Our readers could not fail to be highly gratified in observing that the Courier of yesterday, in replying to some anti-ministerial accusations of the Morning Chronicle, incimates in a manner sufficiently plain, though with visible reluctance, that the interference of the Allied Sovereigns in the affairs of South America is not meant to be supported by force of arms. Spain is to offer favourable terms of reconciliation to the revolted States, and the great powers of Europe are to guarantee that these terms shall be faithfully executed. As far as this goes, their mediation will be perfectly harmless, as we may be quite sure that any treaty which proposes the return of the South American States to the dominion of Spain will be as ineffectual as the proclamations for the suppression of vice. The Courier, however, insinuates that if entreaties should fail, compulsion ought then to be employed. Such a crusade would be as destructive to those who engaged in it, as that which was formerly undertaken against infidels for the deliverance of the holy land, and would probably terminate in the same manner.
