### JOHN QUINCY ADAMS.

The documents, are 12 in number, with five inclosures, A. B. C. D. E. They are very voluminous. The following is an abstract of them:—

No. 1. Is a Letter from the Spanish Minister to the Secretary of State, remonstrating against the expedition of Sir Gregor McGregor, then on foot.

No. 2. Is also a Letter from the Spanish Minister to the Secretary of State, dated December 6, 1817, remonstrating against the measures, just announced in the President's Message, of the suppression of the Establishments at Amelia Island and Galvezton.

No. 3. Is a Letter from the same to the same, of the 10th December, 1817, announcing his readiness and desire to renew the negotiations on the existing differences between the United States and Spain, and to bring the same to a speedy termination.

No. 4. Is a Letter from the Secretary of State to the Spanish Minister, appointing a time to communicate with him on the subject of his last note, and assuring him of the satisfaction of the President at the information it conveyed.

No. 5. Is a long Letter from the Minister of Spain, of 29th December last, containing a treatise relative to the Eastern Boundary of Louisiana, and advancing a new all the claims heretofore set up by Spain in this respect.

No. 6. Is a letter of still greater length, of the 5th January last, from the Spanish Minister, and of the same character, respecting the Western Boundary of Louisiana.

No. 7. Is a Letter, also of considerable length, of the 8th January last, respecting the claims of the United States on Spain for spoliation.

No. 8. Is a Letter from the Spanish Minister of the same date, making a formal protest against the actual occupation of Amelia Island, just then announced by the President to Congress.

No. 9. Is a Letter from the Secretary of State to the Spanish Ministers, under date of the 15th January, waving a reply to the long Letters of M. De Onis, on the ground, of the sterility of the subjects of them, and their frequent discussion heretofore; proposing a negotiation on specific terms; justifying the occupation of Amelia Island; and expressing a desire to proceed to conclude a treaty, without reverting to a course of proceeding, the only result of which must be further procrastination.

No. 10. Is a Letter from the Spanish Minister, of date January 24, complaining that a discussion of the old topics is avoided, and intimating that it must be because his arguments and the claims of Spain are unanswerable, &c. proposing a different project of a Treaty; and renewing the protest against the occupation of Amelia Island and Galvezton.

No. 11. Is another Letter from the Spanish Minister, soliciting a reply to his former Letters; recapitulating his former points, and offering to submit the differences between the United States and Spain to the mediation of any one or more of the European powers.

No. 12. Is a very long and able reply from the Secretary of State to the several Letters of the Spanish Minister; complying with his wish for a particular reply to his representations, and commencing at the source of each of the subjects of difference, and exploring them to their present state. This letter, framed with much precision and force, may be considered as conclusive.

### LATEST FROM EUROPE.

We have received our London files to the 4th February, and Liverpool papers to the 6th, by the Triton, arrived yesterday. The London papers are filled with proceedings of the British Parliament.

A bill to repeal the law for suspending the Habeas Corpus act, passed the Lords the 28th and the Commons the 29th Jan. In the discussion, the Attorney General said, he should move the Court of King's Bench to discharge all recognizances under the law.—They have all been discharged.

Votes of condolence to the Queen, and Prince Leopold, passed both Houses. In the Commons that to the Queen was dis-

sented to by Messrs. Calcraft and Taylor. Sir Francis Burdett had presented several petitions for a Parliamentary Reform.

On the 3d Feb. the Prince Regent presented numerous papers to Parliament, relating to the internal state of the country, in a sealed Green Bag. [Papers thus communicated are confidential, and are always referred to a secret committee.

Lord Stanhope, an opposition Peer, in a debate, said, he heard with great pain a report, that the allied troops were to be withdrawn from France. He said he had strong fears of the effect of such a measure in France. Lord Liverpool, in reply, said his Lordship's fears were groundless.

The Duke of Wellington, after a short visit to England, returned to Paris the 1st Feb. with his lady, and staff.—He is charged with an important mission respecting the private pecuniary demands on France. Some late discussions at Paris are said to have satisfied the Allied Sovereigns that they cannot safely withdraw nor diminish their army in France.

Paris accounts say, that all the points of a treaty for the dislocation of the allied army in France had been agreed on.

A great European Army was to be kept up at Frankfort, to maintain the peace of Europe.

Another reduction of the price of bread had been made in Paris.

The army, Peace Establishment, of France, is fixed at 240,000 men.

Count Lanjuhaies has announced his intention to move for the recal of all Frenchmen banished without trial, as choose to submit to a trial.

The Algerines have no less than nine picaroons in full cruise in the Mediterranean, and seven near the entrance of the Straights.

A new sect has sprung up in Switzerland, whose doctrine is a compound of moderate Mahometanism, English Methodism and German Quietism.

Mr. Vansittart had announced, that he means to pay off the loan of six millions from the Bank.

LONDON, JANUARY 6.

Private Letter from Paris, January 3.

A circumstance took place here the other night which shews that there still exists a great enmity on the part of some of the French towards the English. As Captain B. was walking in the Rue de la Paix, he felt himself jostled by a man, and on turning round to demand what he meant by it, was immediately struck. A scuffle ensued, which ended in Captain B. challenging the Frenchman, who wished to fight with swords (being a remarkably good swordsman); Captain B. replied, "that he would fight him with pistols, and not with swords." The other exclaimed, "Why do you wear a sword then if you don't know how to use it?" They exchanged cards; but it appeared next morning that the Frenchman had given him a false address, and no where to be found. After a little time, it was discovered that he had decamped to his Regiment, which was quartered at some distance from Paris. Having no excuse to avoid the combat, he returned to Paris, and a meeting accordingly took place last Monday. Captain B. wounded his antagonist in the groin, and he is now dangerously ill of his wound.—Captain B. shewed the greatest firmness throughout, and the whole affair reflects the highest credit upon him. It is to be hoped that this will put a stop to those frequent insults which an Englishman but too often meets with in Paris from disaffected individuals.

JANUARY 11.

Captain Buchan, of the Pike sloop of war, recently returned from Newfoundland, is appointed to the expedition to the North Pole. Captain Ross is the officer who proceeds thither. They are to be accompanied by four Lieutenants, one attached to each of the Captains, and the others to command the two vessels to act as tenders. Two of the ships, as we before stated, proceed up Davis' Straits, the extent or termination of which is utterly unknown; and the other two direct, if possible, to the Pole, between Iceland and Greenland. The ships are to be ready for sea by the first week in March.

THE BERKELY PEERAGE.—A whisper is in circulation, that it is intended to bring the question relative to this Peerage again before Parliament. The only reason for such an application must be the discove-

ry of new and important witnesses. We know not that this discovery has been made, but rumour confidently asserts it, especially as to an elderly witness, whose absence was frequently spoken of during the examinations. An eminent Chancery Barrister is said to have the conduct of the affair. The young Earl who is now of age, has never celebrated his majority. It is reported indeed, that he regrets the decision which counteracted the wishes of his father, and that his affection for his elder brother is such, as to render the prospect of the application here spoken of matter of pleasure to himself. Whatever may be the merits of the main question, upon which we do not pretend to be informed, this disposition can be viewed only with approbation and esteem.

### FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

21st APRIL, 1818.

The Mails from Halifax and St. John (due yesterday) had not arrived when this paper was put to press.

The death of Lord Byron was reported in London; but not fully credited.

From the N. B. Courier, 4th April. Arrived, Wednesday, brig Clear-Air, Adams, Demerara, rum, sugar & mollasses, to H. Johnston, & Co.

The Protector, Simpson, hente had arrived at Greenock. The Friends, Gilbert Henderson, Barrett, and Paris, hence, and Pallas, Halifax, arrived at Liverpool January 21.

The Antelope, Garrison, hence ar. at Tobago, from whence she was to proceed to New-York.

The Mungo Park, Leavitt, had arrived at the Windward Islands, and proceeded to Jamaica for a market.

The Caroline, Duncan, hence for Aberdeen, was found at sea bottom upwards, on the 23d December, and towed into the Orkneys.

London, Jan. 23. It is now reported, that Sir Charles Colville will be the new Governor at Halifax.—Sir L. Cole, and Sir J. Kempt are also spoken of.—Star.

A Treaty between Great Britain and Spain, for the Abolition of the Slave Trade, was signed at Madrid, Sept. 29d, 1817.—To take place May 30, 1820.—Courier.

From the French Frontier, Jan. 20.

On account of the debates respecting the law for recruiting the army, and the probability of its passing, people begin again to look publicly at the efforts that are to be made to reduce the Island of St. Domingo under the dominion of France; which, it is said, have been hitherto deferred on account of the unfavorable situation in which France was placed. It is supposed, that as soon as the army is complete, volunteers will be invited for this expedition, and particularly that the legion of Prince Hohenloe will be employed in it. [It is much more probable that the object of these military preparations is to relieve France of the Allied troops, in case they do not voluntarily withdraw, than to attempt the recovery of St. Domingo.]

FRANKFORT, Jan. 22.

The fate of the Count Las Casas is at length decided. Since his arrival in our city, he has been constantly guarded by a Prussian Commissioner; he is now going to be placed under the protection of Austria, which grants him an asylum in its dominions.
