LONDON, Nov. 13.

The following are some further particulars of the voyage of the Isabella and Alexander Discovery Ships:—

"The Isabella and the Alexander, Discovery Ships, are safely arrived in Brass Sound, Lerwick, all well, neither ship having lost a man, nor a man on the sick list.

"Captain Ross has completely succeeded in exploring every part of Baffin's Bay, and, with the exception of errors in the latitudes and longitudes, of verifying the statements of that old navigator, whose name it bears; and of ascertaining that no passage exists between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, through Davis's Strait and Baffin's Bay, the whole being found to be surmounted by high land, extending to the North, as far as lat. 77 deg. 55 min. and long. 76 deg. W.; and in the 74th degree of lat. stretching Westward, as far as 34 deg. W. longitude.

"They traced the land the whole way down to the Cape Wasingham of Davis, which they determined to lie in lat. 66 deg. and long. 60 deg.; from hence they steered for Resolition Island, and then stood homeward.

"They have made many curious observations and discoveries, of which will perhaps not be considered as the least interesting, that of a Nation being found to inhabit the Arctic regions between the latitudes of 75 deg. and 78 deg. who thought that the world to the South was all ice; that generation had succeeded generation of a people, who had never tasted the fruits of the earth, had no idea of a Supreme Being, never had an enemy, and who Chiefs had hitherto supposed themselves Monarchs of the Universe.

"There now only remains to be discovered, a few degrees, to the Northward of the Repulse Bay of Middleton, which might be done any one season, from the northernmost station of the Hudson's Bay Company."

In one respect, this summary appears to have been hastily made. We really are not credulous to believe, that any people exist upon earth, without an idea of a Supreme Being.

It is understood, that one part of the contents of the late despatches from St. Helena relates to an attempt to corrupt some of the troops there. While Bonaparte is able to

draw for large sums upon the bankers in Europe, to whom his family and his adherents are doubtless responsible, it cannot be wonderful that he should endeavour to make this use of his funds. But the whole of his conduct, supposing no such attempt to have been detected, must have convinced the Allies how unfit an object he is of the extreme indulgence and compassion shown to him.

The following interesting information is extracted from a Letter received by the last Packet, from the British and Foreign School Society. (Lancasterian) dated London, November 2, 1818.

"You will hear with great pleasure that a School on our plan is opened at Madrid. France has now 900 Schools on the new system; Russia and Germany have commenced. In a few years we hope Europe throughout will adopt the system.

"In Pennsylvania the plan is authorized by Law, and in New-York it flourishes greatly; we have just sent a Teacher to the latter place who will exhibit the system in the greatest perfection, and be enabled to instruct Teachers. When you get the Report, you will rejoice to see what is done in Bengal and Ceylon by the Baptist and Methodist Missionaries.

"We feel the importance of instruction as the way by which the knowledge of the Scriptures may be most extensively promoted throughout the world. May he who commanded the light to shine out of darkness send his light forth to the utmost ends of the earth!"
