

or arriving from any port or place in a colony or territory of his Britannic Majesty, that is or shall be, by the ordinary laws of navigation and trade, closed against vessels owned by citizens of the United States; and such vessel, that in the course of the voyage shall have touched at, or cleared out from, any port or place in a colony or territory of Great Britain, which shall or may be by the ordinary laws of navigation and trade aforesaid, open to vessels owned by citizens of the United States, shall, nevertheless, be deemed to have come from the port or place in the colony or territory of Great Britain, closed as aforesaid, against vessels owned by citizens of the United States, from which such vessel cleared out and sailed before touching at and clearing out from an intermediate and open port or place as aforesaid; and every such vessel, so excluded from the ports of the United States, that shall enter, or attempt to enter the same, in violation of this act, shall, with her tackle, apparel and furniture, together with the cargo on board such vessel, be forfeited to the United States.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That from and after the aforesaid thirtieth of September next, the owner, consignee or agent of every vessel owned wholly or in part by a subject or subjects of his Britannic Majesty, which shall have been duly entered in any port of the United States, and on board of which shall have been there laden for exportation any article or articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the United States, and on board of which shall have been there laden for exportation any article or articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the United States, other than provisions and sea stores necessary for the voyage, shall, before such vessel shall have been cleared outward at the custom-house, give bond in a sum double the value of such articles, with one or more sureties, to the satisfaction of the collector, that the article or articles so laden on board such vessel for exportation, shall be landed in some port or place other than a port or place in a colony or territory of his Britannic Majesty, which, by the ordinary laws of navigation and trade, is closed against vessels owned by citizens of the United States; and any such vessel that shall sail, or attempt to sail from any port of the United States, without having complied with the provisions aforesaid, by giving bond as aforesaid, shall, with her tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with the article or articles aforesaid, laden on board the same, as aforesaid, be forfeited to the United States: Provided always, that nothing in this act contained shall be so deemed or construed, as to violate any provision of the convention to regulate commerce between the territories of the United States and of his Britannic Majesty, signed the third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That all penalties and forfeitures incurred by force of this act, shall be sued for, recovered, distributed, and accounted for, and may be mitigated or remitted in the manner and according to the provisions of the revenue laws of the United States.

#### LONDON, MARCH 16.

The Duke of Cambridge will be married early in April at Cassell, and is expected to arrive in this country, with his bride, before the end of the month.

The father of the intended Duchess of Cambridge brings with him to this country his suite. A ready furnished lodging is to be prepared for him near Cambridge House.

The following is given as a copy of the letter which the Prince Regent wrote to the Duke of Wellington, on the occasion of the late attack on his person:—

CARLTON-HOUSE, FEB. 14.

MY DEAR FRIEND,—I cannot deny myself the pleasure of writing you a few lines, for the purpose of expressing to you both the happiness which I feel at the news which has just reached me of your escape, thanks to Divine Providence, from a base attempt formed against you, and the sentiments of horror and indignation with which I was filled at the infamy and baseness of such an atrocious attack. I can only in common with the rest of the nation, offer up thanksgiving to the supreme goodness of Divine Providence for having protected a man so important to the great interests of our country, as for the preservation of the general tranquillity of Europe. That you may continue to enjoy a life so precious to

us all, is the most ardent wish of your sincere and affectionate friend.

#### DUTCH AND FLANDERS' MAILS.

BRUSSELS, March 13.

The violent tempests which have succeeded each other for some days past have occasioned numerous disasters. A great number of vessels have been wrecked or stranded on the coast of this kingdom, as well as on those of France; both are covered with dead bodies and fragments of vessels. Travellers who have witnessed this afflicting sight, give the most heartrending description of it.

#### SPAIN.

The Officer entrusted with the fitting out of the Russian Fleet for America, is Admiral Valdes, who was lately in disgrace at Alicante, for having, when Governor of Cadiz, published in that city the Constitution issued by the Cortes. The Russian Minister at Constantinople has presented a fresh remonstrance to the Divan upon the delay, which has occurred in redressing the grievances of the Servians.

Rumour says, that at the interview which the Duke of Clarence had with Ministers on the subject of his marriage with Miss Wykeham, they stated the objection that there was to the Royal Assent; but intimated, that to an union with a Royal Princess of a Foreign Protestant House the assent of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council would be given. The Duke of Clarence consented to the arrangement, and an offer of an alliance with a youthful Prince of Hesse has been transmitted by a special messenger.—*Morning Chronicle*.

The two Houses of Parliament adjourned on Thursday night to the 2d of next month.

The Duke of Kent is expected to arrive in town from Brussels, to-day, in order to be present at the approaching nuptials of the Princess Elizabeth and the Prince of Hesse Hombourg.

By a Proclamation, dated Dublin, the 10th of March, the following Parishes are declared to be in a state of disturbance, and require an extraordinary establishment of Police, viz:—Naul, Westphalstown, Ballymadam, Garristown, Hollywood, Ballybog hill, and Palmerstown, in the Barony of Balruderary; and the Parish of Clonmethan, in the Barony of Nethercross, county of Dublin.

By a return at the Adjutant General's Office, dated March 7, 1818, it appears that the following is the effective strength of the British army, viz: Officers, 6849, Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates, 133,392.

#### PRIVATE CORRESPONDENCE.

PARIS, MARCH 19.

I hasten to inform you that the man who, according to all probability, fired the pistol at the Duke of Wellington, has been just arrested at Paris. Thus, it is, that the French police replies to those who have accused it of bestowing too little pains and vigilance in searching for the criminal.

According to the accounts which are given, and which I think are derived from a good source, this arrest is the more important, inasmuch, as it presented difficulties without number, and which could only have been surmounted by the well known address of the Parisian police. The person arrested is named *Canillon*, an ancient hussar, a man of the most blind devotedness, of extraordinary intrepidity, a true *Seid*, whom the intriguers of the Netherlands have but too well chosen with their views to be the instrument of crime.

The affair will soon be exposed in open day. It appears certain that the ramifications of the plot have not extended far beyond Belgium. It is an infernal conception of a very small number of French refugees, aided, by some Belgians who participate in their dangerous principles, and who cannot accustom themselves to the repose which Europe is enjoying.

The supposed assassin appears to be a Frenchman by birth. If he is so, all France disowns him, and feels the utmost horror at the crime. A Frenchman is more than all the world interested in just and exemplary punishment. *Damiens* and *Ravillac* were also Frenchmen; one villain, one sanguina-

ry monster, may unhappily exist in a nation composed of 28,000,000.

There is not the least doubt at present that the temptation to the crime has been most serious as well as abominable; and that it has only failed of its effect by circumstances independent of the will of the assassin.

#### FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

The last London papers speak of the general improvement of the manufactures, particularly in cotton and silk goods, which could not be purchased as fast as wanted, even at an advance of 15 per cent. in price, and that it was expected the British Parliament would soon be dissolved, and a general election for Members of the House of Commons take place.

FOOT-PADS.—Last Thursday evening, between the hours of 8 and 9 o'clock, a servant of Captain Wilson, of the 98th Regiment, was knocked down, and his pockets searched by two foot pads, on the road leading to the Indian House, but finding they contained no cash, decamped towards the City without doing him other harm. Persons will do well to be on their guard when travelling that road, as we believe this is not the first instance of the kind that has taken place. They no doubt took him for a passenger coming from the Steam Boat, which had just arrived.

#### From the Halifax Free Press.

On Saturday last a respectable meeting of the inhabitants interested in the Commerce and Fisheries of the Province took place, in consequence of recent intelligence from England relative to the Act authorising the entry of foreign vessels into certain ports in this and the neighboring Province, when a Petition to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor was framed, requesting that he would take the earliest opportunity to state, that very great advantage would result to this Province if foreign vessels were permitted to frequent this port; which has since been signed by as many persons as the short time before the sailing of the packet would permit. We hope some representation has been made to His Majesty's Ministers relative to an absurd plan, which we understand is on board the packet, from New-York, to make Campo Bello a free port. Such a measure would be ruinous to this Province, without producing any beneficial result to the mother country.
