GOVERNOR has received the following Order in Council, and publishes the same y direction of the Right Honourable Earl BATHURST, His MAJESTY's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

By Command of His F.xeellency, H. H. CARMICHAEL, Hep. Dec.

At the Court at Carlton House, the 27th May, 1818, Present His Rryal Highness the PAINCE REGENT

in Council. THEREAS by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament oled " An Act to allow for three years and until six months after the comm st ment of the then next Session of Parliament, the Importation into Ports specially es appointed by His Majesty, within the « Provinces of Nova-Scotia and New-Brunswick, of the articles therein enu-"merated, and the Re-exportation thereof " from such Ports," it is enacted, That it shall and may be lawful in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the Subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into and export from such Ports within the Province of Nova-Scotia or New-Brunswick as shall be specially appointed for that purpose, certain articles in the said Act enumerated, any thing in any law to the contrary notwithstanding : Hu Royal Highness the Prince Regent, by visue of the powers vested in His Majesty by the above recited Act, is pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That from and after the date of this Order, and during the continuance of the Act above recited, until further order made thereon, it shall be lawful in any British built ship er vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the Subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into the Pert of Halifax, in Nova-Scotia, and the Port of Saint John, in New-Brunswick, any Scantling, Planks, Staves, Heading-Boards, Shingles, Huops, Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or live Stock of any sort, Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Pease, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley or Grain of any sort, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Fruits, Seeds, and Tobacco: Provided that such articles shall in all cases where the same shall be imported in Foreign vessels, be of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the Country to which the vessels importing the same shall belong: And that it shall be lawful, in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, to export from the said Ports, any of the said articles, either to the United Kingdom, or to any other of His Majesty's pos-

And it is hereby further ordered, That it shall and may be lawful in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the Subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to export from the Ports of Halifax, in Nova-Scotia, and Saint John, in New-Brunswick, any Cypsum, Grindstones, or other produce or manufacture of the said Provinces, and also any produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in the War Indies, or any goods whatever which shall have been legally imported into the said Provinces : Provided, that none of the said articles shall be exported from the Ports above named, to any Foreign Country or Place, in any Foreign tessal, unless such Foreign vessel shail belong

to the Country to which the said articles shall be exported: And the Right Honounable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. IAS, BULLER. (Signed)

FREE PORT ACT.

[MAY 8, 1814.] THEREAS, by an Act passed in the 47th year of his Majerty Reign, intituled, " An Act for permitting until the 25th day of March, 1809, and from thence to the end of the next Session of Parliament, the importation of certain enumerated Articles into the British Colos pies on the Continent of North America, from the United States of America, and the octation of other enumerated Articles from the same Colonies to the said States;" which said Act was continued and extended by an Act, passed in the 49th year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to authorise His Majesty to permit, until the 25th day of March, 1812, any Goods and Commodities to be imported into and exported from Nova-Scotia and New-Brunswick, in any ship or vessel whatsoever," which last mentioned Act was continued by an Act, passed in the 52d year of His Majesty's reign, sundry Articles were allowed to be imported into and exported from, certain Ports in His Majesty's Colonies of Nova-Scotia and New-Brunswick, from and to certain foreign ports, which Acts have now expired :-- And whereas, great advantage resulted to the said Colonies, from the facilities given to the Trade therefore by the said Acts; And whereas, it is expedient to grant similar facilities at the present time -Be it therefore Enacted, by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same, That, from and after the passing of this Act, it shall and may be lawful in any BRITISH built ship or vessels, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the Subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into such Ports as shall be specially appointed for that purpose by His Majesty, within the Province of Nova-Scotia or New-Brunswick, the following Articles, viz. Scantling, Planks, Staves, Heading-boards, Shingles, Hoops, Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Slock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley, or Grain of any sort; Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Fruits, Seeds and Tobacco.

II. PROVIDED ALWAYS, and be at further enacted, That none of the aforesaid Articles shall be imported into the said Ports, so to be specially appointed, in foreign vessels, unless the said Articles shall be of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the country to which the vessels importing the same shall belong.

III. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful to re-export any of the said Articles either to the United Kingdom, or to any other of His Majesty's possessions, in any British-huilt ship or vessel, owned

and navigated according to law. IV. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful in any British ship or vessel, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the subjects of any Sov. or State in amity with his Majesty, to export from the said Perts, so to be appointed for that purpose, Gypsum, Grindstones, or other produce or so, any produce or manufacture of the U. V. PROVIDED always, and be it further enacted, that none of the aforesaid Articles shall be exported from the said ports, so to be appointed, to any Foreign country or place in any Foreign vessel, unless such Foreign vessel shall belong to the country to which the said articles shall be exported.

VI. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to make such rules and regulations for the Importation and Exportation of Goods and Commodities as aforesaid, at the said ports, with such penalties and forfeitures for the breach thereof, as shall seem fit and necessary to his Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid.

VII. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall continue in force during th ing of the same; and until sin weeks after the commencement of the then next Session of Parliament.

Regulations respecting the granting of Licences to cut Pine Timber.

TO Licence to be granted to cut Timber on Land reserved for the use of the Crown.

LICENCES to be granted only to British subjects, with condition to be forfeited if assigned to Aliens, and every Licence to specify the quantity to be cut, and to be limited as to time; and no Timber fit for the Navy to be permitted to be cut for private use: Som

No Isicence to be granted to cut Timber on Lands for which application has been made for Grants, and every applicant for a Licence, to describe particularly the Land on which he wishes to cut, and the quantity of Timber, and accompany his application with a Certificate, that the Land has not been applied for to be granted.

ALL applications for Licences to be handed in the first place to the Deputy Surveyor of the Woods, who, if he thinks fit to recommend the application, will lodge it in the Secretary's Office, to be laid, in the u al manner, before a Committee of His Majesty's Council for consideration; and any three Members of the Council to be a Committee for the purpose of considering the applications in question,

And Applicants for Licences are further notified that the FEES to be demanded by the Surveyors of the Woods, are now fixed at twenty shillings for each Licence, and that no other Fee or Emolument is to be demanded or taken excepting the usual Fees in the other Departments through which the application for a Licence must pass. THEREAS it appears by a P clamation of the Lieutenant-G vernor of His Britancic Majesty's Provin of New-Brunswick, bearing date the 10 of April lase, and officially communicate by His Envoy Extraordinary and Minist Plenipotentiary residing in the Unite States, to this Government, that the R gularions on the subject of the Trade Plaster of Paris, prohibiting the exportation thereof to certain Ports of the United Star which were in force in the said Provin at the time of the enactment of the Act Congress of the United States, intitule "An Act to regulate the Trade in Plast " of Paris," passed on the third day March, 1817, have been and are discont nued:

Now, therefore, I, James Munroe President of the United States, do hereby declare that fact, and that the restriction imposed by the said Act of Congress, shall. from the date hereof, cease and be discontimued, in relation to the said Province of New-Brunswick

Given under my Hand, at the City of Washington, the fourth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and in the forty-third year of the Independence of the United States.
