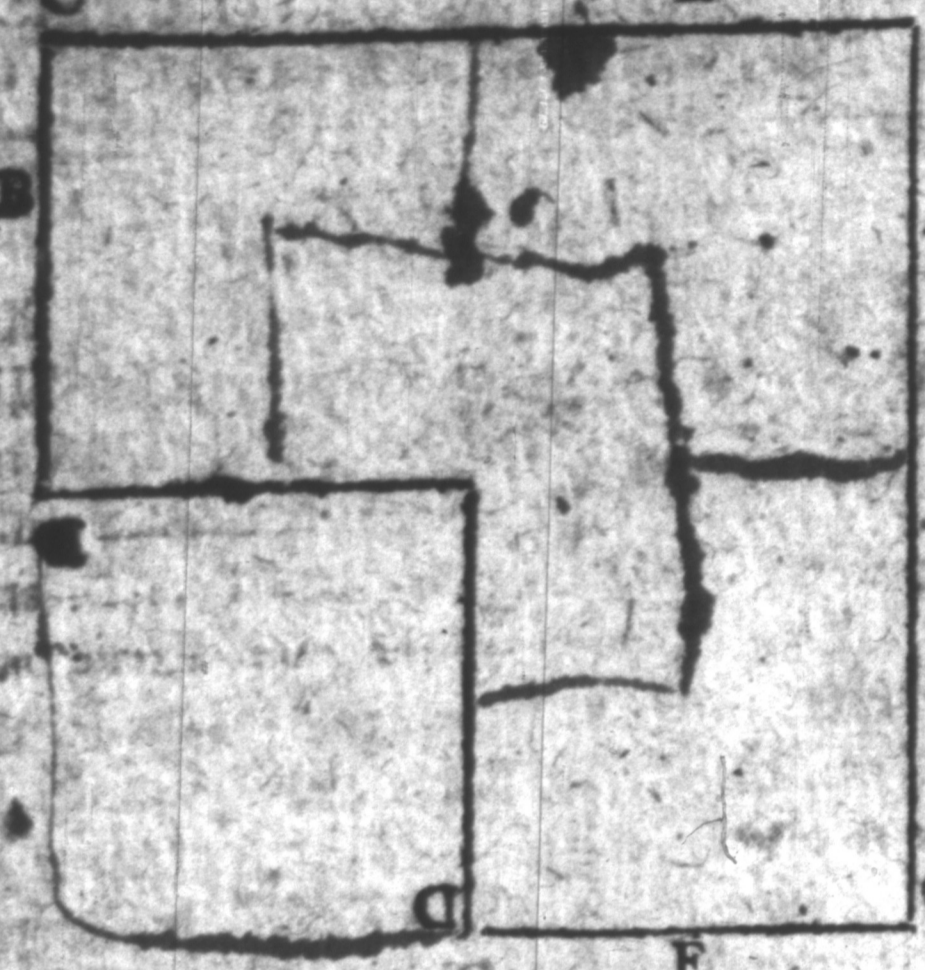


MR. LUGGIN.

FREE MASONS.

EDINBURGH, Dec. 6.—The 30th of November falling this year upon Sunday, the Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons assembled on Monday, the 1st inst. in Freemasons' Hall, Edinburgh, for the purpose of appointing Grand Office Bearers for the ensuing year.

At the conclusion of the election, upon the motion of the Right Worshipful the Master of St. Luke, in a speech of much feeling and interest, seconded by the Right Worshipful Proxy Master of the Mother Lodge, Kilwinning, a respectful Address of sincere condolence was unanimously voted to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent and Patron of the Order, upon the late calamity which his Royal Highness and the Country have sustained by the death of her Royal Highness the Princess Charlotte Augusta. As the last tribute of respect to the extraordinary merits of her Royal Highness, the Most Worshipful Grand Master had recalled the arrangements which had been made for celebrating the Anniversary of

their tutelary Saint, in the usual convivial manner, and had issued instructions for assembling the brethren, and devoting the day to solemn and religious worship. In consequence of these instructions, which met with the warmest approbation from the brethren at large, immediately after the election was concluded, the whole body, consisting of upwards of a thousand brethren, in deep mourning, walked in solemn masonic procession from Freemasons' Hall to the High Church, where the Rev. Dr. Lee, Chaplain to the Grand Lodge, delivered a most appropriate and pathetic discourse, from the prayer of Solomon at the dedication of the Temple, Second Chronicles, chap. vi. 20th, 28th, 29th, 30th, and 31st verses.

After Divine Service the different Lodges returned in procession from the High Church to Freemasons Hall. The streets were lined with a party of the Scots Greys, and the band of the 88th Regiment accompanied the procession, performing Sacred Music, with their drums muffled. Though the streets were crowded to excess, the utmost regularity prevailed. During the procession not a murmur was heard; the feelings of every spectator harmonized with those of the craft, and the sympathy at an event which fills the nation with such sincere sorrow and regret, appeared visible in the countenances of every individual, and gave a character to the scene at once striking and impressive.

WONDERFUL CHASE.

CAMBRAY, Nov. 4.—The hounds of his Grace the Duke of Wellington, on the 30th of last month, discovered a most enormous boar in the forest of Wilincourt. The animal, on being disturbed, passed rapidly into the forest of Ardipart, which he completely traversed; being then hard scented by the dogs, he took to the plain, where he was vigorously pursued by hounds and sportsmen, and ere he could reach another wood, was brought to bay. The animal then became ferocious, and destroyed all the dogs that approached him, when one of his Grace's Aides-de-Camp plunged his spear into his side. This only rendered the beast more savage, when his Grace himself, seeing his dogs would be destroyed, rode up, and with his spear gave the coup de grace; the animal made a desperate effort to wound his Grace's horse, and fell in the attempt. The peasants say he is the largest boar that has been seen for some years. Of the numerous field that started in the pursuit, only five, besides his Grace, reached the end.
