**Death of Her Majesty.**

*Sun-Office, Three o'Clock.*

It is our melancholy duty to inform our readers, that the awful event so long expected took place this day at half-after one o'clock, when the Royal Sufferer was released from all human cares.

The conduct of Her Majesty through life has been exemplary, and was a pattern worthy the imitation of the female world in all countries. We understand that during the intervals of those pains which were at times sufficient to demand the utmost fortitude, she bore her sufferings with Christian patience, under the powerful support of pious resignation.

**NEW-YORK, JAN. 2.**

*Latest from England.*—Yesterday afternoon the ship Manhattan, Capt. Macy, arrived at this port in 42 days from Liverpool. By this arrival we have received from our London correspondent, regular files of London papers and Prices Currents to the evening of the 17th of November, and Shipping list to the 13th. From our Liverpool Correspondent we have received a regular file of Liverpool papers to the 19th of November, inclusive, and Lloyds list to the 13th.

The Queen of England died at 1 o'clock in the afternoon of the 17th November. A mortification commenced in Her Majesty the night previous. The Courier says, she died quite tranquil, and without a struggle.

The following is a copy of a letter from Lord Sidmouth, announcing the death of Her Majesty to the Lord Mayor of London. It is transmitted to us in manuscript by our attentive Correspondent in that city: **WHITEHALL, Nov. 17, 1818.**

MY LORD,

It is my painful duty to inform your Lordship, of the death of Her Majesty the Queen.

This melancholy event took place at Kew Palace, at one o'clock this day.

In consequence of the melancholy intelligence of the death of Her Majesty, the Royal Standard was hoisted half-mast high at Fort George and the Harbour Post, and by His Majesty's Ships Forth and Grass-hopper.

LONDON, JAN. 7.

The National Intelligencer contains a long, interesting, and very able letter from the Hon. John Quincy Adams, Secretary of State, to Mr. Erving, dated on the 28th November last, in reply to the note of Mr. Pizarro, relative to events connected with the late Seminole war. Our readers will recollect, says the Boston Patriot, that in that note, Mr. Pizarro had the effrontery to call upon the government of the United States to punish General Jackson, for the events growing out of this war. Mr. Adams replies to that part of the note in the following spirited manner:—

"The President will neither inflict punishment nor pass a censure upon General Jackson for that conduct, the motives for which, were founded in the purest patriotism, of the necessity for which he had the most immediate and effectual means of forming a judgment, and the vindication of which is written in every page of the law of nations, as well as in the first law of nature, self defence. He thinks it, on the contrary, due to the justice, which the United States have a right to claim from Spain; and you are accordingly instructed to demand of the Spanish Government, that enquiry shall be instituted into the conduct of Don Jose Mazot, Governor of Pensacola, and of Don Francisco C. Luengo, Commander of Saint Marks, and a suitable punishment inflicted on them for having, in defiance and violation of the engagements of Spain with the United States, aided and assisted these hordes of savages in those very hostilities against the United States, which it was their official duty to restrain. This enquiry is due to the characters of those officers themselves, and to the honour of the Spanish Government.

"Let Mr. Pizarro's successor take the trouble of reading the enclosed documents, and he will discover who Arbuthnot and Ambrister were, and what were their purposes: That Arbuthnot was only the successor of Nichols, and Ambrister the agent of Woodbine, and the subaltern of M-Gregor."

**CONGRESS.**—The Washington City Gazette expresses the opinion, that Congress will this week, enter in earnest upon the important business of the session. Among the important objects which demand attention, the following are specially mentioned:—

"1. The present state of our relations with Spain, growing out of the Seminole war, which it is generally supposed, will eventually in Congress empowering the executive to take possession of the Floridas, and thus break off the interminable negotiation with Spain on this subject.

"2. The South American question, which is now fairly before Congress since the receipt of the several reports of the commissioners, furnishing all the information asked for."

*Extract of a letter from a respectable mercantile house in Bermuda, dated Dec. 27.*

"A friend of ours who arrived last evening from Norfolk, brings the account of the Treaty between Great Britain and America, which is that the West-India ports are to be shut against the Americans, the Fisheries the same as settled by the Treaty of 1783, and the right of search to remain for further discussion."
