

The latter is situated to the westward of the only landing-place on the Island, about three or four miles in the interior. The only access to it is a winding way up the Ladder-hill, at the top of which is a strong battery. — The accounts state that it was considered by every person not only the most pleasant residence on the Island, but that all chance of escape was rendered impossible, as any person approaching, could be seen at a distance; and as there was only one path, a few sentinels would be sufficient for the purpose of guarding it. — The fortifications on Ladder-hill are represented to be of the most commanding description, large cannon looking perpendicularly down both on the narrow pass and towards the sea. Some of them are 32 and 44 pounders; they are swung in chains, and could in an instant be levelled at any object, however much below the range of the guns. By means of a telegraph at the house of Mr. Leech, communications could be had in a few seconds with the Governor's house, or with any part of the Island.

The greatest attention continued to be paid to all vessels sailing from the Island. On its being made known by signal that a vessel is about to sail from the Island, the officer on duty makes himself sure that Bonaparte is at his residence or to speak in the language of the Island, he sights him. The signal is then made for the vessel to depart, and if she does not instantly leave her anchor, the batteries commence firing, and continue until the vessel has cleared the Bay.

**MANCHESTER, July 21.**

"We are extremely sorry that we are not able to state that the effects of the combination have subsided. The spinners who have publicly disavowed a most inflammatory placard, tending to excite not only discontent but disorder and violence, have certainly behaved very peaceably; but evidently under training, in order that their formidable processions might induce the few spinners who remain industriously at work, to leave it, and to overawe their employers into compliance with their demands. We are sorry for their conduct, because we cannot but think it injurious to themselves and their families. The same spirit, we are concerned to add, has broken out in other trades.

Yesterday morning, soon after midnight, a fire was discovered in the cotton factory of Messrs. Ormond and Hardcastle, of Bolton, which in a short time consumed the mill and all its valuable machinery, amounting in the whole we understand to £40,000. Report states the fire to have commenced close to the door, so that all ingress to assist in putting it out was at once prohibited. Strong suspicions from this and other circumstances, are entertained, that the conflagration was not the effect of accident but design. If this be correct, we trust that the vile incendiaries will very soon be discovered, and brought to the condign punishment they so justly merit.

**NEWFOUNDLAND, August 29.**

A little before twelve o'clock, on Thursday night last, this town was again alarmed by the cry of Fire! which was discovered issuing with great fury from a house belonging to Mr. Follett, in the occupation of Mrs. Bulger, near the Ordnance Yard; and although the wind was light from the N.E. before the Engines could be brought into action, it had extended to the houses adjoining the East to the new house of James Brine on the West; and to the premises of March & Lusk on the opposite side of the street; and considerable apprehension was entertained for the safety of the town, when happily, the great exertions of the people, aided by the army and navy, succeeded in confining its progress to the immediate square from whence the Fire originated. About three o'clock it was completely got under, but not until nine dwelling-houses and one of the Ordnance Stores were entirely consumed.

The Offices of the Ordnance Department were separated from the Store by so small a space, that their preservation may be considered wonderful, and effected only by the most strenuous exertions, assisted by the favorable point in which the wind was. They were several times on fire, as was the house of Mrs. McCawley, to the Eastward, but were fortunately extinguished.

The amount of loss, comparatively speaking, is not great; but some individuals have suffered severely—several of them found difficulty in escaping with their lives, scarce having time to save an article to cover them. We believe there were no lives lost, but two men were much burnt in making their way into the streets through the flames.

The cause of the Fire, we understand, may be attributed to carelessness, and irregular conduct in the occupier of the house where it broke out. A quantity of dry chips, it appears, were kept under the stairs convenient to the fire-place, and a bed of shavings was also in some part of the house; but whether it proceeded from the fire on the hearth communicating with the chips, or a candle among the shavings, or from what other cause, we have not been able to learn.

**AUG. 9.**

We have already adverted to the great improvement of the revenue for the present year; and it is highly gratifying to find that it continues to increase in a very extraordinary manner. We understand that the four last weeks yield an excess of upwards of eight hundred and fifty thousand pounds, as compared with the like period in 1817.

An article from Madrid expresses an expectation that the differences between Spain and the United States of America, will occupy the attention of the Allied Sovereigns at the meeting at Aix-la-Chapelle. It is reported that a convoy of fourteen Spanish vessels, which sailed from Cadiz on the 24th June last, had all been captured by Insurgent privateers cruising off St. Vincent, and that the crews which were put on board of one of the captured vessels, had landed at Vigo. M. de Cazas, the French minister of police, is said to have paid a visit on Monday last to His Royal Highness Monsieur. This in the actual state of party politics, is a circumstance which may be thought worthy of some attention, more particularly as the private letters from Paris mention a rumor that the Ultra Royalist conspiracy is to be hushed up.

Las Cases it is said has been for some time endeavouring to prevail upon the Allied Sovereigns to mitigate the lot of Bonaparte.

**AUG. 11.**

The Duke and Duchess of Clarence disembarked at Calcut on the 4th inst. from the Royal Sovereigns yacht. Their Royal Highnesses set out the next day for Germany.

The Duke of Wellington had a long audience of the PRINCE REGENT yesterday.
