain rank. Though Rostan had followed the Emperor in various engagements, yet he never obtained the Cross of the Legion of Honour, Caulaincourt, and the Officers who had served longest under the Emperor, always addressed him in the language which they might be expected to use to an inferior, and he lived with the superior Officers of the Emperor's Household.—Rostan has now become a naturalized Frenchman, and is married to a Parisian woman, whose portrait he wears in his bosom. There is something so extremely prepossessing about this man, from the candid expression of his countenance, large brown eyes, and frankness of manner, that it is by no means surprising that Napoleon should have placed implicit reliance on his fidelity. And yet Rostan did not follow the Emperor when he was hurled from the summit of his glory, and obliged to retire to Elba. Perhaps he dreaded the irritable disposition of Napoleon, and preferred residing in Paris—a place to which he is much attached.

"Besides Rostan, there was a sham Mameluke in the service of the Emperor, at his head-quarters. He was a native of Versailles, and though he wore the same sort of dress as Rostan, he was far from enjoying the same privileges. He was kept *en reserve* with the rest of the Imperial attendants, whereas Rostan was always near the person of the Emperor himself.

"At Napoleon's head-quarters a particular apartment was always fixed upon as a study for him and his Cabinet Secretary. This closet was looked upon as more important than the Emperor's own private chamber. When Napoleon bivouacked with his troops, a closet was immediately fitted up adjoining his own tent. In the centre stood a large table, over which was spread a map of the theatre of the war. During the Campaign of Saxony, he made use of Petri's map, the same to which he had been accustomed to refer in the year 1806; and on which he set great value. This map was already spread out in proper form before Napoleon entered the house, and struck over with pins of various colours, to mark the positions of the various corps d'armees and the enemy. This was the business of the Director of his Topographic Bureau, who was constantly engaged with him, and who was acquainted with the positions better than any other individual. This map was his inseparable companion
