Cavalry and Heavy Artillery, 8 troops, 1 col. 1 lieutenant, 2 majors, 8 captains, 8 lieutenants, 8 cornets, and usual staff, 29 sergeants, 24 corporals, 8 trumpeters, 8 fanners, 336 privates, 273 horses, (16 privates in each troop to be dismounted.)
Infantry, 10 companies, 1 colonel, 1 lieutenant colonel, 2 majors, 10 captains, 12 lieutenants, 8 ensigns, the usual staff, 35 sergeants, 30 corporals, 22 drummers, 620 privates.
 All officers supernumerary to these Establishments, to be placed on half-pay, and the non-commissioned officers and privates discharged.
 * One sergeant per troop in each of the regts. dragoon guards, and light dragoons serving in G. Britain and Ireland; and a sergeant per company in every regt. of infantry, exclusive of those serving in the East Indies.

The 2d dragoon guards, 3d dragoons, 3d, 7th, 23d, 29th, 43d and 57th regts. infantry, now on their return from France, are to proceed to Ireland; and it is understood that the 11th and 13th dragoons are to proceed to the East Indies.

Nov. 13.
 The passage of our army from France still continues, and it is calculated two thirds of the whole are already arrived. Several Brigades of Horse and Foot Artillery have been landed at Dover, with detachments of the Corps of Engineers, and Sappers and Miners, which have proceeded for Woolwich. The appearance, equipments, and condition of this arm of the service are so admirable, that a sensation of regret would be excited at its reduction, were it not that the principles of our Constitution, and the necessities of our country, demand it.

A letter from Dover, dated Nov. 10 says, "Eighteen vessels arrived this day from Calais, and about the same number yesterday, chiefly with cavalry, consisting of the 2d and 3d regiments Dragoon Guards, and also several Staff Officers, amongst whom

Major-General Lord Edward Somerset, his family and suite."

Report says, that only two General Officers will be retained on the Staff in the West Indies. The Adjutant and Quarter-Master General's Staff in Ireland will come under reduction. Regiments are about to embark for India to relieve the following corps, viz:--

22d, at Mauritius; 19th, at Ceylon; 65th, at Bombay; 34th, at Madras; 17th and 67th, at Bengal; coming home.

One to the Cape of Good Hope, to relieve the Royal African.

One to Halifax, to relieve the 3d Battalion of the 60th, ordered for reduction.

The 1st West-India goes to Gibraltar to receive the draughts of the 4th. The 3d will be draughted into the 2d, at Jamaica.

Regiments are to go from Ireland to relieve the 4th Battalion of the 60th York Rangers, West-India Rangers, and Chasseurs, in the West-Indies, ordered to be reduced.

General Gourgaud, one of Napoleon's adherents, has been arrested in London, after a desperate resistance, and his books and papers all seized. A London paper says, "this Officer, it was understood, was one of the persons concerned in the late St. Helena plot." He was conveyed to Harwich to be sent out of England.

Aix-la-Chapelle, Nov. 8.

The termination of the Congress is expected to take place by the end of the ensuing week.

London, November 13.

Dispatches, containing important information relative to Bonaparte, and regarding a supposed plot to effect his escape, occupied the Cabinet Ministers great part of Sunday.

In the beginning of September, a vessel was seen on the windward side of St. Helena, which acted so suspiciously, that she was chased, but in vain. Several times since, the same vessel has been observed and pursued, but her sailing is so excellent that the lightest of the British cruisers have not been able to approach her.

Our latest accounts from Sierra Leone have been melancholy in the extreme. The white inhabitants, exclusive of military, do not exceed 30 persons, and of these one-third fell victims to the fever during the rainy season.

Sir Murray Maxwell again starts for Westminster, in consequence of the lamented death of Sir Samuel Romilly, and will be opposed by Mr. Brougham, supported by the Whig interest.

The English Mail arrived yesterday at the Post-Office, bringing London dates to the 14th N. vember. The following is the latest Bulletin of Her MAJESTY'S health:--

"Kew Palace, Nov. 14.

"The Queen continues in much the same state. Her Majesty rested ill in the early part of the night, but she has had some good sleep this morning."

Yesterday being the anniversary of Her MAJESTY'S Birth, the same was observed here as a holiday at the Public Offices.

Sir Samuel Romilly, Representative for the City of Westminster, put a period to his existence on the 2d November.

The British Parliament was further prorogued, by writ, to the 29th December.

St. J. Jan. 16.

Yesterday morning, about half-past 11 o'clock, the *Alms House* of this City caught fire, and such was the rapidity with which the flames spread, that the whole of the building was burnt down before one o'clock. The greatest exertions were made by the citizens and military for the preservation of the adjacent buildings, with success.
