A Proclamation.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient  
that a General Assembly of this  
Province should be called and summoned  
to meet at Fredericton on the third Tuesday  
in November next: I do, therefore, by and  
with the advice and consent of His Majesty's  
Council, publish this Proclamation, hereby  
calling and summoning the said General  
Assembly to meet at the time and place  
above-mentioned; whereof all persons whom  
it may concern will take due notice and  
govern themselves accordingly.

BOSTON, SEPT. 23.

It appears probable that the fort which  
our government had began to erect on Lake  
Champlain, falls within the British lines.  
This is to be regretted, but if it fairly belongs  
to them by the treaty, let them have it. If  
we lose Rouse's Point, it is said we shall  
receive a compensation in the district of  
Maine. Our Northeastern boundary it is  
said will be many miles further north than  
has heretofore been supposed. It will ex-  
tend so far as completely to cut off the com-  
munication between the Provinces, and will  
embrace within our limits a considerable  
French settlement, which has formerly been  
under the jurisdiction of Canada.

The dispatches for Mr. Forsyth, Mini-  
ster at Madrid, requires him to make the bu-  
siness of Florida categorical—and in case of  
a non-ratification, to ask for his passports—  
and return.

PHILADELPHIA, SEPT. 20.  
Extract of a Letter from Rio Janeiro,  
July 19.

"In Buenos Ayres there is much alarm  
in consequence of the Cadiz expedition. It  
is said to be the determination of this Go-  
vernment to deny the Spaniards the hospi-  
tality of their ports—and to maintain posses-  
sion of Monte Video. Troops are expect-  
ed out from Lisbon, I suppose, to enforce  
this determination.

"The Island of St. Catharine's is about  
being put in a posture of defence.

"From Lord Cochrane we have nothing  
new."

SEPT. 27.  
LATEST FROM ENGLAND.

The ship Mary and Susan, Capt. Curtis,  
has arrived at this place, with London pa-  
pers to the 23d, and Liverpool to the 25th  
ult. Excepting on the subject of the Man-  
chester riots, their contents are uninteresting  
but on this fruitful theme of political specu-  
lation, they are literally overburdened; and  
present as many aspects of the present and  
anticipations of the future peace and safety of  
the country, as there are hues in the rain-  
bow. On one side, the meeting of the  
populace, though multifarious, is described  
as in the highest degree orderly, and deco-

rous, and the attack upon them to have been  
wanton and unnecessary. The people re-  
ceived the different military corps with  
cheering, until their sabres informed them,  
that their visit was hostile. On the other  
hand the marching in regiments under regu-  
lar leaders, the numerous banners with  
their inscriptions, the call of several persons  
to the people to lock their arms fast together  
round the hustings—and other circumstan-  
ces indicated any thing but a peaceable  
meeting. And the riot act having, accord-  
ing to the ministerial papers, been twice  
read,—the magistrates consulted together,  
and issued a warrant to arrest Hunt. The  
officers and cavalry who were appointed to  
execute it, were assailed by heavy volleys of  
stones and shouts, and they did not use their  
sabres, until compelled to do it for self de-  
fence. Not a single shot was fired by the  
military.—There were 100,000 persons  
within view.

On Tuesday evening a large and riotous  
mob assembled in Oldham, and the riot act  
was read to them—but they were dispersed  
by the military. On Wednesday, not the  
least disturbance took place in Manchester  
or Salford. Cheerfulness and confidence  
appeared to be restored; but a notice was  
issued to the inhabitants by the magistrates  
requesting them not to be out of their own  
houses after nine o'clock at night. There  
is a list of thirty persons very much hurt,  
who were lodged in the infirmary, of whom  
two had died, and forty out patients who  
were dressed there. The thanks of the ma-  
gistrates of Manchester, to Col. L'Estrange,  
and the officers and men under his command,  
have been given, for the energy and huma-  
nity they displayed in their conduct. The  
same vote was passed in favor of Major  
Trafford of the Lancaster and Salford Yeo-  
manry Cavalry, for their exemplary con-  
duct, and to numerous other persons. But  
the public mind is still in a violent state of  
agitation.

Hunt, Johnson, Saxton, Night, More-  
house, Wild, Jones, and several women,  
were brought before ten magistrate on Fri-  
day afternoon, and all of them detained in  
custody, upon charges of HIGH TREASON.  
They generally bowed and retired. Hunt  
said he was innocent of the charge and was  
willing to meet it.

"CAUTION.—The Inhabitants of Man-  
chester and Salford are requested not to be  
out of their own houses after nine at night,  
during the present disturbed state of these  
towns."

On Thursday, 19th, the town of Man-  
chester was quiet; but not so in the neigh-  
bourhood, for large parties were assembled at  
Middleton, Royton, all the adjacent parts,  
committing the most outrageous depredations  
on every well dressed individual that  
passed them. A person who came from  
Middleton this morning states, that there  
were at least three thousand assembled there;  
a portion of the Cheshire Cavalry have been  
sent to disperse them.

On Friday, 20th, though no acts of vio-  
lence were committed, the population, both  
in Manchester, and its neighbourhood, were  
found to be deeply incensed against the ma-  
gistrates for their conduct in the affair of  
Monday, the 16th. From this silent, though  
dangerous agitation of the mind, fears were  
apprehended of a serious rebellion. The  
utmost vigilance of the civil and military  
authority was in constant exercise to check  
the assembling of any large masses of the  
people.

The following, among other regulations,  
adopted in Manchester, must have a salu-  
tary tendency in preserving the public  
peace.

"The Watch and Ward Act is now put  
into full operation. This will be a great  
security to every one. Its powers are very  
summary, especially against night-walkers  
and skulkers.—The unlawful training of  
men in the neighbourhood to the use of arms
