LODA.

LONDON, JUNE 6.

We have received this morning the Paris Papers of Sunday last. There is no material variation in the French Funds. It is asserted, in an article from Hanover, that the Duke of CLARENCE is expected there, in his way to the residence of his future Bride.

By the Hamburg Mail arrived this morning, we learn, with regret, that Field Marshal Prince Barclay de Tolly, one of those noble warriors whose swords were drawn for the emancipation of Europe, is no more. His constitution was shattered by the fatigues of war, and the severe wounds he had received. He expired on the 25th ult.

An article from Vienna, communicates, also, some painful intelligence respecting the health of Prince Schwartzberg, who is stated to be in great danger from an inflammation of the liver. If we could permit ourselves to question the will of Providence, we might be tempted to repine at a dispensation, which denies to the instruments of so much good to mankind, the calm satisfaction

of witnessing the blessing they have contributed to bestow.

Prince Oscar, the son of Bernadotte, has been appointed Lieutenant-General of the Norwegian army.

GENERAL ELECTION.

Every part of the Kingdom now gives "dreadful note of preparation" for the General Election. The contest will prove extremely severe, and more new faces will appear in the House of Commons, than have been remembered for the last fifty years.

Letters from Ireland state, that ever since the beginning of April, the weather has been uncommonly warm, the trees almost all out in full blossom, the fruit in set, and the corn mostly in ear, with every appearance of an abundant harvest.

Every description of crop is looking well in Scotland.

The Bill for regulating the Naturalization of Foreigners was carried through the House of Lords, as it had been the evening before through the Commons. The usual forms of the House were of course dispensed with; and had not this been the case, as we justly observed by Lord LIVERPOOL, the Bill must either have had a retrospective effect, or else it would have afforded means for every Alien in the kingdom to have naturalized himself by means of the obsolete Scottish statute, a statute probably wise and politic in its day, when it was necessary to hold out great inducements to foreigners as well as natives to come in aid of the public credit of the country. No such necessity now exists; and nobody will pretend that any evil is to be apprehended from altogether doing away with that mode of naturalization. On the other hand, it is very obvious that a great and serious evil might take place if the fomenters of Revolution, with those immense riches which they have been suffered to take out of France were to come here and carry on their machinations with impunity.

A small property measuring little more than four Scotch acres, part of the lands of Broughton, near Edinburgh, was exposed by judicial sale in the Parliament House on Wednesday last, at the upset price of £991. 7s. 4d. and brought the enormous sum of £3300 being at the rate of about £800 per acre. The sue-duties and other burthens on the property amounted to £23 13s. 2d. yearly, and the present rental is only £62 18s. 3d. Within those 45 years this same property was sold by one of our wealthiest hospitals for £335 so that during that short period it has risen to nearly ten times its original price.—This is another proof of the prosperity of the country, and of the increasing value of landed property.
