

St. Helena, he went ashore in the boat, climbed the rocks, and got to Longwood, where he passed some time with the domestics, and even saw and conversed with Bonaparte. The next night he went again, and took a comrade, and again conversed with Bonaparte, effecting his return to his ship both times without being discovered. But having boasted of what he had done, he was put in Irons and sent home.

The marriage between a French Count, who was an Aide-de-Camp of Bonaparte, and the daughter of Lord Keith, is said to have led to the discovery of the clause in the old Scotch law, which has excited so much surprise, and created so much confusion. As the new Bill is not to be retrospective, the fortunate husband will not be removed, though the match, we understand, has been in the highest degree displeasing to the Noble Family.

LONDON, JUNE 12.

Turin, May 30.

"On the 8th inst. a British force, consisting of two ships of the line, a frigate, and sloop of war, entered the roads of Algiers, to support the reclamation of our Consul, who, for some time past, had in vain protested against the sequestration and pillage of the cargo of a Piedmontese merchant-ship. At first the new Dey pretended that he was not responsible for the injustice of his predecessor; but he afterwards thought proper to pay the amount reclaimed. He declared, that he had himself acted wrong in taking the King's flag from the ship called *Les quatre Evêques* (which was compelled, in defiance of the remonstrances of the Consul, to proceed to Alexandria); he however, promised to restore it, with a suitable indemnity.

"The plague continues its ravages at Algiers; the Dey has just lost a son and a daughter, who have fallen victims to this pestilence. One of his favourites is also attacked."

We feel much pleasure in announcing the marriage of His Royal Highness the Duke of KENT with the Princess MARIA LOUISA VICTORIA, of Linangen, sister of His Royal Highness Prince LEOPOLD, of Saxe Coburg. This happy event was mentioned last night by his Royal Highness the Duke of SUSSEX, at a public dinner at the Freemason's Tavern.

The squadron from Cadiz, destined for South America, sailed on the 21st ult. with sealed orders.

JUNE 18.

Russia does not seem to have arranged all her affairs with the Porte. The latest intelligence from Constantinople states, that on the 11th of April a new conference was held between Baron Stroganoff, the Russian Minister, and the Turkish Minister, but the latter would listen to no definitive determination either with respect to Servia, or the other indemnities claimed by Russia.

Letters from Bucharest, in Wallachia, dated the 17th March, announce that an earthquake has destroyed the great and flourishing town of Philippopolis, in Rumania. This town counted at least 70,000 inhabitants. We are assured that it has been altogether swallowed up in the subterranean abyss, and that its traces are in vain sought for. The positive date of this disastrous event is not stated.

By an arrival from Bombay, we have papers as late as April. Of the military operations, the British say that a force had been dispatched after Rajee Row, another for the reduction, and a fourth in great strength was to appear in Candesh. Gen. Munro was to reduce the southern Provinces, and the force from Bombay was to be in the Concan, and measures were to be adopted to deliver the Raja of Suttara from the favour of Rajee Row.

The Bombay Gazette says, Gen. Hislop had notified that the army under Gen. Keir was no longer necessary in the service. Gen. Keir was therefore permitted by the Governor and Council to return to Bombay, with every testimonial of his services.
