

HALIFAX, Oct. 2.

It is asserted in several late London papers, that the Army of Occupation is to evacuate the French territories early in the present month, (October;) but, by referring to the Treaty of 1815, it will be seen, that such an event cannot be contemplated to take place previous to the 20th of November ensuing—nor even then, unless it shall be determined by the Congress of Sovereigns at Aix la Chapelle, that—“the motives which induced the measure are no longer necessary.”—With this exception, the Foreign troops were to continue in possession of the respective posts assigned to them, for the space of five years, from the date of the Treaty.

The Belette, near St. Michael's, fell in with a suspicious looking schooner, which approached within gun-shot, without showing any colours: the Belette hoisted her ensign and pendant, and fired a gun, when the schr. returned the fire, and immediately made off under all sail.—The Belette gave chase, and was coming up with her so fast, as to oblige her to throw all her guns and boats overboard, but the wind unfortunately dying away, she escaped.

Upon the arrival of the Belette, at St. Michael, the British Consul gave information of the schooner having plundered a number of vessels bound into, and sailing from that place; that she belonged to Arica, and was manned principally by Americans.—Royal Gazette.

From the official returns laid before Parliament, it appears that the amount of corn and grain imported into Great Britain during the year ending on the 5th of January last, was 17,269,848 bushels, and during the year preceding, 8,828,376 bushels. The amount of meal and flour imported in 1817, was 1,166,412 cwt. and in 1826, 141,038 cwt.

At a late meeting of the friends of Sir THOMAS ANDREW STRANGE, at Madras, a Committee, at the head of which was the Rt. Hon. the Governor, was appointed to address him.—Requesting that he would be pleased to sit to some eminent artist in England for his Portrait, to be placed in the Court House, as a memorial of his having been the first Chief Justice in the Supreme Court, and exercised the highest judicial functions of the Presidency, for a period of nearly eighteen years, with equal honor to himself, and benefit to the interests of public justice.—We too, in Halifax, have an excellent portrait of this worthy man; and a strong recollection of the virtues and abilities for which he was justly esteemed by all classes in this community.

QUEBEC, AUGUST 27, 1818. MINERAL WATER.—A valuable Mineral Spring of limpid water, supposed to be Chalybeate, recently discovered near the Church of Sainte Marie, Nouvelle Beauce, has excited considerable attention.—It is said, that some of the Medical Gentlemen of the city intended to visit St. Marie's for the purpose of ascertaining its qualities. The discovery of this Spring, with the many local advantages of that beautiful parish, may probably make La Beauce a place of fashionable resort during summer months.—The Spring is on ground belonging to the Hon. Mr. Justice Perrault who, with Seigniors of the parish, Messrs. Taschereaus, are, we understand, disposed to grant every facility to Gentlemen desirous of making Country Seats, by granting eligible building spots on their Domain along the river Chaudiere, which, in this part, is upwards of two acres in breadth.—A Brick Factory is already established near the Parish Church, and it is said, that an elegant Brick Cottage may be built at one third less expence than if with either stone or wood.

FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

30TH OCTOBER, 1818.

Since our last publication we have been politely favored with the loan of New-York papers, brought by the sloop Regent, to 30th ult. inclusive, but they contain nothing of importance.

A violent gale was experienced at Bermuda on the 25th and 30th August—the houses and fruit trees sustained great injury—several boats were stove to pieces, and many driven to sea—vessels lying in the port of Hamilton suffered severely—a Bermuda schooner sunk with a cargo of rum and molasses, and eight vessels were driven on shore—several lost their rudders, bowsprits, &c. and was otherwise injured.

It is understood on Change that the Chancellor of the Exchequer has already paid into the Bank £2,000,000 out of the £9,000,000, due at the end of the year.

Sept. 24, lat 43 56, long, 53 20, the brig Trader, Capt. Gammel, from Greenock for Halifax, passed the hull of a brig, sunk to the water's edge—lower mast gone, about 4 feet from the deck; bowsprit gone, one pump standing—stern green, and a green streak carried round—apparently a new vessel. Oct. 5, at 3 A. M. saw a Light—believed it to be that of Sambro—at 4 stood in, as we supposed, for Halifax harbour—at 5 o'clock the light was extinguished—Hove to till 6; when we found ourselves in Lunenburg bay.—This light, Capt. Gammel thinks, must have been either on Ironbound Island, or on the shore in its immediate neighbourhood.

The above is taken from the log-book of the brig Trader, which vessel came near being wrecked by means of the deception; and it is earnestly hoped, that the act of thus exposing false lights on the coast—dangerous at any time, but eminently so in the dark and boisterous nights of the present and approaching season may be cautiously avoided in future. LONDON, AUG. 14.

Yesterday an extraordinary sensation was made on the Stock Exchange, by a house of the first respectability having come into the market, and sold stock in every way, both for money and time to an immense amount.—This circumstance, coupled with the tone which the government journals have held ever since the Americans took possession of the Floridas, gave rise to suspicion that there is a correspondence on foot not altogether of an amicable nature. Consols which opened at 77½ left off at 76½. The sales were made with so much secrecy, that the fact was scarcely known till towards the end of the day, otherwise the effect would probably have been greater, and if the same speculation should be continued this day, the influence of it will be sensibly felt. The monied men have not been inattentive to

the pains which have been taken to inflame the public mind, and to prepare the nation for a rupture.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—A considerable number of vessels of war have been ordered to be fitted out for foreign service; some of which are for the W. Indies—the Salisbury, Creole, Acorn, Sophia, Parthian, Bann, Cyrene, Euryalus and Ontario, are among the number to be put in commission. The present guard-ships, to save the expence of fitting out, are to be kept in service. Several of our first rate ships of war, which were supposed to be in a sound state, have, upon examination, been found very defective.

London, August 31.

The following distressing information has been received from Ceylon:—

Extract of a Letter from the Agent to Lloyd's, dated Cape of Good Hope, June 8, 1818.

“The Dick, Harrison, from Madras, arrived here on the 2d instant. The Captain and Officers report, that his Majesty's ship Minden arrived at Madras from Ceylon for troops, for the relief of General Brownrigg and his Staff, who were surrounded in a mud fort in the interior, and secluded from all communication, by the Candians. A detachment of the 83d regiment had been cut to pieces.

“Captain Tarbet, of the Lord Cathcart, arrived on the 5th instant, reports, that his Majesty's ship Minden had passed Point de Galle, for Columbo, with troops for the relief of General Brownrigg.”

The above produced considerable sensation. It was the only account that had reached London, and we are disposed to hope it will not be confirmed by subsequent advices.

The new steamboat Walk-in-the-Water, capt. Fish, (an odd compound of names by the-by) appears to have exceeded public expectation on Lake Erie. She carried, in addition to valuable freight, upwards of one hundred and twenty passengers, a number which we had no idea now travelled in that quarter. She stops at Dunkirk, Erie, Grand River, Cleveland, Sandusky Bay, and Detroit. Nat. Ad.

Hail Storm.—On Tuesday last, a storm of Hail from the North the most violent of any experienced in this quarter, for several years, visited us. In its course, it has, we learn, in several fields, a few miles northwest of us, cut off the peas, one half.
