Upon entering the choir, the Royal Body will be placed on a platform, and the crown and cushion laid on the coffin.
The Chief Mourner will sit on a chair at the head of the corpse. The Supporters on either side.
The Princes of the Blood Royal will sit near the Chief Mourner.
The Lord Chamberlain of her late Majesty will take his place at the feet of the corpse, and the Supporters of the Pall their places near the Royal Body.
During the service, the Knights of the Garter present will occupy their respective stalls. The judges, ministers of state, nobility, and great officers of the household will be placed in the vacant intermediate stalls, the ladies attendants in the seat below the stalls, on the north side nearest the altar; the officers of the Duchy of Cornwall, the grooms of the bed chamber, law officers &c. in the seat below the stalls on the south side, nearest the altar; the physicians, equerries, &c. in front seats on either side; the gentlemen ushers, pages, &c. will be arranged on either side, below the altar.
The part of the service before the interment, and the anthem, being performed, the royal body will be deposited in the vault; and, the service concluded, Sir Isaac Heard, Garter, will pronounce, near the grave, the style of her late Majesty.
N. B.—The Knights of the several orders, who walk in the procession, will wear their respective cellars.
The procession from the entrance to the choir, within the chapel, will be flanked by the grenadiers of the foot guards, every fourth man bearing a flambeau.

The Queen's will, it seems, has recently been discovered. It was made in June, 1817, and several codicils have been added since. It is said, she has left to her Royal Highness the Princess Augusta, the house and grounds of Frogmore, to her Royal Highness the Princess Sophia, the Lower Lodge at Windsor. Her numerous diamonds, laces, and wardrobe, are to be divided equally among the Princesses. A handsome bequest, it is reported, goes to the dowager Countess of Harcourt, one of the ladies of her bed-chamber. But the most remarkable circumstance attending this will, is the trifling amount of money left behind—some statements say only £3000—others make it £10,000.

The following is a translation of the inscription which is to be placed on her Majesty's coffin.
Herein are the remains
Of the most Serene Princess Charlotte, by the grace of God
Queen Consort of the most august and powerful Monarch,
George the Third, by the grace of God, King of Great Britain and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, King of Hanover, And Duke of Brunswick and Lunenburg.
Died on the 17th November, in the Year of our Lord 1818,
And of her age, the 75th.
The exterior coffin is of fine oak, covered with rich crimson velvet. The sides are divided into pannelled compartments with silver gilt nails, within which are placed superb handles, in the antique style of silver, richly gilt.

Report of the Committee appointed to examine the Treasurer's Accounts.
C, is an abstract of those Duties, by which it appears, that the net amount thereof is £4164: 10: 9; of which £2240: 12: 2 has been paid into the Province Treasury, as appears by the Treasurer's general account, marked No. 10.
D and E, are the accounts of the ordinary and non-resident Duties collected and secured at Westmorland, in the Year 1818, amounting to £174: 12: 8½—and
F, is the Deputy-Treasurer's account current—balance due the Province, in Cash and Bonds, on the 1st January 1819, £239: 7: 1½.
G, is the Deputy-Treasurer's account for the County of York, up to 31st December 1817—balance due from him to the Province Treasury, £27: 5.
H and I, are the accounts of the ordinary and non-resident Duties collected and secured at St. Andrew's, in the Year 1818, amounting to £3926: 11: 8½.
K, is an account of Duties upon Oxen, collected at the same place, within the same period, amounting to £38.
L and M, are the accounts of Duties collected and secured at Moose Island, by Alfred Armstrong, Esq. late Deputy-Treasurer there, between 21st April and 31st December 1817, amounting to £197: 18: 5—no part of which has been remitted to the Province Treasury.
N, is an account of the ordinary and non-resident Duties collected and secured at Indian Island, in the Year 1818, amounting to £1366: 17: 3½, which is passed to the credit of the Province in the account current of the Deputy Treasurer of Charlotte, marked O.
O, is an account current of the Deputy-Treasurer of Charlotte, for Bonds taken by the late Deputy-Treasurer of that County; by which it appears, that of the old balance of £2303: 10, the sum of £221: 14: 8, has been received; and the residue, in Bonds, to the amount of £2081: 15: 6, was delivered, on the 19th September last, to the Attorney General, for collection.
P, is the account current of the Deputy-Treasurer of Charlotte County, with the Province—by which it appears, that on the 31st December, 1818, there was a balance in his hands, in Cash and Bonds, due to the Province, of £5389: 12: 2½. In addition to which, it appears by the same account current, that he delivered to the Attorney General, in the months of September and December last, Bonds to the amount of £980: 9 to be sued for.
Q, is an account of the ordinary and non-resident Duties collected and secured by the late Deputy-Treasurer at St. Peter's, amounting to £93: 8: 4½, which is carried to the credit of his account current marked R.
There are several errors in the calculations in the above-mentioned account marked Q.
R, is the account current of the late Deputy-Treasurer at St. Peter's, up to 13th March 1817—in which he states a balance of £2: 7: 10½, to be due to him; but it appears by a memorandum, made by the Province Treasurer, at the foot of that account, that the charge of £50, as a remittance on account of those Duties, is incorrect—it having been by the direction of the said Deputy, applied to another purpose.
S and T, are the accounts of the ordinary and non-resident Duties collected and secured at Shediac, in the Year 1818, amounting to £243: 13: 2, which is carried to the credit of the Deputy-Treasurer's account current, dated 19th January, 1819; and by that account current, (which is marked V.) there appears to be a balance, in Bonds, of £219: 5: 0½, in his hands.
No. 1 contains an account of the Light-House Duties collected at St. John, between the 1st January, 1818, and 31st December following, amounting to £915: 7: 10. Annexed to which is an account current—balance in favor of the Province, £473: 2: 9½, carried to the credit of the general account current, No. 10.
No. 2, is a particular account of the ordinary Provincial Duties on articles imported into St. John, between 1st January and 31st December, 1818, amounting to £17,436: 15: 3.
No. 3, is a particular account of Duties on Merchandize imported into St. John by non-residents, subject to the duty of 2½ per cent. between 1st January and 31st December, 1818, amounting to £277: 17: 4.
No. 4, is an account of Duty on Goods sold at Auction in the City of St. John, in the Year 1818, amounting to £205: 7: 6.
No. 5, is an account of net proceeds of Seizures, made under the Gypsum Law, up to 31st December 1818, amounting to £243: 4: 7.
No. 6, is an abstract of Warrants paid at the Province Treasury in the Year 1818, amounting to £17,741: 6: 1.
No. 7, is an abstract of Drawbacks allowed and paid at the Province Treasury in the Year 1818, amounting to £3145: 10: 9.
No. 8, is a general account of contingent expences incurred at the Treasurer's Office in 1818, including two several accounts of John Chaloner, for Gaging, &c. amounting to £117: 12; an account for expences of making Treasury Notes, £38: 2: 2; and an account for Stationary and Postage, £12: 17: 6.
No. 9, is an abstract of the Revenue raised in the following places in this Province, to wit—

The Committee beg leave to remark, that no accounts have been received by the Treasurer from his Deputies in the County of York, St. Peter's, Resigouche, or Tracadie for the Year 1818; but by the Treasurer's general account, No. 10, it appears that he has received from the late Deputy-Treasurer at St. Peter's, £116: 12: 10; from the present Deputy at the same place, £45; and from the Deputy at Resigouche, £60: 11: 10.

The account marked No. 10, contains the Province Treasurer's general state of the Public Accounts, by which it appears, that there remains a balance in the Chest of £23,745: 4: 10½, in Treasury Notes, Bonds, and Bills. This account is accompanied with the requisite vouchers, is accurately stated, and satisfactory in every respect.
