

sex, and Sackville, or either of them, shall think fit to comply with the foregoing resolution, that in such case the Rectors of the said Parishes, or either of them respectively, be requested to furnish the Secretary with a list of such books as may be wanted for those Parishes respectively.

It appearing by the Report of James Codner, Esquire, who has hitherto kindly taken charge of the Books, sent for the supply of the Members of the Society in the City of St. John, that there is a balance remaining in his hands of £26 18 11, for books sold: Ordered, that the same be paid into the hands of the Treasurer, and that the books remaining on hand, be delivered over to the Treasurer.

Resolved, that in remitting the subscriptions and collections now on hand, an Order be sent for Books to an amount not exceeding the sum of one hundred pounds, for the local Depository, and that the list of the same be made out by the Secretary with the aid of any Member of the Society who may wish to make any suggestions in this regard, to which list is to be added such lists of books as may be furnished for the supply of the Parishes of Kingston, Sussex, and Sackville respectively.

Resolved, that the Rector and Church Wardens of Trinity Church be a Committee to give every requisite aid on the part of the Members of the Society in this District, in furtherance of the great object of the Education of the Poor in the National Schools established in this City and other parts of the District, and to obtain such information respecting these Institutions as may be proper to be transmitted to the Bishop of this Diocese, and to the Board in London, in conformity with the General Rule of the Society, No. XX.

Resolved, that the Rector of Trinity Church be respectfully requested to recommend the Society to the benevolence of his Parishioners, and with the assistance of the Church Wardens, to adopt such measures as they shall think most likely to promote the objects of this Institution.

For the satisfaction of those who may have the charge of the National Schools in this District, they are hereby informed, that a complete supply for 50 Boys, including the necessary Books, Tracts, Cards, Slates, and Pencils, and also the requisite Stationery for one year, may be had for about the sum of four pounds, and that it is intended to import for the local Depository here, without delay, a supply of all these Articles sufficient for all the demands of the Schools that may be established within this District; and that Bibles, Testaments and Prayer Books, may also be had at the Depository on the reduced prices upon proper application made for the same.

FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

20 FEBRUARY, 1819.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor came this day to the Council Chamber, and opened the Session of the General Assembly by the following Speech to both Houses:—

"Gentlemen of the Council, and Gentlemen of the Assembly."

The long continuance of the lamented indisposition of our beloved and venerable Sovereign, without any mitigation, must lead us to fear that the removal of His Majesty's malady is beyond the reach of all human means. The privation of the assiduous and devoted attention of his most faithful and affectionate Consort, will necessarily add much to His Majesty's afflictions.

A period was put to the existence of our most gracious QUEEN on the 17th of last November, after a long life in which Her Majesty, in the strict and steady performance of every duty, both of a public and private nature, exhibited one of the brightest examples for imitation. From the knowledge I have acquired of the sentiments of the inhabitants of this Royal Province, I feel quite confident that all will sympathize with the Royal Family in their distress on this melancholy event.

Turning our attention from these painful scenes, let me congratulate you upon the fair prospect afforded us of a durable Peace. As a proof of this, I may refer to the conduct of the great Potentates of Europe in their late Congress at Aix-la-Chapelle, which has led to the removal of the Army of Oc-

cupation from France, and to a very great reduction of our own military force.

We have good reason to hope that many, and indeed most of the points in difference with the United States of America, have been amicably adjusted by a Treaty lately negotiated in England.

The present internal prosperity of the Province affords an ample subject for further congratulation. The abundance of the late harvest have revived the drooping spirits of the Farmer, and the great increase of the Revenue is one among many proofs of the flourishing state of the commerce of the Country.

Our Roads are greatly improved, and the communications between several principal sections of the Province have been much facilitated and rendered more commodious by the establishment of military and other Settlers on parts before in a wilderness state. The effects of the liberal Grants heretofore made for the support of Schools throughout the Province, must be very visible.

For all these favors and blessings, I trust we shall feel highly grateful to the Supreme giver of all good.

Gentlemen of the Assembly,

By the Treasurer's accounts, which I have directed to be laid before you, you will perceive that the impost duties have been much more productive for the last than for the preceding year. This will afford additional means for your exertions in promoting the further prosperity of the Province, and I confidently rely upon the continuance of your liberality in granting the necessary Supplies for the Public Service. I must, at the same time, recommend to your attentive consideration, the necessity of taking effectual measures for ensuring prompt payment of your Grants at the Treasury.

Gentlemen of the Council, and Gentlemen of the Assembly.

The Education of youth is of the utmost importance to Society. The Madras System established in the National Schools, has been found to be greatly superior to any former mode of instruction. Several of you must have had an opportunity of witnessing the beneficial effects which have already resulted from the experiment lately made in the City of Saint John, through the liberality of individuals; and I earnestly recommend to your united attention, the expediency of extending the benefits of the same system, to other parts of the Province.

The state of the Agriculture of the Province is also deserving of your attentive consideration. And connected with this subject is the expediency of making some provision to aid the Emigrants from the Mother Country, in establishing themselves on new lands.

The General Assembly, by command of His Excellency, was then adjourned till Friday next.

Eighteen Members of the Honourable House of Assembly were present at the opening of this Session; the remainder may be expected to-morrow morning. The House has been adjourned by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor until Friday next, on account of the demise of Her Majesty.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor arrived here on Saturday evening last.

Boston papers to the 18th inst. inclusive, were politely handed us last evening by a Gentleman from St. Stephen's; they contain London dates to the last of November. Our limits will not allow us to make any extracts from them for this paper, the most essential articles they contain will be inserted in our next.

It is stated in a Harwich paper that an attempt had been made to assassinate the Emperor Alexander near Frankfurt.

The great bell of St. Paul's tolled for one hour on the night of the decease of the Queen.

The Prince Regent has been in a low nervous state ever since the death of the Queen.

The bodily health of the King continues unimpaired; but during the intervals of reason with which he is blessed, he makes constant inquiries after the Queen.

Lord M'Grave retires, it is said, from the Master Generalship of the Ordnance. The uncertain state of his Lordship's health is assigned as the cause. The Duke of Wellington is mentioned as his probable successor.

has arrived, but not yet published. I have it however, confidentially, that no mention is made of the West-India trade. Things therefore will remain as at present.

A letter from Eastport, dated 27th inst. states—We have it from good and respectable authority, that MASTIN, the murderer, advertised lately, is taken and carried to your place.

On Thursday we experienced a most severe gale of wind from the South West, which increased as the tide flowed, and ultimately rose so high as to make a breach over several wharves—many vessels broke their fasts—one of which knocked down a small shop at the end of Mr. PETER'S wharf, owned by Mr. BETTS. We are sorry to say that some damage was also done to the lower part of the Break-water, where it had not been properly secured.

It has this day blown very hard from the same quarter, accompanied by snow—Nine vessels went to sea yesterday for Europe, and the West Indies, for which, some anxiety is manifest.
